

Now on to the Georgia Wings Weekend. The First Annual Georgia Wings Weekend is only a month and a half away, May 13-14. The committee, made up of Chapter members from 690, 268, the War Bird Chapter, the 99's, CAP and the FAA, is working hard, none harder than our own Sue and Terry Adams, to make Georgia's first Wings Weekend a resounding success. If you have read any of the aviation rags you already know that FAA Wings Weekends are being held in many other states around the country. Recurrent training is key to Aviation Safety and the FAA is in full support of the program as are our major sponsors, Compaq, Mercedes Benz, Coca-Cola and the FAA. The Safety Seminars and the

three hours of airtime are all free to the pilot participant. Obviously the pilot participant must supply the plane. Breakfast, lunch and dinner are also free to the participant with a nominal fee for a guest. The Saturday and Sunday Safety Seminars and manufacturers' exhibits are open to all to attend, however, the minimum requirement to earn a FAA Wings Segment is a private pilot rating. One new Wing may be earned each year.

If you plan on participating, time is of the essence. There are a maximum number of flight slots available based on air space, the three hours of flight time required and the number of flight instructors donating their time. The registration forms are posted near the entrance to the Chapter Hangar or you can register at www.wingsweekend.com on the Internet.

The Wings Weekend planning and implementation has involved a lot of Chapter members with additional help from members and spouses being needed during the weekend. Although a large part of the weekend will focus on this activity, the Chapter has also committed to hosting the B-17 and our Annual Hangar Dance on the same weekend.

March Meeting Speaker Brings Large Crowd by Margaret Wilcox

Myrtle Thompson ³Kay² Cagle was the speaker who drew a record crowd (over 90) to the Chapter building for the March 10th meeting. Kay was one of the 13 'secret' female Mercury astronauts chosen by NASA in 1960 to be tested and evaluated for possible selection as the first persons to fly in space.

History tells us that there were no American women in space until Sally Ride flew in 1983. What happened? Kay told the story through a video provided by The History Channel and her own interpretation as she shared her life story and answered questions.

Now in her mid 70s, Kay, small of stature, but full of energy and enthusiasm, seems to be a woman who knows no fear and has the confidence to do anything she makes up her mind to do. She started flying when only 12 years old - trying to keep up with her older brothers and was licensed at 14. At 36 years she was a flight, instrument and ground instructor with 4,300 hours of flying time, when she learned of the astronaut tests and wrote asking to be included. The women passed the same physical exams as John Glenn and the other Mercury astronauts. They surpassed the men in their ability to withstand heat, cold, monotony and pain, required less food and oxygen. Most of them had registered more flying time than had the men. But they were victims of their time. Politicians, bureaucrats and the American public were not ready in 1960 for women to assume leadership roles, even if we could have beaten the Russians by putting the first woman in space. Having fallen behind the Russians in other firsts, it happened again when they sent the first woman in space in 1963. She was not even a pilot - she was textile factory worker. Kay is not bitter about the disappointment she and the other women felt. She continued her career as a pilot and took advantage of all the opportunities made available as a result of her success in being chosen one of the 13 women. She told about riding home from the tests in Texas in a C130. She visited Israel and China, met Charles Lindberg, many of the astronauts and much later Eileen Collins, the first woman to pilot the Space

Shuttle. Though married at the time she was chosen, she had no children. But after the program folded, she had a daughter who has become a nurse, a career that Kay herself once considered.

Kay retired in 1996 from many years in aviation which in addition to flying and instructing, included working as an aircraft mechanic. Kay gives credit to the early women in aviation, on whose shoulders she stands and is grateful that women today give her and her generation praise for establishing the credibility which enable them to become leaders in aviation.

Visitors who came to the Chapter meeting to hear Kay speak included several '99s' (Women Pilot¹s Organization), Civil Air Patrol Cadets and members of the general public.

Post WWII and Cold War Aviation History

The program for the April meeting on Friday the 14th will be Joe Anastasia, a resident of Sandy Springs, who flew a number of the then modern transports during the Berlin Airlift and later flew the B-36 and the B-52 during the height of the Cold War. Joe's charts and pictures are fascinating along with his stories of the conditions he flew in and the extraordinary lengthy flights the long range bombers did regularly keeping our nuclear weapons in the air continuously over the top of the world.

LEADERSHIP WORKSHOPS HELP CHAPTERS FORGE A SOLID FUTURE

The Experimental Aircraft Association has always been more than just a bunch of guys getting together and talking about airplanes.

In some ways it's an almost evangelical group that spreads the word about recreational aviation among themselves and non-members. By uniting diverse interests ranging from homebuilts to warbirds, it becomes an umbrella organization that shares its gathered knowledge in an effort to improve the aviation community.

But EAA depends on its Chapters to remain strong, which is the reasoning behind the regional leadership workshops sponsored by the Chapter Office.

Members of the Chapter Advisory Council and EAA staff present the workshops, which are designed to be teambuilding, not cheerleading, sessions.

"We talk with them about the future of their organizations," said Troy Toelle, EAA Chapter Field Administrator. "But more importantly, we put them in contact with other Chapter leaders in their area so they can synergize. They build a network that they

can use to co-sponsor events, to ask for help or to lend help. That's the core of it."

The most recent regional workshop was held March 6 in Poughkeepsie, N.Y. Seventy EAA Chapter leaders gathered from all over the Northeast U.S. and Canada for the one-day event.

Toelle said that Chapter leaders learned about building a dynamic Chapter structure, Chapter fundraising, and creating Chapter missions, visions, and goals.

The exercises cover goal building, strategic planning, and identifying Chapter strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats. Subject matter at the workshops varies from location to location, as well as from year to year.

This is the second year that the Chapter Office has gone on the road to conduct the workshops.

The Chapter Office schedules six regional workshops every year. Sessions are also held at Sun 'N' Fun and AirVenture Oshkosh. Future regional workshops will be held at:
