On May 25, 2023, the Wittman Regional Airport (OSH/KOSH) <u>posted</u> an update with a video to their Facebook Page. In this update, they noted that two nested t-hangar buildings are starting to really take shape. The building pads are very easy to see within.



More airfield improvements happened on June 7, 2023. When the new terminal was constructed, the corner at the transition between new apron and old terminal apron didn't come with a

fillet to allow for a smooth transition when rounding the corner. This posed issues, especially related to snow removal operations. Now the pouring is done for a 'non-FAA standard' fillet.

In another Facebook <u>post</u> with a video, from June 16, 2023, shows Wittman Regional Airport's concretelots of it. The first of two building slabs were poured recently which is a major milestone towards project completion. Thanks to all the efforts of R&R Wash Materials and Cardinal Construction to date! They are on track for new t-hangars by early fall.

On June 20, 2023, <u>aerial footage</u> of Bill's Custom Conveying and Cardinal Construction hard at work was posted to Wittman Regional Airport's Facebook. Three of the four building pad pours are now complete on their t-hangar project!

It is with heavy hearts that we share the news of the passing of a longtime and former EAA Chapter 75, longtime EAA Chapter 327 Dubuque, IA and national EAA member, and master Van's RV builder Lyle Hefel, 86, of Dubuque, IA. He passed away on June 8, 2023, at Stonehill Care Center in Dubuque, IA. You can read his full obituary here.

For those that haven't seen Lyle's work up close, you really missing something special. The Van's RV airplanes that he built from the RV-4, RV-6, RV-7 and multiple RV-8s were works of art. He even did the painting himself. May his spirit soar high in the heavens, forever remembered as a beacon of inspiration and a true embodiment of The Spirit of Aviation.

Some of his planes won awards at AirVenture in the homebuilt/kitbuilt category - 1996 (RV-4 N762LH), 1999 (RV-8 N458LH), 2001 (RV-8 N235LH), 2004 (RV-8 N757LH), 2008 (RV-8 N98LH) and 2012 (RV-7 N747LH).

In 2015, the Telegraph Herald wrote an <u>article</u> that featured Lyle and his passion for building airplanes.

EAA AirVenture Oshkosh 2023 Notice Includes Important Procedure Undates

There are several important FAA-approved changes for AirVenture Oshkosh 2023. Notice (commonly referred to as the Oshkosh NOTAM), featuring arrival and departure procedures for EAA's 70th fly-in convention on July 24-30 at Wittman Regional Airport in Oshkosh. These changes are based on pilot feedback and FAA review of arrival procedure recommendations.

The document is in effect from noon CDT on Thursday, July 20, until noon CDT on Monday, July 31, and outlines procedures for the many types of aircraft that fly to Oshkosh for the event, as well as aircraft that land at nearby airports. The Notice was designed by the FAA to assist pilots in their EAA AirVenture flight planning. It is now known as the Oshkosh Notice instead of a NOTAM because of a changed FAA internal procedure.

Some of the 2023 changes include:

- A change in the AirVenture ultralight pattern at Wittman Regional Airport.
- Guidance regarding Oshkosh aircraft parking areas, including North 40/South 40 designation.
- Elimination of the Fond du Lac diversion procedure.
- The start time of the daily air shows has been changed from 2:30 to 2:15 p.m. CDT.
- The Notice and its procedures are effective through noon CDT on Monday, July 31.

The ATC-assignable transition points approaching Oshkosh from the west that will ease holding and congestion will again be in effect in 2023. These points are at Endeavor Bridge, Puckaway Lake, and (Continued on page 6)

Green Lake. They will be announced on the arrival ATIS when ATC activates them at times of highest traffic flows.

"The most essential information for any pilot flying to Oshkosh involves reading and thoroughly understanding the 2023 AirVenture Notice to ensure safe operations on arrival and departure," said Sean Elliott, EAA's vice president of advocacy and safety. "This FAA Notice document states the official requirements and expectations for pilots. We also urge all pilots to log appropriate cross-country time prior to their trip to Oshkosh so they have the proficiency and confidence to fly safely."

Ultralight/Homebuilt Rotorcraft Pattern Altered Slightly for AirVenture 2023

Due to expansion of aircraft parking at the south end of Wittman Regional Airport, the <u>ultralight/homebuilt</u> rotorcraft flight pattern for EAA AirVenture Oshkosh has been slightly altered for 2023. The changes will create a more <u>standard pattern</u> for those using the Fun Fly Zone airstrip, home for ultralights, homebuilt rotorcraft, light planes, balloons, and the Twilight Flight Fest.

