Experimental Aircraft Association Chapter 72 Flying Club

The new EAA Chapter 72 Flying Club is almost here! I joined the EAA this year with the hopes of finding a way to afford flying. I am a "rusty pilot" with limited funds and no place available to build a plane for myself. To be truthful, I would rather spend my time flying than building. Joining the EAA was a way for me to make contact with flying enthusiasts and perhaps get some insight into getting back into flying. Imagine my surprise when Jim Steward said during a meeting that there should be a flying club associated Chapter 72 of the EAA. I found out a few weeks later that a Rans S-19 Venterra was going to be donated to the EAA Chapter due to the generosity of Ken Hendrickson. I don't know how he did it, but Jim Steward got a new, mostly-built airplane donated for use in the flying club! I do not know who or what Jim knows, but I personally don't want to upset him!



The Rans S-19 is a two place LSA that cruises at 110kts with a ceiling of 14,500 feet. From what I can tell, the plane is supposed to be very smooth to fly and easy to take off and land. The donated plane has a 100hp Rotax engine, dual Dynon Displays and VHF radio, transponder and an autopilot. This isn't a monster cross-country plane in my opinion but it should do the job for what I, and hopefully others, need in terms of a plane to work on communications skills, procedures and perhaps getting a high dollar hamburger or two!

Dana Rieman took the lead in getting the plane ready. I have kept in contact with him (hopefully, without becoming annoying) to understand how far the final assembly has progressed. Dana says the plane is nearly ready. A new oil pressure sensor needs to be installed and the engine is ready to start up.

Following are a few pictures of the plane. Once the engine runs and all the sensors and indicators are working, the plane can go through final assembly. I talked to Dana and he has worked out some initial numbers for getting access to the Rans in the new flying club:

I know that flying is not on everyone's mind with Meadow Lake being closed, but shortly the airport will reopen and we will get the itch to fly. There still a few hurdles to overcome including finishing the airplane, getting it inspected and completing the 40 hours of test flying. This could only take a month or so. There is a bigger issue looming; we need to get the flying club started, and to do that, we need a handful pilots to commit to becoming members. If you are like me, a "rusty" pilot in search of a reasonably priced rental or you are in the middle of building your own plane (I am jealous), this could be your ticket off the ground.
