Flying to Oshkosh This Year? You'll Want to See This

June 26, 2003 - (From www.eaa.org) Whether flying into EAA AirVenture Oshkosh for the first, fifth, or fifteenth time, pilots who plan to land at Wittman Regional Airport (OSH) for the annual convention will benefit from a new area on the EAA AirVenture website, "Understanding Air Traffic Control at EAA AirVenture Oshkosh" - www.airventure.org/atc

This collaborative effort of the EAA web development team and veteran FAA Oshkosh Air Traffic Controllers (ATC) gives pilots a better under standing of the unique procedures in place for EAA AirVenture. ATC veterans, all of whom are volunteers, call EAA AirVenture "the Super Bowl of air traffic control" and for good reason: More that 10,000 airplanes of all kinds fly into the convention from all over the country, even the world. Their safe, coordinated operation is priority one and well-informed, alert pilots make everyone's job easier.

EAA Efforts Help Thwart Potential Demilitarization Legislation in May

June 27, 2003 - Some news reports appeared earlier this week erroneously warning that demilitarization language was included in Department of Defense Fiscal Year 2004 authorization bills pending in the U.S. Congress, threatening privately held military surplus equipment including historic warbird aircraft. While the Bush Administration demilitarization language in the original legislative proposals, exhaustive efforts by EAA and EAA's Warbirds of America Division helped eliminate it from both the House and Senate versions of the bill as they went from their respective committees to the floor. EAA reported this victory in a May 16 news

release and we feel that the threat-for now-has been successfully removed. However, it is likely that the White House will continue to reintroduce similar demilitarization proposals in future defense funding bills.

EAA and Warbirds of America remain in regular contact with senior House and Senate Armed Services Committee staff and have committed to meet with committee counsels to develop acceptable legislative solutions that will protect historic aircraft from future demilitarization legislation.



Track Presidential TFRs With New EAA Fight Planner Feature

June 26, 2003 - EAA and AeroPlanner.com have launched a new service to make it easier for any pilot to keep track of the latest temporary flight

restrictions (TFRs) created by the United States Secret Service for President Bush's travels around the nation. This valuable resource arrives just as the frequency of TFRs is on the rise with the approaching 2004 presidential campaign. To view active and/or announced NOTAMs for presidential TFRs simply click on the presidential seal graphic located along the left side of the EAA home page. Also included are several graphical view and print options to choose from. (In the event of late-breaking changes, pilots should continue to contact Flight Service to obtain the very latest information before taking off.)

EAA Distributes Special EAA Chapter Edition of Airport Watch Video

June 25, 2003 - General aviation airport security gets a boost this week when EAA Chapter presidents receive their complimentary copy of the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association's Airport Watch - EAA Chapters Edition.

Copies of the video, which feature a joint introduction from EAA President Tom Poberezny and AOPA President Phil Boyer, show how we all can become more vigilant and aware of suspicious activity to enhance security at local airports.

EAA Chapter 690 Meeting Minutes - June 13, 2003

Chapter President Duane Huff called the meeting to order with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag. Members and guests were asked to introduce themselves.

Debi Huffman, chapter Vice President, announced that the postmaster would be selling the Wright Flyer postage stamps at PDK on Good Neighbor Day. Duane thanked Bill Ferguson for the landscape work he did at the hangar this week.

Debi reported on Laura Bishop's Wild Blue Wonders group, who won the regional competition. (Please see story on Page 12 of this NavCom.)

Duane gave a progress report on the New Standard Wing reconstruction. It will soon be ready for inspection, then covering.

Last month's minutes were approved as published in the NavCom.

Duane gave the Treasure's report in Mike Stewart's absence. The report was accepted.

Lee Craymer, Board of Trustee's (BOT) Chairman, reported that the Board had recommended the purchase of a Tig Welder and cart for \$1200. They recommended the installation of a water line to the front of the hangar, to avoid another flood. The water could only be turned on from inside the hangar and will have a timer. The installation of an airline from the compressor for use by chapter members was also recommended. David Posey will prepare the drawings. The final recommendation from the BOT was to replace the faucet in the kitchen with a pull-out spigot. The Board of Directors accepted all of the BOT recommendations.