The new pattern will maintain its parallel course with County Highway N, but will then make a northeast turn toward the airport and Wittman Road. That replaces the hard north turn followed by an east turn prior to reaching Wittman Road. The remainder of the pattern will remain the same.

The change was made to create an additional safety margin, as expanded South 40 aircraft parking has been established in a previously unoccupied area in the southwest sector of the airport. More information on this ultralight pattern change will be part of this year's <u>FAA NOTICE to Air Missions (NOTAM)</u> for AirVenture.

EAA Aviation Museum Welcomes Two New Exhibits Along With Other Updates

The EAA Aviation Museum is seeing some updates, as two new exhibits recently opened. One will focus on the work of drafters who played a pivotal role in designing some of the most iconic aircraft of WWII. The other exhibit will showcase the career of Mike Melvill, the first commercial astronaut.

The Telling Gallery in the Eagle Hangar will be the home of AirCorps Aviation's traveling exhibit titled Drafting: The Art of Aircraft Engineering in WWII. The exhibit provides a detailed look at the process of drafting aircraft designs during WWI. Original drawings from the Ken Jungeberg Collection are displayed across the exhibit, showing detailed depictions of some of the war's most iconic aircraft such as the B-25 and P-51. The Telling Gallery is sponsored by Fred abd Barbara Telling.

To make room for the exhibit, WASP: Women Flyers of World War II has been moved to a new permanent location in the Eagle Hangar by the Link Trainer. The exhibit highlights the heroic women pilots who served their country by flying military aircraft to bases around the world.

The museum's other new exhibit focuses on Mike Melvill, EAA Lifetime 53387, and his accomplishments over his career. Melvill is most well-known for flying Scaled Composites' SpaceShipOne, an experimental spaceplane, on its first flight into space. The flight made Melvill the first commercial astronaut. Included in the exhibit are a pair of astronaut wings



that were given to him by the U.S. Department of Transportation, his Robert J. Collier Trophy and Medal, and the horseshoe pin that was his good luck charm from his wife, Sally.

The exhibit opend on June 23 and is located in the SpaceShipOne exhibit near the Eagle Hangar entrance.

On Saturday, May 20, 2023, the new Barnstormer Boutique within the EAA Aviation Museum in Oshkosh created a center for everyone who loves the world of flight. The retail space is designed to harken back to the adventurous days of the barnstormers nearly a century ago.

"As we looked at the first major redesign of our museum's store for the first time in 40 years since the EAA Aviation Museum opened in Oshkosh, we wanted to make it a natural extension of the museum experience," said Scott Powers, EAA's Director of retail Operations. "The romantic days of the Golden Age of Flight, when aviation first captured the world's imagination, is a natural foundation for the theme seen throughout the facility."

The theme of the Barnstormer Boutique, which also serves as the admission counter for the museum, is styled with an actual barn wood exterior reminiscent of the early aircraft hangars. The interior features a number of the museum's vintage artifacts that add to the atmosphere.

The Barnstormer Boutique, which is open to museum guests and others shopping for aviation merchandise, features EAA-branded products including clothing, along with other aviation products, books, and supplies. It also features a substantial area of toys and activities for young people that spark the imagination of flight. A number of aviation companies will also have their products highlighted in the new store.

"EAA and Oshkosh have been synonymous with the spirit of aviation for the past half-century," Powers said. "The offerings and atmosphere inside the Barnstormer Boutique add to that, whether you're a pilot or dream of the freedom of flight."

The EAA Barnstormer Boutique will be open during regular museum hours, and during selected special events throughout the year. The grand opening of the remodeled store was May 20th, the day of the start of seasonal flight operations at EAA's Pioneer Airport in Oshkosh,.

Sometime back, EAA published an <u>article</u> about chapters making directional signs and putting them on a post by the Blue Barn in Oshkosh. Quite a few chapters took up the challenge and brought their signs to AirVenture 2021. Jim Skadal mentioned earlier in a board/membership meeting where we talked informally about doing the sign the prior year, but it didn't get enough interest at the time for anyone to create one. When the subject was raised again last year, I volunteered to put one together.

There was a link on the EAA website that gave a general description of the size and shape of the sign, so I used that as the starting point for the work. Having some unused lumber in the shop (my wife calls it scrap) I found a piece suitable for the project. I did the layout, cut, sanded and put a couple coats of paint on it.



