June 9th Program Announced – The Aviation Museum at Marietta, GA

Chapter 690 VP John Reitz has announced that Robert Ormbsy, President of The Aviation Museum at Marietta, GA will be our guest speaker on June 9th, 2006.

The Aviation Museum at Marietta, Georgia (AMMG) was established in 2003 to preserve and remember the remarkable story of Marietta's aircraft plant and to shape our nation's future by encouraging interest in engineering and technology.



The Museum will be located on 15.5 acres at the corner of Atlanta Road and South Cobb Drive in close proximity to the entrances of Lockheed Martin, Naval Air Station and Dobbins Air Reserve Base. Museum property is a mere 1.5 miles from the Marietta Square and only 25 minutes from downtown Atlanta. Located just three miles from I-75, the museum will be a drawing influence for tourism and economic development.

The estimated cost of the 50,000 square foot indoor facility with an additional exterior exhibit area of 100,000 square feet is \$10,000,000. AMMG has more than 100 dedicated volunteers, 3 paid consultants and 2 full-time staff members.






Hangar Talk

A Rusty Tip

Over the years I've stumbled across a couple of trustworthy solutions to two common day-to-day challenges: (1) how to prevent steel (either clean or with existing surface rust) from rusting in environments where paint is inappropriate; (2) how to achieve almost lifetime lubrication of slow moving surfaces with a one-time application of lubricant. These tips are more of use in your shop and home than on your airplane.

Many years ago my wife and I were given a used hand-crank ice cream freezer. The steel tank in which the ice cream is frozen was well plated with tin on the inside but the outside tin plating had succumbed to the abrasion of the ice/salt slurry and was quite rusted over most of its surface. I came upon the idea to heat the steel carefully with a propane torch just hot enough that, when touched with a block of paraffin, the paraffin would run over the surface like a thin solvent penetrating the rust as though the steel had been dipped in mineral spirits. I did that one time about 30 years ago and we have used the freezer a few times each summer since with the surface still waxy with no new rust yet. Having had such success with this little experiment I have taken up the practice of heating any steel item I wish to prevent from rusting (e.g.: screws, bolts, nuts, etc.) and coating it with paraffin. It appears as though the paraffin gets into the pores of the metal while it is hot and, once cooled, prevents water and oxygen from getting to the metal to cause rust.

Many, if not most, of us "more mature" male folks have had the joy of spending some time in one of

the military services. Our dear old Department of Defense has had a penchant for protecting metal items during storage with a sticky grease-based substance commonly called Cosmolene and it's the memory of this which leads me to the second solution. I've run into a number of situations, such as squeaky door hinges, where I wanted to lubricate a slow moving surface pair "once and for all" and not be pestered by having to re-lubricate every so often. I kept remembering that persistent Cosmolene and set about making something like it but more at a lubricant than a surface protector. I put about 1/2 of a measuring cup of molybdenum disulfide general purpose grease into an empty coffee can and add about the same volume of paraffin cut into small pieces. I then heat this until the grease and paraffin have melted. If I take an acid brush (a small brush with a metal handle available at most hardware stores) and paint a small sample of this melted mixture on a room temperature metal surface (to quickly cool the sample) it will form a substance about as hard as the paraffin. To get a mixture which, when cooled in this fashion, is about as soft as smooth peanut butter I add motor oil (30W, 10W-30, whatever's handy) in small amounts, testing between each addition, until I achieve the desired softness when cooled. I store the mixture in the coffee can and leave the acid brush therein with an "X" cut in the plastic lid for the handle. To cure a squeaky door in the house tap out the hinge pins and remove the door, brush a little of the mixture on the hinge surfaces that rub together and all over the pin. Replace the door and tap the pins back into place. Wipe any excess off the outside of the hinge with a rag and you'll never be back to lubricate that door again. And this is just one of hundreds of places I've found this sticky, persistent lubricant to be handy.

A Brief Bio of Robert B. Ormsby

Robert B. Ormsby was born in Winston Salem, North Carolina on August 13, 1924. He graduated from Georgia Institute of Technology in 1945, earning a Bachelor of Science degree in Aeronautical Engineering. In 1954, Mr. Ormsby began working for the Lockheed Georgia Company in Marietta, Georgia. He became President of the Lockheed Georgia Company in 1975 and served in this position until 1984. Mr. Ormsby retired from Lockheed on December 31, 1986.

Mr. Ormsby also served as Chairman of the NASA Aeronautics Advisory Committee from 1984 to 1988. He is a Fellow of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics and a Member of the National Academy of Engineering. Mr. Ormsby is also an inductee into the Georgia Tech College of Engineering Hall of Fame, and a recipient of the Georgia Tech Distinguished Alumnus Award.

Protected by C.O.P.S.