There will be a GAFI committee meeting on July 12th. It is scheduled for 11 a.m., after the morning's Young Eagle flights.

Membership Chairman Lee Craymer said that we are creeping up on 200 members, including 26 brand new members. In 2002 we had 211 members at the end of the year.

Chapter 690 Proudly Nominates Duane Huff for EAA Major Achievement Award

It was with great pride that we nominated Chapter 690 President Duane Huff for the EAA's Major Achievement Award. At the request of the Board of Directors and Board of Trustees, previous winner Frank Wilcox, with the able assistance of his wife Margaret, completed the forms. Frank asked several people to write letters explaining why they thought Duane deserved the honor, organized the submission, and sent the package off to Oshkosh with high hopes.

Airport Manager Matt Smith wrote about how important the airport tours for youth groups have become, and

how much he appreciated Duane's efforts there. Wayne Whitaker, a longtime chapter member, was able to write about Duane's many efforts in support of aviation through the years. Chapter Treasurer and BOD Chairman Mike Stewart wrote about how important Duane's work is to the success of our chapter. And I was asked to write a supporting letter also.

I am including excerpts from my letter (I had to work hard to keep it to only 1 1/2 pages) so that you can see just some of why we nominated Duane, and why he was chosen to receive the honor.

Judging Panel for Major Achievement Award C/o EAA Chapter Office Oshkosh, Wisconsin 54903

Dear Panel:

As the Chapter 690 newsletter editor, AeroShoppe manager and past officer and Board member, I have been asked to write a letter explaining why the Board and Trustees of Chapter 690 are honored to nominate Duane Huff for the 2003 EAA Major Achievement Award.

Duane is the proud owner and pilot of a meticulously restored Aeronca Chief, which has won numerous prestigious awards - at AirVenture in Oshkosh, at Sun 'n Fun in Lakeland, and most recently at SERFI (the Southeastern Regional Fly-In) in Evergreen, Alabama. He was one of the people who promoted our chapter's participation as a sponsor of this annual regional fly-in, and this year is the first in which we will participate in that manner.

Duane is one of the most enthusiastic supporters of EAA, Chapter 690 and general aviation that I know. He has served our chapter as a diligent volunteer, board member and officer. He is in the 2nd year of his second two year term as president of our chapter. He has held numerous chairmanships including coordinating our Young Eagle's program. He personally has flown over 200 Young Eagles "one at a time" in his chief. He has arranged for many of the groups who have participated in Young Eagles, including a special group of visually impaired youngsters. He often takes groups of youths on airport tours.

Active with our chapter's "Flying Start" seminars, Duane was a staunch advocate of the tuition free 12 week long ground schools which the chapter hosted in our hangar for several years (until computerization made the class obsolete). Last year he was instrumental in starting a "Friendship Flights" program in which chapter pilots come early or stay late at chapter functions to give flights to chapter members (and their family members) who currently don't have planes of their own to fly, or to give them a chance to experience flight in a different plane than they usually fly.

Duane has been one of the key chapter members involved with promoting general aviation among the youth in our area. He chairs the committee which solicits applications for our chapter's scholarships to the EAA Air Academy and he is one of the "judges" who selects the recipients from amongst the candidates. This is the third summer that our chapter will be sending students to the Academy. He is also promoting the possibility of our chapter's holding a local aviation day camp next summer, or some other educational program for area youths. At Duane's suggestion we have just started a new project through which members will not discard their aviation magazines, but will instead donate them to schools, libraries, doctors offices and commercial establishments with waiting areas. The magazines will have a sticker identifying the Chapter as the donor, with contact information included.

Duane's positive attitude, willingness to "pitch in" wherever needed and promotion of general aviation have attracted many new members to our chapter, which we are proud to say is a very active group of aviators and aviation enthusiasts. He always does his best to greet guests and to make them welcome at chapter events.

