Time flies when you're having fun, they say, but when we look at our hangar project, time is flying and we aren't having much fun!! The goal of holding our Holiday Party in our new home will not be achieved. The efforts by chapter members and individual hangar owners to vigorously push forward where possible have not been matched by the contractor's construction personnel. Very serious discussions with the contractor are underway to correct this situation.

Completed since the November report:

 Connect sewer from test manhole to county main. Sewer line is now complete from each building to the county main.
 Asphalt aprons joining hangar floors to ramp

(hangars 1-5).

3. Restrooms framed (except hangar 4, which is an exception to building permit).

Rough plumbing installed (except in 4).

Partially completed:

1. Installation of bifold doors (operation is adjusted and skin is on three doors).

Installation of trim eaves and downspouts (completed except near front on sides of all hangars).

3. Installation of electrical systems (meter bases and circuit panels completed on all hangars; internal wiring started on four buildings).

4. Siding on front of each building (hangar 1 complete except trim; other awaiting completion of bifold doors).

Yet to be started:

1. Installation of water service from county main to each building (as weather permits).

2. Securing of Certificate of Development Conformance from the county.

Our dealings with the building contractor have been very disappointing as mentioned above, but the asphalt contractor was just the opposite. Not only did he voluntarily lower his original estimated price, but he started work on schedule and continued to work hard. This difficult job was completed in less than two days. The tapered slope required for hangars 1-5 turned out just as planned.

The light at the end of the tunnel is still there but progress is less than expected. When the problems with the building construction contractor are resolved, we should be very near completion—maybe by year's end. All members are encouraged to stop by and see the progress. Volunteers are needed the next few Saturday mornings to help with the electrical system installation and general clean up. Contact Frank Wilcox (770-978-2403) for further information.

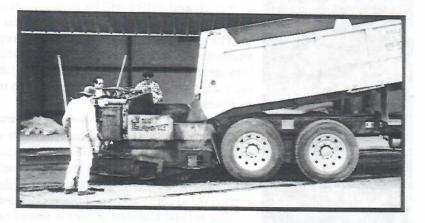
An urgent call from Charlie "See-Him-GO" Sego this past Monday morning: Could I come to the hangar project with some others to do manual labor?

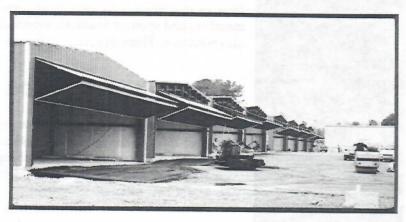

BIOGRAPHY

Sam Lyons, Jr. is a native and resident of Atlanta, GA. His interest in aviation was prompted at an early age by his father, who was a B-24 pilot during WW II.

Upon graduation from Presbyterian College with a degree in biology, Sam served two years as an officer in the Chemical Corps and after his release he began teaching at his alma mater, Woodward Academy (Georgia Military Academy).

His early interest in aviation led him into modeling when he was very young. Later, his interest turned to more detailed efforts and eventually custom work. He owned a hobby shop, Historical Hobbies, in Atlanta for ten years. He won many national modeling awards over the years and is well respected in hobby ist circles. Sam currently serves as judge in national competition for the International Plastic Modelers Society, of which he is a member. Throughout these years Sam always had a fascination for art. In the fall of 1985 he decided to close his hobby shop and pursue his dream of becoming a full time artist and since this time Sam has developed his own unique super realistic style, which he continues to perfect daily.

Through the Air Force Art Program, Sam's painting, LEAD SOLO, graces the Air Force Art Hall in the Pentagon. Other prints and paintings can be found at military bases, museums, and gift shops throughout the country, Canada, Great Britain and Europe, including the Blue Angels' headquarters, the Smithsonian Air & Space Museum, the Air Force Museum, the Naval Aviation Museum, the Royal Air Force Museum and Disney. His paintings have graced the covers of numerous magazines and catalogs, including Porsche Panorama, Sunshine Artists, Western Flyer, Pacific Flyer, Georgia Sports Hall of Fame, Aviation Heritage. Great Battles. World War II, Antique Atrolane, Aviation Art. Ag Pilot. Wright Brothers. Sporty's, Aviation, and Airline Supply. He has produced works of art for Barron Hilton of the Hilton Corp., Brig. Gen. C. W. Taylor, Dobbins AFB, the Blue Angels, the U. S. Army, the U. S. Parks Dept., The Sportsman's Market (Sporty's Pilot Shop), AT&T, Bell South, Lockheed Aeronautical Systems, as well as many other corporations, institutions and collectors from all over the world. His memberships include the American Society of Aviation Artists, of which he has served two years as secretary; the Air Force Art Program, that has several of his paintings in their collection; the EAA; Warbirds of America; the Society of Illustrators; the 8th Air Force Historical Society; and the Atlanta Artists' Club. Often he is requested to exhibit his work and be guest speaker at club meetings, dinners, forums and prestigious functions that include the presence of military personnel and dignitaries from all over the world.

Many of his paintings have been juried into national and international shows, including 'The Best of Aviation Art' exhibition at the Air Force Museum, the Colorado Springs ASAA Aviation Art exhibit, the 1990 and 1991 Aviation Art Shows at Champlin Fighter Museum in Mesa, AZ, the RAF Museum's 'A Grand Alliance' exhibit in England, the Midway Commemorative Exhibition at the Virginia Air & Space Center in Hampton, VA, the EAA Sport Aviation Art Competition in Oshkosh, WI, and the Southern Bell headquarters in Atlanta. Several of his works are featured in the ASAA's "coffee table" book titled, Aviation, A History through Art, and published by Howell Press.

Sam enjoys soaring and obtained his sail plane license while in college. Today, he still loves flying and has flown with Air Force pilots dog-fighting in the F-15 Eagle, flown in the F-16 Falcon and with the Navy in the Blue Angels' F-18 Hornet. He continues to get in as much second seat time as he can in aircraft including; the Piper Cub, Tiger Moth, Stearman, L-5, L-19, T-6, T-28, T-34, P-51, T-37, and the B-25.

His other interests include jogging, sailing and SCUBA diving as an assistant instructor with PADI.
