RUST PREVENTATIVE

A special product by the name of Ospho, which forms iron phosphate and sulphate on the surface of iron, inhibits oxidation when used before painting. It is water soluble and can be brushed or sprayed on. It is not useable for magnesium, and does have to be degreased before application with mineral spirits. gallon is \$12.00 plus shipping and handling, and a case of 4 gallons is \$47.00 shipping, available from B. Flying (Filing) Direct

Many pilots who are operating Loran C that allow them to navigate directly to their destination or arrival fix are not filing to that fix (or are using unnecessary intermediate fixes enroute) because they are unaware of their ability to do so.

Generally, one can file direct to any fix within a given ATC Center's airspace and to many fixes with approximately 200 miles outside of that airspace. These fix locations are stored in each ATC Center computer's memory. However, fixes beyond 200 miles of the Departure Center's boundary are not stored, and that Center will not clear you direct to these points because they have no way determining your projected flight path through their airspace while enroute to your destination.

The "trick" is to (when going outside your departure Center's airspace) file direct to coordinates. Not all personnel are aware of ability to do this or the specific format used to enter your flight plan in the ATCC computer. The format is very specific. Tenths of minutes are not use, not are latitude longitude symbols. Thus, N38-56.1 W090-38.7 becomes 3857/09039. These numbers. when entered by FSS personnel, must be preceded and followed by two periods.


She will speak on new FAA enforcement procedures.