I wanted to use the chapter logo as the basis for the design but couldn't think of an easy way to transfer it to a wood surface. Then I remembered that Beth Riedel had worked on a project for me about a few years ago and she has some expertise in doing high quality graphics work, as well as making nice name tags.

Working with Beth Riedel, we started by agreeing on basic elements of the design then determining edge spacing, material and colors. Beth had some of the material on hand but also had to order additional material to complete the logo. We also went through a couple iterations of selecting font and pitch as well as placement of the distance measurement from the logo. Having agreed on the design layout, I gave Beth the painted wood and she took over from there.

Beth is a professional when it comes to this sort of thing; and she has the equipment to create the graphics and laser cut the logo into the wood. The logo graphic consists of several colors, each of which needed to be cut individually then placed in the laser



cut outline of the logo. This process worked out really well because the graphic sits down inside the laser cut which we hope will keep it from turning up at the edges. When I got the sign back it was awesome! All it needed was a couple coats of polyurethane for the final finish.

Thanks, Beth, for your help on the project, it turned out great.

After a four-year hiatus, the 32nd running of the Quad City Air Show is in the books! The air show took place June 24-25, 2023, at the Davenport Municipal Airport (DVN/KDVN) in Davenport, Iowa, with thousands in attendance.

After a sunny, hot Saturday, the region was hit with stormy weather late Saturday night and according to the US National Weather Service Quad Cities Iowa/Illinois, an EF-0 tornado was reported between 10:31 to 10:45 PM. The tornado was approximately 50 yards from the airport. It caused extensive damage to many of the vendor displays, chalet tents, porta-potties, trash cans, and chairs.



Luckily, it was weak and there was no damage to any airplanes. The next day, a crew of volunteers and onsite vendors were hard at work cleaning up the destruction so that Sunday's show could go on as planned.

Sunday's show was windier, chillier, and the clouds were much lower. Those conditions made it a challenge for the pilots and several reshuffling of the planned aerobatic acts took place. The acts that did not perform on this day were the Canadian Armed Forces Parachute Team, the SkyHawks and Bob Carlton's Super Salto Jet Sailplane.

The United States Air Force Air Demonstration Squadron Thunderbirds arrived at the Quad Cities International Airport (MLI/KMLI) in Moline, Illinois on Monday, June 19th after departing the Arnold Palmer Regional Airport (LBE/KLBE) in Latrobe, Pennsylvania, where the team took part in the Westmoreland County Air Show. Thunderbirds 7 & 8 arrived around 10:00 AM, while the rest of the team arrived a few hours later at approx. 2:00 PM. From 3:45 PM to 5:00 PM, they had planeside interviews



for the media, which Liz Richards and I had the incredible opportunity to attend. We had the honor of talking with Flight Surgeon Capt. Dr. Travis "ANGRY" Grindstaff of USAF Thunderbird 9. The things he does to make sure that the entire team is in top notch shape are incredible making him a valuable asset to the team.

The United States Air Force F-22 Raptor Demo Team arrived at the Quad Cities International Airport (MLI/KMLI) on Tuesday, June 20th, and it was a homecoming of sorts for the pilot, Team Commander and Capt. Sam "RaZZ" Larsson. Sam, a Davenport native, was infatuated with planes at 6 months old, and from then

on out, his passion continued to grow as he attended numerous air shows in the Midwest as a spectator, photographer, and writer. But, it just didn't stop there as he also wanted to be a pilot. He first learned to fly at the then Carver Aero, now known as Revv Aviation that is based here at this airport, the same airport he grew up watching air shows at. He then worked his

way up the ranks to be a fighter pilot. He graduated in 2011 from Bettendorf High School in Bettendorf, IA and then the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado in 2015 with a Bachelor of Science degree in management science. He continued at Squadron Officer School at Maxwell Air Force Base (MXF/KMXF) in Montgomery, AL in 2021. During the demonstrations he did on both days, Sam Larson put the Lockheed Martin F-22A and his own body to the test, as he experienced extreme G forces while also entertaining the hometown crowd in a safe manner.

The air show started off with a beautiful rendition *O Canada & The Star-Spangled Banner*. The Canadian Armed Forces Parachute Team, the SkyHawks from Canadian Forces Base Trenton (CYTR) in Quinte West, Ontario, Canada, did the honors of the parachute jump



They also performed later in the show where they demonstrated several formations in the sky. My favorite formation maneuver that they do is their signature "Canadian T" formation that involves three jumpers. Three SkyHawks form a three-stack and then transition into a formation in the shape of a "T". This appearance here marked their first time since 2010 and this also marked my first time seeing them since 2012, when they appeared at AirVenture Oshkosh in Oshkosh, WI. They did a wonderful job!