I can hardly think of a chapter activity in which Duane does not willingly participate - from our monthly "First Saturday" pancake breakfasts and aviation programs (or activities), to the fly-ins, hangar dances, hosting of the B-17 and technical seminars. He is a valued volunteer in support of the Georgia Wings Weekend, a program sponsored by the FAA to promote aviation safety. Duane and several of the other Technical Counselors were instrumental in organizing the chapter's rebuilding of one of the wings of Old Rhinebeck's New Standard Bi-Plane, a project which is making good progress.

Chapter 690 has recognized Duane's contributions by selecting him for our "Outstanding Member" award in 1995 and again in 2001 as part of our "Over the Hill Gang." They are a group of dedicated retirees who give tirelessly of their time to support the chapter's activities. In 2001 it was largely through the efforts of the "Gang" that the interior construction of the chapter's mezzanine (housing the pilot's lounge, a library, and an office) was substantially completed, along with the remodeling of the kitchen and laying out of the new workshop.

The Board of Chapter 690 believes that Duane's dedication to promoting general aviation and the EAA make him worthy of the EAA Major Achievement Award. We hope that you will grant him this recognition that we believe he truly deserves.

MEIGS PREPARING SUPREME COURT APPEAL

June 16, 2003 - The Friends of Meigs Field (FOM) revealed Monday that it will appeal to the Illinois Supreme Court to halt any further destruction of the lakefront airport by the City of Chicago, and that it is actively seeking contributions for that effort.

On Monday, June 2, after Meigs' backers lost both their temporary restraining order preventing further airport destruction as well as inclusion in the state legislature's O'Hare expansion bill, a dejected FOM Founder and Chairman Steve Whitney dismissed reports that they would take the case to the Supreme Court. He cited high legal bills and slim chances for success. Several factors have led Meigs' backers to believe they still have a shot, however small, to resuscitate the "coolest little airport on the planet."

For one, FOM is bolstered by a recent poll published in the Chicago Tribune, indicating considerable public displeasure (65-24 percent) with Chicago Mayor Richard Daley's March 31 demolition of the airport under cover of darkness. The poll also found that seven out of 10 voters didn't believe Daley's claim that the airport presented a terrorist threat to the downtown.

FOM President Rachel Goodstein wrote in an enewsletter sent today (June 16): "If we let Meigs Field close, no airport in America is really safe. Anti-airport groups are watching what happens," She puts the estimated cost of a Supreme Court appeal at about \$100,000. "Please help us in this fight for aviation so we can all say that in this year of the Centennial of Flight together we won and saved Meigs Field!" she said.

EAA continues to support the grass-roots efforts of the Friends of Meigs and was a co-signor of a recent open letter to the Board of the Chicago Park District published in the Chicago Sun-Times on June 11 titled, "Keep an Open Mind About Meigs." The letter, also signed by the National Air Transportation Association (NATA); the Illinois Association of Air and Critical Care Transport; the National Business Aviation Association (NBAA); stated, "Closing Meigs Field harms our nation's aviation system in many ways, and preserving it can offer as much or more to the Chicago Park District and its users as an expensive and inaccessible park can."

The Supreme Court appeal will seek to get one of the four justices to order the case back to the state appeals court, where Meigs' backers would ask for a reinstatement of the TRO and a faster appeal process.

"Public support is in our favor," Goodstein said referring to the Tribune's scientific poll.

EAA Chapter 690 Meeting Minutes - June 13, 2003 (Continued)

NavCom editor Lnor Levine announced that the deadline for the July issue is June 20th. Mugs, calendars, oil analysis kits, signed books and other merchandise is for sale in the AeroShoppe. We will have hats with the chapter logo in stock soon.

Joel Levine reported that we need volunteer washers for the Annual Airplane Wash on July 5th. No planes have had wash reservations yet. We set a new chapter record for number of planes washed last year. Wearing his Publicity Chairman's hat, Joel said that Xerox had printed the new Pancake Breakfast schedules, and asked for help in posting them. The GAFI posters will need to go up in July and August, as will posters for the annual Hangar Dance. Joel announced that the chapter has a new Amateur Radio license for when we set up a special events station - W4LZU.

