From The Desk of the President



Can you believe this weather? I fear we will pay for it. My crew is working inside because that was the work that we scheduled. You know winter and all, it's about that time we move outside and then you know it winter will be back.

I would like to congratulate Cy Galley and Tom Shelton. Cy for moving to a position of Repair Barn Emeritus (which is a title for a retired person with a distinguished back ground of service) I had to look that up as once again Cy is teaching me something. Cy's retirement has freed up the Chairman position which has been filled by Tom Shelton who is officially our new Repair Barn Chairman. These positions have been sanctioned by EAA headquarters, so we will have an uneventful transfer of hats.

Not much to report this month. I already told you about my trip last month. I'm still on the slow boat to getting my IFR rating. At least I'm on the boat. I'm going skiing tomorrow for a week when I get back I'll get serious about finishing my training. Time to move to another adventure, like taking an IFR flight to visit my buddy in Cincinnati.

One year ago I changed my panel to glass to make it easier to navigate. Since I'm getting close to the oral exam I've been studying for it. I'm reading what to check as you taxi out for takeoff. I can't help but notice how great I have it. It starts like this: Before starting turn on the master to listen to the electric gyro for strange noises. Once the engine starts watch the attitude gyros to make sure they settle down correctly. Check your vacuum gauge to make sure you have enough. Last month, I read an article about what to do when the vacuum pump fails. I tell you life is defiantly better with a glass cockpit. All I do is watch to make sure the turn, bank and slip ball react to the change of direction as I taxi. Like I said life is great with modern technology.

Over the years I've heard IFR makes you a better pilot because it's more about procedures. This is true I guess. But, the big difference with me is how I plan the future. I'm more seat of the pants. Lets takeoff and figure it out as we go. When I did that with IFR, I was always behind the plane, which also meant my approaches were botched (sloppy). Big change in me, I have my turns already planned before I takeoff. In the past I would takeoff and turn in the general direction I'm going to fly then fine tune it after I'm level. I have a fairly fast plane, slow flight for me is 120 kts at least that is the speed I'm comfortable with as it starts to waddle at 100kts. With this in mind I tend to get to fixes before I am ready. Then I'm setting up for an approach as I'm turning to intercept it. Throw in communication of ATC and I'm behind the machine (sloppy). I think it didn't scare me because I figured I can always go around and do it again. Once I realized what I was doing I was able to address this "let it happen and I'll fix it later attitude". The new plan, I set up the plane on the ground so I have a fighting chance to handle what comes next in the air. Basically, I take ownership of the outcome, instead of trusting my instructor to take care of me if I get in trouble.

Bottom line I am a better pilot not just because of the

Movie Review - Living in the Age of Airplanes (from Adam Santic)

I recently saw the movie Living in the Age of Airplanes and I loved every minute of it. Living in the Age of Airplanes is a story about how the airplane have changed the world. The movie is produced and directed by Brian J. Terwilliger, narrated by Harrison Ford and features wonderful music by James Horner. Terwilliger also directed and produced One Six Right, which came out in 2005.

The movie begins with shots of an airplane graveyard in Mojave, California, where it is a sad place for flying machines to be at. The movie then transitions to where it all began in Africa, a place inhabited by wildlife and beautiful scenery.

We observe as travel accelerates, from the invention of the steam engine and cars to the development of airplanes and jets, which were shown in black and white footage.

Once the movie returns to color, a bunch of airliner jets are shown as they takeoff. "On any given day there are more than a hundred-thousand takeoffs and landings. At any moment in time a quarter-million of us are in the sky. The network of airplanes is practically invisible, yet their constant circulation is their lifeblood of the common world," said the narrator, Harrison Ford

The next part of the movie takes place inside various airport terminals around the globe. "When we enter an airport, we're entering a portal to the planet. Each gate is a doorway to another part of the world."

How do you get to an island that is too small and too shallow for ships to travel to? You hop aboard a seaplane. A seaplane is an aircraft that can take off and land on hard surfaces and in the water. This means that we can reach about any part of this wonderful planet.

Later in the movie, we see the significance of airplanes and how they play a pivotal role in the transportation of cargo to point A to point B in a matter of hours.

At the end of the film, the film features people inside an airliner. "When we are speeding through the sky it feels like we are going no-

where. But, it is the fastest we will ever go in our lives. If you couldn't fly, you probably wouldn't go and if we didn't go imagine how different our lives would be."

The film illustrates how we can get to pretty much anywhere on the planet in no time due to the creation of airplanes. The film features breath taking stills and videos shot by its marvelous videographers and photographers. This is a must-see movie for any aviation geek.
