

Progress continued on the Ultra-Lite Pietenpol, R.C. Modeling and BD-6 projects in September. We've had steady youth participation as projects are still limited by mentor participation. We have not been able to work on the full size Pietenpol.

Work on the Ultra-Piet wing continues. Fabric is on and shrunk and Poly-Brush applied. It is moving along quite nicely under the tutelage of Duane Huff and Joel Levine with other mentors assisting.

Work on the BD-6 continued in September Andrew Robinson continues to lead with assistance from other mentors. Work has focused on the horizontal stabilizer and control surface. Work has continued on the R.C. Modeling project. The group is completing the second trainer kit that we purchased in the beginning of the R.C. Modeling program. Once that kit is completed work will begin on the 1/3 scale Piper Cub.

We do have two of our youth flying with AeroVentures. Ben Quick and Alex Straka have been flying since the resumption of the program. Alex Straka is waiting on good weather and scheduling to complete his dual cross country. Ben soloed on September 6th and is over 20 hours now (see page 11).

I currently have eight on our waiting list and need to stop taking new names for now. We do need more mentors to assist. The more mentors we have the less each mentor has to work and we don't burn anyone out. Lynn Zahner joined the mentor team this month and we are pleased to have her. I am waiting on things to settle out some before add new youth to the program.

Considering the current situation, the build programs have moved along quite well. The R/C group is covering the second trainer. Several of the guys have visited the Stone Mountain R/C Field (the old Stone mountain Airport) for some "stick" time under the guidance of Youth Mentor Ken Lightner. Two transmitters are joined either with a cable or RF link allowing either pilot to control the aircraft with the instructor having the over ride.

The BD-6 group with Andrew Robinson at the helm is making progress producing the fittings and control system for the stabilator.

The UltraPiet covering is moving along at a rapid pace. The top and bottom fabric has been attached and shrunk at the medium temperature with the final temperature yet to go. Once that is complete the tapes will be applied to the ribs and the rib lacing will begin. Even though only one wing will be covered, the decision was made perform the entire process to give everyone the experience. Many thanks to Duane Huff for bringing his expertise to covering process.

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Runway Camera Live on the Chapter Web Site

The runway camera project started a few years ago, probably during a decorating party for a Christmas or dinner event. It was noted that the camera housing on the corner of the chapter hangar had been there for many years, but there was no actual "camera" in it. I put together some parts I had laying round from other projects and came up with a new camera to put on the side of the hangar.

I figured it was best to point the camera out toward the runway to give an onsite view of the weather conditions for Young Eagle rally purposes. It seems that every Young Eagle rally is plagued with poor weather, and even the weather observations provided in the LZU METAR hasn't been all that helpful.

Now, for any pilots who wish to make LZU their destination, they can simply go to our website (<u>eaa690.org</u>), navigate to the "Runway Cam" page and see what the conditions are for themselves.

The technical bits (for those wanting to know all the details)...

The new camera doesn't have any moving parts, so it has the advantage of being fairly low maintenance, but at the same time is a bit limited in what you can see. The component parts are a Raspberry Pi 3B with a Pi Camera connected to it. A Cat 5 networking cable has been run from the sound system area to the camera with a power over Ethernet injector and splitter supplying power via the network cable. The Raspberry Pi is connected to the chapter's WiFi network, and does all of its communication with the internet via the WiFi connection.

The camera is capable of taking up to 4k resolution images. It is setup to take a picture every 5 minutes. It also takes advantage of the webservice (<u>https://aerie.starfireaviation.com/swagger-ui.html</u>) being used to drive the LED lights on the NeoSectional project Rich, Louis, and I recently completed. Then it overlays the current METAR on top of the image captured, and publishes the picture to an Instagram account (<u>https://www.instagram.com/lzueaa690runwaywebcam</u>). The chapter's website is setup to show pictures from the Instagram account.

I hope everyone finds the images of the runway useful!

RV-12 Update

We have researched engines, and are looking to place an order next week. Probably 6-8 weeks to receive engine & mount. Going with UL Power fuel injected, either 118 or 130hp. Took a demo flight in RV-12 with the 130 which flew great, and have been in conversations with a fellow who is very satisfied after 500+ hours in that same combo. Some people are skeptical about going non-Rotax in the 12, or even switching from ULS to iS. Pretty sure we know what it takes, and it's pretty clean and straight forward - not too scary. Cowl mods will probably be the biggest task. But come on, it's we're in the EXPERIMENTAL Aircraft Association !

Put out a Slack feeler for leads on Skyview/G3X equipped planes locally but didn't get any feedback. However, Dakoda generously showed us around the G3 equipped YAK he and his wife are working on in Griffin. Week before last we had a similarly long, pleasant, and instructive visit with Clyde Schnars in Jasper who gave us a tour of his spiffy new Dynon powered RV-12.

We've done a detailed panel design (10" & 7-8" EFIS + iPad) so the capabilities are set. A simple full-size mockup will allow us to tweak locations of some items for ergonomics & visibility. There's a built in growth path to go full GPS/ILS/VOR IFR if we want (i.e. Johnny's goes for his PPL, or we get additional partners looking for IFR). The accompanying image shows current plans, including some items that could be added later like a 175 navigator. The touch pad at low center is custom unit that handles things like electronic circuit breakers, system monitoring, data logging, and security.



Covid killed the airshow/shopping season, so Larry's going up to Michigan end of Aug to check out GRT and MGL avionics firsthand before we put down \$\$\$. Still considering Dynon. We'll start cutting and wiring the panel once we finalize vendors, diagram all connections, and know exact dimensions.

Recently Justin Muscheru came out to the Stone Mountain Radio Control Flyer's flying site (the old Stone Mountain Airport) for some hands on flying experience. Justin was here with club instructor and Chapter 690 Mentor Ken Lightner doing some pattern work. Instruction is given using two transmitters bound either electronically with a cable or with an RF connection allowing the student full control of the model yet if in trouble the instructor with the release of a button can assume control. Gaining muscle memory to react while standing on the ground takes some time and practice. Two points to think about 1) when the model come toward you the controls are reversed and 2) when inverted down is up and up can be expensive. The Chapter has a great computer simulator for anyone with an interest in getting started in a great hobby!