The Gwinnett County Police Department Crime Prevention Unit's mission is two fold: to promote citizen participation in the reduction and prevention of crime through education and active support as well as to provide educational and safety related programs based on community needs.

The Crime Prevention Unit accomplishes its mission through the development and presentation of various programs in response to the changing needs of the county, as well as maintaining established prevention, safety, and educational programs. The unit works with patrol and investigative personnel to assist with special programs and to address community concerns. Crime prevention duties include speaking to various groups on crime prevention methods, distributing crime prevention literature, staffing information booths, alerting victims on how to best avoid future victimization, developing crime prevention materials for use by the media, and developing or maintaining liaisons within neighborhood Community Oriented Policing Services (C.O.P.S.) groups. The program will be adapted to suit the needs of the LZU airport tenants as opposed to the residential communities usually involved.

The C.O.P.S. program requires five meetings over approximately one year's time. The meetings are as follows:

- 1). Introduction -- 75% of all homes in the neighborhood must participate in this initial meeting. The introduction explains the cops program and the benefits. This meeting was held in the Chapter Hangar
- 2). Liaison/Block captain orientation and Lock and Alarm -- all leaders learn their roles in the cops program as well as a thorough review of safety tips for better security.
- 3). Program of your choice -- see below
- 4). Program of your choice (see below) and a graduation ceremony.

Program topics include:

- * Senior Citizen Safety
- * Consumer Fraud & Scams
- * Safe Driving in Gwinnett * Firearm Safety for Adults
- * Robbery / Shoplifting Prevention

The goal of C.O.P.S. is to enhance the quality of community life in Gwinnett County through the establishment of an active partnership between residents and police.Active involvement by citizens... serves to deter and reduce crime.

C.O.P.S. is a CRIME PREVENTION Program that teaches citizens techniques to reduce the risk of being victimized. It trains citizens on the importance of recognizing suspicious activities and how to report them. C.O.P.S. is a cohesive body of concerned citizens addressing issues that are of importance to the entire community.

C.O.P.S. is not a vigilante force. It is not a program designed for participants to take personal risks to prevent or intervene in crime. Nor is it a 100% guarantee that crime will not occur in your neighborhood.

Minimum Standards for Airport Aeronautical Activities at Gwinnett County Airport

MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR AIRPORT AERONAUTICAL ACTIVITIES

As you may already be aware, Gwinnett County Airport is in the process of updating the Airport's Minimum Standards for Airport Aeronautical Activities (minimum standards). The minimum standards apply to anyone desiring to conduct commercial aeronautical activities at the airport, and they set forth the threshold minimum requirements someone must meet to provide commercial aeronautical services to the public.

If you have an existing business on the airport, or if you intend to start conducting commercial services at the airport, the minimum standards document is very important to you. That is why the Airport Authority's Minimum Standards Review Committee and airport staff will be conducting a meeting to review the new draft minimum standards document.

This is your opportunity to give input on what you like, what you don't like, and what you would like to see changed in the document. Please come prepared to share any ideas you have about improving the draft document. Attached are copies of the draft minimum standards and a summary of the changes made to the document compared to the current minimum standards.

Excerpts from "Changes Summary" for the Above Minimum Standards

- 1. Table of Contents: Updated to reflect new content.
- 2. Introduction: Wording slightly modified to reflect industry models.
- 3. Definitions: This section was added to provide clarification to the standards.
- 4. General Conditions:

A)Removed references to permits.


B)Changed insurance language to reflect lease language and standards given to airport by County's Risk Management Division.

C)Added reference to Letter of Authorization (see Flight School changes)

- 5. Aircraft 5. Aircraft Charter: Added requirement that an employee (see definitions) conduct office hours.
- 6. Aircraft Rental: Added requirement that an employee (see definitions) conduct office hours.
- Aircraft Sales: Added requirement that an employee (see definitions) conduct office hours.
- 8. Airframe & Powerplant:

A)Added requirement that an employee (see definitions)

- B)Lowered hangar space requirement from 10,000 to 8,000 to reflect existing conditions.
- C)Lowered building space requirement from 12,000 to 10,000 to reflect existing conditions.
- 9. Corporate Hangars: Removed this section from the minimum standards. Current standards say the requirements will be negotiated and approved by the Authority. Since this is not a "standard" to be specifically met, it was removed.
- 11. Flight Training: Divided flight training into two separate categories. One category is unlimited training with a specific set of requirements to be met, and associated privileges of operating under those conditions. Other category is limited training with less stringent requirements, and also less privileges.
- **14. Miscellaneous Ops:** Added section dealing with miscellaneous operators.
- **17. Adoption of Min Stds:** Changed names to reflect current Authority officers.
- 20. Attachment 3: Added attachment 3 to specifically delineate what is preventative maintenance and does not require compliance with standards, versus what is not preventative maintenance and requires compliance with airframe and powerplant standards.




