Lesser Know Aircraft of WW II - Douglas XB-19A (by Ron Franck)

History and Notes

The continuing battle fought between the US Army Air Corps and the US Navy was long and bitter,



and no single issue was more vigorously contested by the US Navy than the repeated argument that the USAAC, with suitable aircraft, could more economically and effectively defend the nation's enormous expanse of coastline than could the US Navy with surface vessels. Constant dripping is said to wear away a stone, and by the early 1930s the US Navy relented sufficiently to allow the USAAC to explore its beliefs.

In 1934, therefore, the USAAC's material Division issued it's Project 'A' specifications for a long-range bomber which could be used, if necessary, to provide support to troops in Alaska, Hawaii or Panama, this requiring the carriage of a 2,000-lb bomb load at a speed of 200 mph over a range of 5,000 miles. It was very much a challenge at the time when aircraft manufactures had not then succeeded in creating a civil airliner to cope with the North Atlantic.

Boeing responded with their Model 294, of which a prototype was ordered under the designation XBLR-1 (Experimental Bomber Long Range), later XB-15. The proposal received from Douglas was for a very much larger aircraft, and a single prototype of this contracted as the XBLR-2, later XB-19.

When completed it was then the largest aircraft built, with accommodations for a crew of 10 and a bomb load of 36,000 lb. It flew for the first time on 27 June 1941. Powered by four Wright R-3350-5 Cyclone 18 engines, each with a take-off rating of 2,000 hp and maximum continuous rating of 1,700 hp, it was underpowered for the duty required of it. These would be replaced by the 2,600 hp Allison V-3420-11. This added enough additional horsepower for the B-19 to increase the cruising speed by 40mph over that provided by the R-3350's. With it's coupled Allison engines this essentially turned the B-19 into an eight engine, four propeller bomber.

Douglas determined that developments of other bomber types and the low operating speed of the XB-19 made it unsuitable for it's designed role as a long range bomber and asked to withdraw from the program. The sole prototype was pressed into service in





a cargo transport role until scrapped some time later.

Online Courses Offer Advanced Aviation Education, For Free

If you're interested in airplanes and wish you knew more about aerodynamics -- or air traffic control, space policy, satellite engineering or airline management -- you can study all of those topics and more, for free, at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, via their OpenCourseware website. Each course features a syllabus, readings, video lectures, and projects that you can complete at your own pace. The courses don't include any instructor support, classroom interaction or certification, so learners must be self-motivated. If you prefer more structure, MIT also offers MOOCs, or massive online open courses, together with Harvard, at the EdX website. These courses run on a schedule and offer active discussion forums, and students can receive a certificate when they complete all the coursework.

Upcoming aviation-related courses at EdX include Introduction to Aerodynamics, starting in September, and Flight Vehicle Aerodynamics, starting in January. Students can choose to simply audit the courses, or complete all the homework assignments and exams to earn a Certificate of Mastery. The prerequisites for Intro Aerodynamics include a familiarity with vector calculus, differential equations and control volume analysis, so if you're starting from familiarity with the Pilot's Handbook of Aeronautical Knowledge, it may be tough going -- but there's nothing to lose if you fail, and no limit on how many times you can re-take the course.

A Best Kept Secret - Military Flying Clubs (from Richard Lowe)

One of the best kept secrets in the military in recent decades has been the military flying clubs which provided very discounted flight training and recreational flying for military members and retirees, their families and Department of Defense civilian employees.

As part of the morale, welfare and recreation programs, these clubs were able to operate with limited overhead costs and pass the savings on to the members. Once a member of a club, if you were in good standing, when you got orders to a new base, you could transfer your membership to that base club if one existed. All you had to do was start paying dues to that club. In 1968, I joined the club at Aberdeen Proving Grounds, MD, when I was a student at the Ordinance School. I paid something like \$7.00 per hour, wet, for a two-year old Cessna 150 (we had

five in the club) and \$5.00 per hour to the CFI when she flew with me. My private license cost me about \$600 I guess. We had a club house at the Army airfield so the utilities were paid by the Army. The club was run by elected officers, a board of governors and was subject to strict supervision of an advisor appointed by the Post Aviation Officer. We owned the airplanes and paid for or did all the maintenance ourselves.

I learned a lot about owner maintenance which was useful when I bought my own airplane years later. Some clubs had their own fuel tanks and some bought fuel from the military post at very discounted prices.

Fuel for the planes was tax free as they were considered government property. The FAA rules for 100 hour inspections, etc., were strictly followed. A lot of students at the Ordinance School were enrolled in the flight training including some lower grade enlisted members. Some members earned IFR ratings and commercial tickets in the clubs. When I graduated from the Ordinance School, my membership changed to the Hamilton AFB Club in California, then to the Osan AFB Club in Korea.

I then joined the club in Ft Huachuca, AZ and finally I was a member of the Rock Island Arsenal Club when I retired from the Army in 1984. Instructors in the club were a mix of military members, retired military and civilians who were approved by the individual clubs after meeting standards of DOD regulations. If you did not fly in sixty days, you had to take a ride with a club CFI to keep using the club planes.

The clubs also sponsored social events and mandatory safety meetings on a regular basis. The planes were available for cross country, overnight trips. The plan had to be approved by the chief instructor. The successful clubs I saw focused on support of student training. Some got into financial trouble when they bought planes that were too big and sat much of the time on the flight line rather than flying. Students were the secret to a successful club operation.

I talked to folks who flew with the club in Hawaii, Panama, Offutt AFB, NE, Ft Knox, KY, Ft Leavenworth, KS and one in Germany. I don't know if the clubs are as active today as they were, but if you know a person who is in the military or who is considering joining a branch of the military, advise them to look into the Flying or Aero Club program. You can't beat the prices and it is one of the best off-duty activities you can have if you are interested in aviation.

Requested Chapter Potluck Recipe

Rice Pudding with Instant Rice

Several members have asked for Pam's recipe for her Rice Pudding. Here it is.....

3 Cups instant rice 3 Cups water

Pinch of salt

Prepare according to box instructions. Drain well before adding milk.

Mix in a bowl: 3 or 4 eggs, beaten 1 to 1 ½ Cups sugar 1 teaspoon cinnamon ½ to 1 Cup of organic raisins. Add 6 or 7 Cups of milk (use Half and Half for a creamer texture) to rice.

Heat until warm and add egg mixture. Cook slowly until thick using a soft boil. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla, stir. Place into serving dish and sprinkle with additional cinnamon and sugar.




