

Flying Start-Learning to Fly

EAA Chapter 690 hosted the Flying Start-Learning to Fly seminar on Saturday, June 28, 1997 at Gwinnett County's Briscoe Field. As part of the national "Flying Start" program, ours was the ninth seminar in the country since its premiere at Sun n Fun and the first in Georgia. As with any undertaking, many chapter members helped with the planning, organization and publicity, and then helped with the final preparation. Joel Levine and Duane Huff swept and washed the chapter hangar floor. Barney Barnes prepared the auto parking signs.

Duane Huff and Sue Adams stuffed Trade-a-Plane bags which were distributed to the pilot wannabes. All participants received a Trade-a-Plane Magazine, donated by Steve Champness, National Sales Representative from Trade-a-Plane Magazine, a copy of The Controller, EAA membership information, and the Dream Flight Certificate. The volunteers set up chairs, display tables, additional Flying Start promotional decorations, audio and video equipment.

The next morning the static display aircraft representing a vast spectrum of general aviation, was in place. This included Duane huff's Aeronica Chief(1995 EAA Oshkosh "Best in Class" and 1996 EAA Sun n Fun "1944-1955 Classic Grand Champion" award winner), Lynn Zahner's Cherokee, Sue Adam's Arrow 200, and a Terry Adam's 1945 SNJ-6 (1989 EAA Oshkosh Best SNJ award winner). Others on the ramp included Joel Levine's Musketeer, Steve Ashby's 172, Greg Jannako's Aircoupe, Leonard Pace's twin Comanche, and many more. Our guests even had the opportunity to see Bob Goodman working on his RV4, and in the other open hangars of EAA Sports Aviation Center they could view the Atlantis (designed, built and owned by Fred Meyer), a Citabria owned by Elgin Wells, a Pitts Special owned by Phil Harcourt, a Lancair owned by Jim Walsh/Phil Harcourt and a Technoavia SPX95 aerobatic plane owned by Leonard Pace.

The morning started with complementary coffee and donuts donated by The Flight School of Gwinnett and Insuramerica's, Terry Britt. The seminar started promptly by emcee Jim Garner to an audience of 85 comfortably seated in the chapter hangar. Encouraging and explanatory words were spoken by knowledgeable participants such as: Leonard Pace, on air work. Lanny Pruchnicki, on ground school, then again on Flight Schools. President Duane Huff related the joys of flying the Chief all over the eastern U.S., and explained that the Experimental Aircraft Association isn't an exclusive club for jet jocks and astronauts. As he pointed out, our row of hangars, aptly named the Sport Aviation Center, contains examples of just about every type of personal flying available to fly.

Minutes of EAA Chapter 690 July meeting Wayne Whitaker, Secretary

Chapter President Duane Huff recognized Vice President David Posey's contribution of wooden cabinets, which will be used to hold the chapter video library. Duane suggested that the cabinets should be mounted on casters for easy transport about the hangar.

Fall Biplane Classic discussed. Suggestion was made that the event should be renamed "Antique Classic" for greater appeal and attendance. Another member said the addition of radio control scale models might generate even greater appeal to general public. President Huff deferred both comments to the Biplane Fall Classic committee.

Treasurer's report: \$4,239.25 received into the regular account in June, including a check for \$2,711 that represents 690's share of the B-17 visit. Expenses in June totalled \$711.06. Total in regular account now \$12,265.55. This does not include money received for property taxes, which was collected from the various hangar owners. Chapter 690's hangar account has been officially closed. Treasurer states that current paid membership is 105, including 91 members and 14 spouses. There are 42 non-paid members.

Jeff Boatright has officially retired as editor of 690's award-winning newsletter, the NavCom. Joe Reed will take over editorial duties as of this issue.

Video Custodian Barney Barnes reported on videos now kept in new cabinetry, and explained the checkout procedure, which is simply filling out a 3x5 card with your name and the date you get your video. Please limit video loans to one month or less.

A covering workshop in the chapter hangar is tentatively scheduled for November. Ron Alexander also plans to offer one of his airplane construction courses in November, also on covering, so we may have to coordinate our workshop with Mr. Alexander.

President Huff noted that the successful Flying Start program of June 28, chapter 690's first foray into Flying Start, introduced 48 wanna-be pilots to the joys of general aviation. The event was videotaped; the tape is available for anyone who wants to view it.

