# Space Camp 2000

From January 20 through noon on the 23rd, I and fifteen other CAP members including chapter 690 member, Ron DeWees from GA, FL, AL and MS were treated to a first class aerospace educational experience at the US Space and Rocket Center, the NASA Marshall Space Flight Center and Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, AL.

The activities we enjoyed included a tour of Redstone Arsenal including the early von Braun rocket testing facilities and lectures from NASA engineers on the history of rocketry and space transportation. We also browsed museum displays and viewed the full eclipse of the moon through a totally clear and cold sky from the Von Braun Astronomical Societies observatory grounds atop a nearby

mountain. Then came Space Camp. We saw two IMAX movies, flew two different jet simulators, got a lecture on survival from a special services instructor and had dinner and a slide show with Konrad Dannenberg, one of the original 118 German scientists, who including Von Braun, came to the US after WW II and became the core of our space program. The final exercise was a simulated shuttle mission into orbit for a docking with the space lab and some EVA. Each class member was trained for a specific assignment in either mission control, orbiter crew, lab scientists or mission specialists. After the training, we were then left to conduct the mission ourselves with the help of the mission control computer and then ride the "1/6 gravity" machine, the "5 degrees of freedom" machine and the "spatial disorientation" machine.

There has already been publicity for it, and it has been heavily promoted along with the Wings Weekend. Sue Adams is working night and day to make the Wings Weekend a success. We will be letting her and her crew down if we can't organize the dance. Let me know.

They say that one of the prices of Freedom is to be ever vigilant. The same is true for our field of interest, aviation. The FAA has begun to discuss the future of our aging GA fleet, along with those "orphaned" aircraft. The EAA and the AOPA pointed out that there are no statistics that indicate a problem. While it may be a challenge for some aspects of maintenance, the fleet is in generally good shape, and safe. The FAA indicated that they were "just discussing" the issues. You can be sure that this is the first step and a long and winding road to further regulation.

The current administration has again begun looking (again) at a "Fee Based" ATC system. This would most likely mean privatization of ATC and fees for various services. Canada is currently under such a system. When this topic is discussed, it is made to appear that

we GA pilots are getting a free ride. Things like the Aviation Trust Fund and those pesky fuel taxes seem to be forgotten, except by us when we buy that \$2.40/ gal fuel. Five dollars for a weather brief, \$50 for an IFR flight plan, \$10 for flight following, (plus ten cents for each reported traffic, a quarter if it's a jet).

I made up the numbers, but who knows. Out in California (LA area I think), the last Aerobatic practice box was lost because the County supervisor decided he didn't want it in his county. The FAA gave him the last word. What's my point? We all must keep informed about the happenings in aviation. Not only what we hear during our "Hanger Flying", but just what is going on in our town, our county, and state.

There are a number of aviation news services available on the internet (Avweb.com, AOPA.org, EAA.org, to name a few). Sign up for their news letters. Try to attend the local airport operations meetings. Talk up aviation whenever the opportunity arises. If we just stay focused on our own events and activities, we could find that others will take away the very things we hold dear.

## **Interior Construction Project.**

Following the hiatus for the second ice storm, work on the interior construction project has continued with significant progress. Nearly all of the wall structure has been completed. With Tim Fulmer supervising (and working hard, too), Charlie Sego running the "chop saw" and the rest of the crew assembling, most of the steel studs are now secured in place. These are being covered with sheetrock on one side only. This allows work to continue while leaving an open side for inspection and approval of the structure. The two center columns which support the main beam require two layers of sheet rock to meet the fire code. After approval, the open sides of the wall will be covered and the ceiling under the mezzanine floor will be sheetrocked. There are many sheetrock screws to drive yet. Duane Huff, our "rocking" guru, has started with some preliminary finishing of the joints of the covered walls. No work is scheduled for March 5th because of the Flying Start and Vintage Airplane Fly-In programs. Work will resume on Saturday March 11th and continue most Saturdays starting at 9 A.M. # Air Cadets Present February Program by Margaret Wilcox

The program at the February chapter meeting was presented by the DeKalb county Air Cadet Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol. Substituting for Cdr. Roy Good was Joe Sapp, assisted by EAA member Jim Lyons and four senior cadets. Each cadet described a part of the program in which they are involved such as aircraft pilot training, glider pilot training, computers and emergency search and rescue services. The program was further explained with an informative slide presentation. The Civil Air Patrol is an official auxiliary of the U.S. Air Force and as such receives government funding. There are three types of Civil Air Patrol squadrons.. Senior Squadrons are all adults who volunteer for search and rescue missions. Cadet Squadrons, such as the DeKalb unit, are youth programs. A Composite Squadron, such as the Gwinnett Co unit, includes both adults and youth.

Young people can join the Cadet program as young as 11 and continue until their 18th year. Their training includes Aerospace Education, Cadet Leadership, Physical Fitness, Moral Leadership and Emergency Community Services. A cadet who successfully completes all the requirements on every level is almost guaranteed an appointment to the Air Force Academy. They can obtain more education and experience by joining special interest groups within the squadron such as Space, Military Aviation, Navigation, Soaring, Engineering, Computer Technology, Special Operation such as Navy Seals and Emergency Service and the Cadet Flying Program. Orientation flights and ground school instruction in the flying program are offered at no charge. Flight instruction is offered by leaders who are instructor pilots and the student is charged only for the plane and fuel. The adult leaders who serve in the DeKalb Cadet Squadron are chosen for the skills they can contribute such as pilot instruction. The Squadron owns 2 gliders based at the Monroe airport in which glider pilot training is given. The program includes field trips to special events, sometimes transported in military aircraft. The older cadets are involved in community service projects such as teaching at the Atlanta Science Museum summer program.

# LEADERSHIP WORKSHOPS HELP CHAPTERS FORGE A SOLID FUTURE

The Experimental Aircraft Association has always been more than just a bunch of guys getting together and talking about airplanes.

In some ways it's an almost evangelical group that spreads the word about recreational aviation among themselves and non-members. By uniting diverse interests ranging from homebuilts to warbirds, it becomes an umbrella organization that shares its gathered knowledge in an effort to improve the aviation community.

But EAA depends on its Chapters to remain strong, which is the reasoning behind the regional leadership workshops sponsored by the Chapter Office.

Members of the Chapter Advisory Council and EAA staff present the workshops, which are designed to be teambuilding, not cheerleading, sessions.

"We talk with them about the future of their organizations," said Troy Toelle, EAA Chapter Field Administrator. "But more importantly, we put them in contact with other Chapter leaders in their area so they can synergize. They build a network that they can use to co-sponsor events, to ask for help ... or to lend help. That's the core of it."

The most recent regional workshop was held March 6 in Poughkeepsie, N.Y. Seventy EAA Chapter leaders gathered from all over the Northeast U.S. and Canada for the one-day event.

Toelle said that Chapter leaders learned about building a dynamic Chapter structure, Chapter fundraising, and creating Chapter missions, visions, and goals.

The exercises cover goal building, strategic planning, and identifying Chapter strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats. Subject matter at the workshops varies from location to location, as well as from year to year.

This is the second year that the Chapter Office has gone on the road to conduct the workshops.

The Chapter Office schedules six regional workshops every year. Sessions are also held at Sun 'N'