A pair of McDonnell Douglas F/A-18C Legacy Hornets BuNo. 165186 and BuNo. 165192 from Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 232 (VMFA-232) in



MCAS Miramar and a McDonnell Douglas F/A-18D Legacy Hornet BuNo. 164254 from Marine Fighter Attack Training Squadron 101 (VMFAT-101) in MCAS Miramar did a series of flybys for the crowd. Maj. Erik Rheinhart, a graduate from Pleasant Valley High School in Bettendorf, Iowa flew one of the Legacy Hornets during this portion. It was very neat seeing another local native taking part in this air show.

The Shetterly family, consisting of Greg, father, Micki, mother and team announcer, and brothers Joe and Jeff, attended this event. They each performed separately in their unique aircraft. Greg was the first



Shetterly to grace the skies in his homebuilt DR-107, a single-seat aerobatic monoplane specifically designed for aerobatics and recreational flying in

an affordable way. Greg did loops, rolls, tumbles, passes, and more. His simple aerobatics that he demonstrated was a crowd pleaser.

The next Shetterly to fly was Joe in his Van's RV-8, a tandem two-seat, single-engine, low-wing homebuilt aircraft. Joe flew a very smooth routine with excellent throttle management while showing the capabilities of this homebuilt and aerobatic aircraft.

The final Shetterly to fly was Jeff in his bright yellow 1959 North American SNJ-6 Texan. He makes flying the SNJ-6 Texan look easy. Some of his routine consists of diving inverted on a 45 downline, barnstormers loop, half role, inverted pass, four-point hesitation roll, eight-point hesitation roll, and a slow roll.

A glider and a jet at the same time? Bob Carlton achieves just that in his Super Salto Jet Sailplane, a 1984 Start & Flug GMBH. H101 Glider (N101AZ). This glider self-launches without a tow plane, climbs to altitude and then he powers it down for the first half of his show. During the first half of his show, he showcased an amazing, graceful, and traditional glider aerobatics show. The second half of his show started when he got closer to the ground and turned the PBS TJ100 engine back on. During this sequence, he showed the spectators an awesome, low level jet show!

Doug Rozendaal flew *Charlotte's Chariot II*, a North American F-51D Mustang. Doug makes his home in Clear Lake, Iowa with his wife Kim and is based at the Mason City Municipal Airport (MCW/KMCW) in Mason City, Iowa.



He has a gorgeous hangar where he hosts a Third Thursday Burger Burn each month from 6:00 PM to 9:00 PM. In his hangar you can find Mr. Mulligan, a 1985 Howard DGA-6 Replica (N273Y). Doug was introduced to the world of warbird aviation at a Commemorative Air Force air show in 1989, joining the Minnesota wing shortly after, and ever since he

has been flying a plethora of air shows and warbirds, most notably *Tuskegee Airman*, a 1942 North American P-51C Mustang. During this airshow, he put on an amazing P-51 Mustang aerobatic demonstration while also highlighting it's 1695 hp Packard Merlin V1650-7 V12 piston engine.

Hayden Proffitt II, who comes from a long line of drag racers, drove *Hot Streak II* formerly known as *Super Shockwave*, a highly modified 1957 Chevrolet Pickup Truck with two Westinghouse J34 engines that came from a North American T-2A Buckeye at the Quad City Air Show.



Les Shockley, originally built this design, toured it around the world, and later sold it to Hayden Proffitt II, when he moved overseas. Hayden Proffitt II is honored to be driving his mentor, Les' design. He keeps it operable on the circuit. This marked my first time seeing it, and I was amazed each time he fired up its twin jet engines.

A interesting detail about Hayden Proffitt II is that he is the grandson of legendary hall of fame drag racer Hayden Proffitt. Hayden Proffitt was a four-time national champion in NHRA and a two-time national champion in AHRA. Also, his uncle, Brad Proffitt, son of Hayden Proffitt, piloted the USA rocket 1 dragster, a rocket powered dragster which ran off hydrogen peroxide. Hayden Proffitt II served nine years of duty with the United States Air Force, where he worked as a mechanic for the F-15 fighters and B-2 bombers aircraft. So, the jet-powered pickup is his way of reconnecting with his time in the Air Force. Hayden Proffitt II did a total of two runs on each day, a highspeed pass with Jeff Shetterly in his 1959 North American SNJ-6 Texan and one with Tim Tibo in a Canadair CT-133 Silver Star.