Paul Poberezny, EAA founder, will participate in Georgia's Centennial of Flight celebration. He will present a program on August 15th at the Fernbank Science Center. Paul will be joined by our chapter's most recent Air Academy scholarship winners. We hope to have a large turn-out of EAA members to welcome Paul south. On Saturday, August 16th, Paul will attend a Young Eagle rally at Fulton County Airport. Debi said that the Centennial committee is hoping to raise \$100,000 to give 100 \$1,000 scholarships for aviation camps, flight schools, etc. She had some P-38 watch raffle tickets available for \$1 each that can be purchased during the break this evening.

Tomorrow is PDK's annual Good Neighbor Day - from noon until 5 P.m. Chapter members Phil Harcourt and Larry King will be flying in the Airshow, as will Pat Epps.

Duane reminded everyone that Young Eagle flights are scheduled for tomorrow morning, weather permitting. There is a clipboard on the side of the Bulletin Board for people to sign up for participation at SERFI. The annual Post Oshkosh Bash will be Saturday, August 9th, with Friendship Flights at 2 p.m., dinner at 5 p.m.

Hangar Dance co-chairman Dave Ostergaard said that he and Jeannie and Duane & Tess Huff had attended the Confederate Air Force's (CAF) Hangar Dance as guests. They held a Silent Auction at the same event, earned more from that than from the dance itself. People who donated items for the auction were indicated on the items. This would require more room, and the Zorgers are willing to let us use the larger hangar, move the dance ball, and then we could partition off an area for the silent auction. The CAF had sponsors underwrite expenses. A Bulletin Board acknowledged sponsors. and there was a program that recognized them. Dave would like to approach soft drink companies to donate beverages for the evening. They also held a raffle that evening, but in discussion our members felt that a raffle would detract from the ambience of our event, and would be better if held at GAFI. We don't want too much else going on the evening of the dance. The CAF event was well attended, caters to a different crowd. We had lower than usual attendance last year due to competition with a major dance event the same evening, which cut into our proceeds. We sold about 130 tickets and made a profit of approximately \$800 - \$900. We scheduled around that dance event this year. Dave also noted that the CAF offered dance instruction the same evening as the dance, instead of in the weeks preceeding the event, which may help with attendance at the lessons.

Debi announced that Dr. John Carr would discuss aviation medicals at the next meeting.

There was no Old Business.

In New Business, Dave Ostergaard made a motion to incorporate a silent auction into our event. The motion was seconded and discussions were held. Chuck Roberts noted that there was no financial or physical risk in doing this, and everything to gain. Jim Sinke wondered about the price range of the items. Most were valued at \$25 and up. We could also do a live auction of some items, but that would probably detract from the cabaret atmosphere at our dance. The motion was passed, and thanks were given to Dave and Lee Olson for the planning they have already done for this year's dance.

Duane reminded us that we have labels available to put on our "old" aviation magazines. The labels "advertise" EAA 690, and the periodicals can then be placed in professional offices, FBO's and schools.

The meeting was adjourned for a refreshment break prior to the program. The presentation was by Ted Rabenko, about his recent Alaska trip.





The EAA's Wild Blue Wonders program has proven to be a very popular and effective way for middle school students to learn about science, math, and technology. After completing the curriculum, the teams can elect to enter a competition against the other teams in their region.

Each Regional Champion, along with their advisors and the Regional coordinator, wins a trip to Oshkosh for the National Championships at EAA AirVenture. The 2003 National Champions win a trip to the Centennial of Flight Celebration in Kitty Hawk, NC in December. Both of these trips are paid for through support from the Ford Motor Company!

Chapter 690 member Larry Bishop's wife Laura was one of the advisors of the Wild Blue Wonders group who won the regional competition. The participating 6th, 7th & 8th graders from Gwinnett's Alton Crews Middle School learned aviation skills and aviation history. They performed an original skit about the P-38, demonstrated flight planning, and kept a log book. The group may want some help to improve the spiral flight of their models prior to the national competition in Oshkosh. They will compete against 7 other teams from around the US on Friday, August 1st during AirVenture.
