"50 FLAGS TO KITTY HAWK" PILOTS

EAA and the National Park Service - partners in EAA's Countdown to Kitty Hawk program, presented by Ford Motor Company, announced today that eight additional EAA-member pilots have been chosen to represent their states in EAA's "50 Flags to Kitty Hawk" initiative, celebrating the achievements of the Wright brothers and 100 years of powered flight. With these latest selections, there are 26 EAA member pilots chosen to participate in the "50 Flags to Kitty Hawk" program.

The pilots will fly their respective state flag to the Wright Brothers National Memorial in Kitty Hawk, N.C., on a day of their choice prior to December 1, 2003. Each pilot will also carry a proclamation from that state's Governor declaring the day of their flight "50 Flags to Kitty Hawk Day" for their respective state.

Upon arriving in Kitty Hawk, each pilot will be welcomed by the National Park Service, take part in official welcoming ceremonies, after which the flag of their respective state will be raised and flown throughout the day at the National Memorial. At year's end, the 50 flags delivered will be used in the creation of a permanent EAA/NPS "50 Flags to Kitty Hawk" display at the site.

Rare Lindbergh Exhibit Coming To Museum For EAA AirVenture 2003

A celebrated exhibit highlighting famed aviator Charles Lindbergh will be a major part of the EAA AirVenture Museum's special events schedule during EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2003. The exhibit, created by the Missouri Historical Society, is the largest, most ambitious and comprehensive effort established to honor the first person to make a solo, non-stop flight across the Atlantic Ocean. Lindbergh's journey made him an instant hero and created unprecedented worldwide interest in aviation.

"This exhibit, the largest temporary exhibit we're brought to Oshkosh in the museum's 20-year history, draws upon Charles Lindbergh's personal collection, as well as historical artifacts," said Adam Smith, EAA AirVenture Museum Director. "During EAA AirVenture, the thousands of aviation enthusiasts who come to Oshkosh will be fascinated by this look at the man and his flight that changed his life and ours. It is a wonderful addition to EAA's celebration of 100 years of powered flight."

Items from the 1927 trans-Atlantic trip, other personal artifacts and those from his wife, Anne Morrow Lindbergh, and his family will be included. The exhibit will arrive in Oshkosh in mid-July as part of its national tour and will be on display throughout EAA AirVenture. Museum admission is included with AirVenture passes.

Young Eagles Passes 900,000 Milestone

On Thursday morning, May 15, EAA's Young Eagles office announced that Young Eagle No. 900,000 had been officially entered into the world's largest logbook. He is Michael Baker of Paden, Oklahoma, and he received his flight May 3 during an EAA Chapter flight rally at Prague Municipal Airport (OK19) in Prague, Oklahoma. The pilot was David Ames, EAA 439967, Young Eagle Coordinator for Chapter 1098, Shawnee, Oklahoma.

"I'm thrilled to death about that," Ames said when informed of the milestone. Coincidentally, Ames had just sent a packet off to the EAA Young Eagles office containing the names of 27 more new Young Eagles. "900,000! Well, we're over that hump, we just need another 100,000 and we'll reach the goal of 1 million" ...

EAA 690 just added another 26 to that number Saturday, May 31. It was a beautiful, if windy day. The kids had a great time, as did the volunteers. 

MEIGS BATTLE HAS UPS AND DOWNS

Following on the heels of AOPA's highly publicized press conference last week proposing a "buy-out" plan to save Meigs Field, there were major legal setbacks. First, a state court last Friday dismissed a lawsuit against the City of Chicago by airport advocacy group Friends of Meigs. That dismissal also removed a temporary restraining order prohibiting the city from further damaging the airport. As soon as that decision was issued, AOPA attorneys marched into federal court seeking a restraining order in its case against the city. That suit involved violations of federal aviation regulations. But federal judge James Moran noted that the FAA had had AOPA's complaint for 53 days and had not done anything to reopen the airport, nor was it likely to. He denied the request to issue a restraining order. But late that evening the Illinois appellate court granted a stay on the Friends of Meigs' suit, protecting the airport until June 4. "We knew from the beginning that the legal actions had only a limited chance of succeeding," said AOPA President Phil Boyer, "but AOPA members across the nation have made it very clear that no measure should be spared to save this iconic airport."

