
Up the creek without a paddle-again.

Around the Airport

County

Larry officially retires June 30th after 10 years as Director of Josephine County Airports. His retirement party will be held June 25th at noon in the FBO Training Room. Assistant Director/Operations Manager Jason Davis was selected as his replacement and officially assumed that position May 1st with a 2 month overlap. A whole bunch of us were pulling for Jason. We certainly feel he deserved the appointment, and we'll give him our full support. So congratulations are in order but, in all honesty, there will be times when condolences might be more appropriate.

We hope Larry enjoys a great well-earned retirement. The airports have gone through a multitude of changes during his tenure and I, for one, won't let him get away without highlighting some of them. He has been a strong manager and, over the years, has had to juggle the many disparate interests of the tenants and deal with the FAA bureaucracy while keeping the county commissioners happy. Herding cats would have been a lot easier. I'm sure he's pissed off more than a few people along the way but, during his tenure, the G.P. airport has become an essential contributor to the economy of the county while providing a home to those of us who pursue aviation as a strictly recreational activity. Here are a number of projects completed or in process and issues addressed during his tenure. May not be a complete list and they certainly aren't in chronological order.

Grants Pass Airport

- Eastside taxiway development
- AWOS
- New instrument approach procedure allowing much lower minimums
- Initial ground prep for new county hangars
- New maintenance building
- Complete rebuild of county hangar doors. I suspect Jason's still feeling this one.
- Upgrade county hangar electrical service
- New Precision Approach Path Indicator (PAPI) lights
- Update Master Plan
- Runway extension approval (but not the full 1,500 ft. despite extraordinary efforts)
- New runway and taxiway markings
- "Cozy" on a pole. Won't be up before he leaves, but it's in the works.
- Removal of the underground fuel tank and rebuilding of the fuel island.

Illinois Valley

- Perimeter fencing
- Runway lighting and apron upgrade
- Runway paving
- Water rights for fire suppression pond

In addition, Larry was named 2016 Airport Manager of the Year by the Oregon Airport Management Association.

I said he was a strong supporter of recreational aviation interests. I believe the following pair of photos support that opinion.

So bye-bye Larry. Don't let the door Just kidding. Come back and visit us often.


Lisa tells me that the project to remove the underground fuel tank is scheduled to start July 6th after completion of the bidding process next month. Start to finish will take approx. 3 months.

Pacific Aviation

The expansion to Medford has proven to be successful with the two instructors and aircraft there being kept quite busy. He's actively flying their Conquest with little time available for instructing, so another instructor is being hired. We'll also be seeing more of Dave Palmer's son (and chapter member) Liam around the FBO. He's now a member of Pacific Aviation's growing staff.

92Q will be out of service for awhile due to required engine maintenance-2 low cylinders. Meanwhile, their Cessna 340 is permanently out of service, the victim of a hail storm while parked on a ramp somewhere in Oklahoma. Totaled it.

Baker Avionics



The Stinson 108-3 that arrived last month for a panel upgrade has now been moved into the shop and the old panel removed. Should have gotten a "before" picture. There was no standardization for the instrument arrangement in these older aircraft and dedicated space for avionics (What's that?) was nonexistent. "After" will definitely be an improvement and I'll have to get a photo of the finished product.

VSI Aviation



This will be one very well equipped RV10. The new panel is the latest installation and it certainly is impressive. More wiring is being added forward of the firewall. It will even have air conditioning!



At the other end of the spectrum, this KR-1 has been an off and on project for some time. Ryan was recently informed that the owner has passed away. His daughter has assumed responsibility for the estate, so it may soon be for sale.

Ryan says Derek Reed's RV-6 is still on the market. It's a really nice one and I hope someone picks it up soon. Preferably local.

Going up?



Not every day you see a crane this size on the airport, so I had to get a picture of it while it was there lifting the trusses in place for Sean's new hangar. This structure certainly dominates the skyline as you swing around the south end of the field on Brookside. All the trusses are up now and roofing will soon follow. It should be useable by late July or early August although the interior might not be completely finished by then.

My Favorite Airplane

Here's the inaugural entry for the "My Favorite Airplane" segment courtesy of Tom Jensen. This will be an occasional feature as long as I get submittals. Remember, all that's required is that it's an airplane in which you are/were qualified as PIC and for which you have a particularly warm memory.

My "fav" (probably because I couldn't own it...) was a 1963 Dornier Do-27-Q6. I stored it and another airplane for the Narcs after they had been seized in a raid. (Lots of cash and cocaine, but I never saw any.)

N321PB was a radical STOL bird, 6pax, 4000# gross, but a bit under-powered with a 270hp GO-480. But it could out-turn a Super Cub. Very well-balanced controls and great visibility. It was auctioned to an old miner for his young wife who became friends with us. I built an aux fuel tank with transfer pump (and a second tank for a local Do-27 after the owner somehow found my drawings.)

We delivered it to Fairbanks (almost 18 hours, 180 does it in about 10) and I checked out the wife and a fellow who was flying for Everts Air Cargo on a 500' dirt strip. Best flying of my life, but I was younger, sharper, and a bit more daring*. I have some terrific Hi-8 video somewhere which I should put on a DVD if my old Sony can be resurrected.
