B-17 Tour a Success!

Pilot to bombardier... Pilot to bombardier...commence bomb run...commence bomb run...

Chapter 690's Victory Fly-In was another success: a tribute to those who fought the battles leading to Victory, both in the European and Pacific Theaters. It also stands as a tribute to the organizational and work abilities of many Chapter 690 members. Over a very complex three days, Chapter 690 hosted its first-ever Hangar Dance without a hangar but with a 19-piece Big Band, a flying museum tour centered around the EAA B-17 Aluminum Overcast, a two-day fly-in complete with 30 vendors, two pancake breakfasts and BBQ lunches, and a Young Eagles Rally. Whoo!

Flying the Big Iron. Several chapter members flew the B-17. For a fee, Ugarté, they got to experience a little of what it was like to be a fudgey faced 18-year-old kid heading off to do battle with the Luftwaffe or the Imperial Air Force, praying for a milk-run but competently doing one's duty come what may. This experience was due in large part to the amazing detail carried out in the restoration of Aluminum Overcast. All of the old equipment, from five-foot radio stacks to oxygen masks and heated body suits, were in the plane. On the initial mission down from Tennessee, Bob Zahner skimmed over the the Blue Ridge and actually had to climb for rising terrain. The B-17's crew likes to fly low. They like to fly fast, too. Steve Ashby, who flew chapter members up to the embarkation, could not keep up in his Skyhawk on the way back. Few Skyhawks can maintain 170 knots without soon meeting the ground. Bob says that the -17 was a big, honest plane, magnificent and majestic. Jim Estes and Frank Wilcox had similar experiences: smooth as a similar-vintage Cadillac; a big, graceful old bird. Steve Ashby also thought it was smooth, partly due to heavy ailerons. "It's definitely a two-handson-the-yoke airplane. Flies like a big 172!"
Regular crew members who flew the -17 in combat said that this made for weary pilots and copilots by the end of a mission, but like the accepted idiosyncracies of an old friend, it just makes them love her even more. Steve also flew in the bombardier's station in the nose. "It was a blast watching the ground rush by while lining up 'targets of opportunity' in the Norden bombsight."

The Victory Fly-In. The Fly-In began Friday 12 May with the arrival of Aluminum Overcast at LZU. Two missions were completed on Friday with some ground tours given. Saturday dimly dawned with overcast skies and a chill in the air. Many aircraft scheduled for shows and rides did not make it. Not surprisingly, all of the Young Eagle pilots found a way to get to the airport and complete their vital missions, though. The pancake breakfasts were again the way to start the day, and the twin twin pillars of Chapter 690 mornings, the Norths and the Langfords, made sure we got off to a good start. Aluminum Overcast made three flights with seven lucky, lucky "tourists" on board each. Between flights, Andy Anderson's ground tours provided us less-lucky souls a chance to play Walter Mitty's crew chief. Though it kept many people away, the damp, cool weather added to the atmosphere of an Eighth Air Force bomber base somewhere in southern England. Having Jim and Bobbie Estes greet each flight with a vintage Cushman "follow-me" scooter certainly added to the atmosphere. Jim probably could have sold rides in the funky little side-car! The Fly-In also had a festive air due in no small part to the amazing number of vendors that Joel Levine. Lots of color.

Sunday's weather was even stinkier, with only one -17 flight possible. With imposing

Finally there is something "concrete" to see at our Chapter 690 Hangar Cluster site. There is real concrete. The footers and floors for hangars number 5 and 6 have been poured and finished (as of 5/28/95) and the excavation and form construction for hangars 7 and 8 are in process. The intention was to start the concrete work with hangar number 1, but this could not be done until some additional grading of the sites for hangars 1-4 was completed. While this was being arranged, work was started on hangar sites 5-8 which did not require additional site preparation. It is expected that the original plan for competing the footer and floor concrete work for two hangars per week will now move ahead.

Electric service is now in place and ready for connection to each hangar. This will require county permits. Temporary electric service for construction purposes will be available following county inspection and approval of the temporary installation. This service is covered by our master building permit.

It is difficult to estimate the amount of construction that will be competed by June 9 when the Hot Air Balloon Team Championships will be starting. In all probability very little if any of our facilities can be used. A major concern is whether this large event will have an impact on the construction schedule of the hangar cluster. We are hoping to minimize any adverse effect.

As of June 1, Charlie Sego will assume temporary chairmanship of the Building Committee. Frank Wilcox will be on an extended summer trip.