...BUT THERE ARE SOME BRIGHT SPOTS Despite the legal setbacks, AOPA is still winning the public relations battle. The Chicago media have given great coverage to the AOPA plan, including stories in the major Chicago newspapers, on TV, and a long write-up in the influential business publication, Crain's Chicago Business. AOPA capitalized on congressional outrage over Chicago Mayor Richard Daley's actions by lobbying for legislation that would severely punish any official who unilaterally destroys an airport. Known informally as the "Meigs Legacy Amendment," the proposed amendment would require a 30-day advance notice to the FAA before closing an airport. Any agency that doesn't comply with that law could be fined \$10,000 for each day that an airport remains closed without having given the required notice. "In the long term, regardless of what happens to Chicago's lakefront airport, pilots will have gained substantial new tools to protect other airports," Boyer said.

It is important to remember they weren't sad because an airport closed. It was because what happened was un-American.

The next morning it was April Fool's Day, but this was no joke. The mayor violated federal air regulations and the trust of this country's aviation community.

Democracy means self-government. You vote for a candidate you believe will do a good job for you. Beware, some have their own agenda. In this case, the mayor got 78 percent of a very small vote. Nothing to be proud of.

So when election time comes, vote, even if you know your candidate might lose. Otherwise the winner gets a big head. History shows that's how dictators are born.

6/1/03: Illinois Legislature Passes O'Hare Bill without Meigs, Peotone

Yesterday, the Illinois House passed H.B.721, the O'Hare Expansion Act, without taking up measures to reconstitute the regional plan for airport capacity agreed to by Gov. Ryan and Mayor Daley in December, 2001.

"We are disappointed the Legislature did not consider adding Meigs and Peotone, the missing elements of the plan," said Rachel Goodstein, president of the Friends of Meigs Field. "Today's vote was their opportunity to make things right... they failed in that mission."

The issue was hotly debated in the House for over two hours, and Meigs Field figured prominently in the debate, drawing much praise, and no criticism. Yet, when the votes were counted, the measure passed by 84-31 margin.

Old business included a motion to amend the Bylaws of the chapter with Article XIV. After a lively debate, a vote was taken and the motion passed.


As this is my first opportunity to serve in this capacity for any organization, I'll figure out what I need to report going forward.

TWO POLES, ONE PILOT, ONE ENGINE

Lots of pilots, including Polly Vacher, have followed the sun on around-the-world jaunts. But the 59-year-old British pilot is doing it the hard way this time around. On May 6 she took off from Birmingham trying to become the first person to circumnavigate the globe solo over both poles in a single-engine aircraft. You can read her diary online. She and her Piper Dakota will cover 35,000 miles and touch down in 30 countries over the next 8 months as she tries to raise money for her favorite charity.

Two years ago she raised more than \$250,000 during an around-the-world flight for the British charity called Flying Scholarships for the Disabled. A pilot since 1994, Vacher has previously raised money by performing skydives. She hopes to be in California by July for an extensive tour of the US. She'll travel from Washington to Maryland, returning to California in Sept. along a route from Florida through Arizona. Then she'll conquer the South Pole and head back to England, via New Zealand, Australia, and the Far East. Follow her flight (http://www.worldwings.org/index.htm). While her goal is to raise money for the British scholarship, she insists that money raised in a country that has their own scholarship stay in that country, and we do have such a charity in the US. 

A Pilot's Letter To His Great-Grandkids

An open letter from a 76-year-old professional pilot to his great-grandchildren.

Dear Matthew, Kira and Alyssa,

At 6, 2 and 1, you are barely old enough to read, but I may not be here when you can, and I felt you need this lesson in democracy, which you will be able to understand later when you really need it.

It is ironic and sad that during the war with Iraq in 2003, the only destruction in this country was done by Chicago's Mayor Richard M. Daley, after dark, when he destroyed an airport without giving the people the benefit of due process.

Had there really been a terrorist or Iraqi strike here,

Meigs Field could have been used for ambulance, police and fire services and medical evacuation and supply. A while back, the mayor asked the military to move out of O'Hare airport to Rockford 80 miles away. He also neglected to do anything about the U.S. Coast Guard move to Ludington, Mich., across the lake when at least their chopper could have been based at Meigs.

As Iraqi supporters of Saddam Hussein carried posters, "Democracy is Hypocrisy," the mayor helped prove their point. Anywhere else, what he did would be called an act of sabotage and people would have been jailed. But it seems the country of Illinois, with a puppet as its governor, is becoming a dictatorship with Chicago as its capital. Baghdad West?

Land grabs for O'Hare, the North-South Corridor, telephone monopolies, and casino talks have all suddenly become signs of increasing totalitarianism.

The night of March 30, the mayor decided to celebrate the 100th anniversary of aviation by destroying an airport. He wants to build yet another park, supposedly for the people, whether they want it or not. They already have 552 parks, most of them in bad shape.

The next night, I dreamed that Orville Wright, Wilbur