My favorite aerobatic team, the AeroShell Aerobatic Team performed tight, awe-inspiring formation aerial maneuvers in their four-ship North American AT-6 Texans. They were founded by Alan Henley & Steve Gustafson as the North American Aerobatic Team in 1984 and they do a full schedule each year on the air show circuit. The team currently consists of Mark Henley, team lead, Bryan Regan, right wing, Steve Gustafson, left wing, and Jimmy Fordham, slot. Their act consists of a series of loops, rolls, and bomb bursts in close formation.



Tim Tibo represented Ace Maker Airshows by flying the 1959 Canadair CT-133 Silver Star (N133DV). He flies this machine like no other. This jet weighs about 16,000 lbs. when fully loaded

and has a maximum speed of over 500 knots. My favorite maneuver that he demonstrated was the slow roll, which looks easy but incredibly difficult. I also liked how he showcased figure eights and aileron rolls in the sky. His vertical, high speed, low speed, and dynamic maneuvers created the impressive routine that pleased the crowd.

If you been to an air show, you most likely have witnessed an incredible formation flight featuring both civilian-owned warbirds and active-duty examples of the most recent lethal U.S. Air Force fighter jets in our inventory. This unique flight is the Heritage Flight. It requires an enormous amount of skill to



place aircraft from different eras and performance characteristics to fly in such tight formations. Only a handful of individuals have been selected to take part in this incredible moment. Being selected is an honor and a privilege and this air show was able to make that happen thanks in part to the Air Force Heritage Flight Foundation. They are a 501(c)3 non-profit organization that organizes these such events. They keep them flying, so that all who see them will know, that their freedom was won by the blood that flowed, and all who've coursed through hostile skies, know that freedom requires a sacrifice, to those who paid the highest price, we remember.

The Air Force Heritage Flight Foundation brought a 1991 North American TF-51D Mustang nicknamed *Bum Steer. Bum Steer* was piloted by Steven Hinton, Jr.



Steven Hinton, Jr. is the son of Steve Hinton, Sr. who has been a staple of the Air Force Heritage Flight program since its beginning. Currently Steven Hinton, Jr. fly numerous aircraft, mostly of the Warbird type. He has logged more than 2,000 hours in total flight time with over 810 of those hours spent behind the stick of a P-51 Mustang. He is also a test pilot, Reno Air Racer, has a heavy presence at the Planes of Fame Museum in Chino, California and is a part-owner of Fighter Rebuilders in Chino, California

Bum Steer piloted by Steven Hinton, Jr. was joined in the skies by Capt. Sam "RaZZ" Larsson of the F-22

Raptor Demonstration Team. Sam slowed the fifth-generation air superiority fighter down so that he could keep in tight formation with the most leather fighter and fighter bomber during World War II, the P-51 Mustang. The Heritage Fight consisted of the Arcing pass, Flat Pass, Over-the-Crowd Pass, and Flyby Pass.

The United States Air Force Air Demonstration Squadron Thunderbirds who fly the Lockheed F-16C and Lockheed F-16D Falcons closed out the show on both days. They did a high show on Saturday and a low show on Sunday. This year, they celebrated their 70th anniversary and they did a fantastic job. The demonstration consisted of the Diamond Cloverloop Opener, Crossover Break, Diamond Pass In Review, Knife Edge Pass, Diamond Roll, Calypso Pass, Echelon Pass In Review/Sneak Pass, Slow Roll, Aileron Rolls, Bon Ton Roulle, Opposing Knife Edge Pass, Trail to Diamond Bottom-Up Pass, Opposing Inverted Pass, Trail to Diamond Cloverloop, Rejoin to Stinger Formation, Stinger Low Bomb Burst and Crossover, Slow Speed Pass, Five Card Loop, Vertical Rolls, Line Break Loop, Minimum Radius Turn & Half Cuban Eight, Diamond 360, Delta Bottom-Up Pass, Delta Roll, Delta Loop, Delta Burst, Opposing Split-S, High Bomb Burst, and 8-Point Hesitation Roll. If you have not seen them in person, I suggest that you do so.

I cannot wait until the next time the Quad City Air Show happens at the Davenport Municipal Airport as I had a lot fun. It was great to connect with the air show community in so many ways and especially seeing RaZZ, a hometown native. I'm already looking forward to attending my next air show, which is the Dubuque Fireworks & Air Show in Dubuque, Iowa, on July 3rd. What a show!