The chapter will hold a Young Eagles rally on July 19, a make-up day for an earlier event that got rained out during the spring monsoons. A plea was made for volunteer ground personnel; 20 to 25 Young Eagles are expected.


Lnor Levine gave a report on the next phase of interior work on the chapter hangar. As a funding method, members can "buy" square feet of the new floor, for \$25 per foot. Several feet have already been purchased. A plaque is planned showing contributors and number of square feet sold.

Joel Levine gave a report on the chapter's successful pancake breakfast and airplane wash. Joel reported that "six and a half" aircraft were washed at \$35 per plane, with some tipping.

A new member reported that the Georgia Institute of Technology plans to enter a cross-country air race, flying from Iceland to Turkey in a fiberglass homebuilt, type undisclosed. The Tech team needs advice in the areas of GPS navigation, moving maps, and general familiarization with procedures (and any red tape) associated with international cross-country flight.

President Huff reminded members that next month, instead of our usual second-Friday meeting, the chapter will hold its annual post-Oshkosh dinner at the hangar on Saturday, August 16. Festivities start at 3 p.m. Please bring a covered dish. Vice President Posey, justly famous for his culinary skills, will deep-fry three turkeys for the event, using a secret family recipe.

Fifty members were in attendance for the July meeting. The program for the evening was a guided tour of the Internet, with a live linkup projected on a screen for easier viewing. Among the featured sites was chapter 690's own Web page, created and maintained by Joe Reed.

As Bill Coleman described the exhilaration he feels as a newly-minted pilot, navigating cross-country and safely negotiating the challenges of the skies, the room got noticeable quieter.

The future pilots seemed to hang on Bill's every word as he spoke of flying his Cessna from Lawrenceville to Lakeland, Florida and back.

The thoughts going through the minds of those who wanted to fly seemed to be, "This isn't Chuck Yeager or some airline captain talking here, this is a guy with a family, a job and a mortgage just like me who decided he wanted to learn to fly. He made it happen, maybe I can too!"

That's exactly the kind of message we need to be sending to the vast crowds of ground-bound aviation enthusiasts out there. And there must be a vast numbers of them: look at the attendance at airshows across the nation.

The spectators lining the catch-fence aren't all pilots, but they must have some interest in airplanes. If we as pilots can encourage them to take that first step and start flying, we can help to reverse the downward spiral that personal aviation is currently suffering.

As part of that encouragement, door prizes awarded to lucky participants included EAA memberships and gift certificates good towards an GA2000 introductory flight.

Questions followed the closing video and all gathered at the display tables that included, Civil Air Patrol, Georgia Tech Flying Club, The Flight School of Gwinnett, our chapter membership and activity information area, Cloud Dancers Publications along with brochures from FAA Flight Safety Program, Young Eagles, Aviation Explorers-Troop 533 Briscoe Field also participated.

Reasons some attended include:

Robert Hogan-"It's always been on my mind, every time I see a biplane go by, or a Cessna, I always say, I've got to do it. It's driving my crazy." This time, at 46, Hogan is serious about getting his pilot's license. And this seminar has helped answer today's questions.

Don Roberts, a homebuilder from Walton County let his pilot's license lapse and hasn't flown regularly in about 15 years. Now that he's more secure and less harried, he's going back to flight school starting with this seminar. He and his wife, Karen, who is also a pilot plan to build their own airplane

"I only have one regret in life," said Roberts, 38. I was recruited to fly fighter jets in the military but decided against it. Now every time I look up and see a fighter, I'm sick inside. I think people look at small planes that way."

Flight by Sunlight...

NASA's Pathfinder aircraft last week set a world record for solar-powered flight. The remotely piloted "flying wing," powered by six solar electric motors, each driving a propeller, reached a record altitude of 67,350 feet over the Hawaiian islands.

The experimental airplane, which took off and landed from the U.S. missile test range at Barking Sands, Kauai, stayed aloft for more than eight hours, relying entirely on the energy generated by photovoltaic cells covering its 98 foot wingspan.

Ultimately, scientists hope it will be able to reach 100,000 feet and cruise there for days at a time, drawing most of its energy from the sun.
