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GA Pilots Needed for Study on PIREPS

Researchers at Purdue University are looking for general aviation pilots to participate in an online study about pilot reports.

The goal of the study, which is partially funded by the FAA NextGen Weather Technology in the Cockpit (WTIC) program, is to evaluate opportunities for speech-based or other hands-free technologies that GA pilots might use. Pilots will be asked to review six weather-related flight scenarios and record PIREPs as if they are flying.

The study takes about 20 minutes and can be completed using a laptop or desktop computer. Responses to the survey will be completely anonymous, researchers said.

You must be at least 18 to participate.

Why is the cockpit called the cockpit?

Franklyn, a Sport Pilot from Virginia, writes: *I figured that as you write "Questions from the Cockpit," you'd know how the cockpit got its name. Why is the cockpit called the cockpit?*

There are three competing theories to explain the use of the word "cockpit" as the name for the nerve center of an airplane. Strap in, we'll fly through them all.

The Control Center Hypothesis

For background, you need to know that the word *cockpit* itself first appears in print in the 1580s, and was used to describe the arena used for cock fights (with birds), but as the Oxford English Dictionary points out, over time, the term evolved in other directions.

The Blood and Guts Hypothesis

In addition to being used as a synonym for control center, apparently in the 1700s, soldiers started using "cockpit" as a metaphor for the site of grisly combat, especially when the fighting was in an enclosed area. The <u>Word Detective website</u> has suggested that the word cockpit was then "adopted by pilots in World War I, who applied it to the cramped operating quarters of their fighter planes." It is, after all, a small pit where plenty of fighting takes place.

The Nautical Connections Hypothesis

The word cockpit had a second and completely independent evolution on the waves, one that has nothing whatsoever to do with cock fighting. I'd like you to meet a different flavor of pilot from the kind we hang around with: The coxswain.

Initially, the word cockswain is used to describe the person in charge of a small vessel. The title comes to us from "cock," an Old English term for a small boat, and "swain," which means servant. A cockswain is a boat servant. Over time, this title led to the steering compartment of smaller boats, where the cockswain sat, being called a cockpit.

January 10 - 1941 is a 1979 American comedy film based on what has come to be known as the <u>Great Los Angeles Air Raid of 1942</u>

February 14 - *Island in the Sky* is a 1953 American drama film considered one of the "classic" aviation films with John Wayne

March 13 - *PT 109* depicts the actions of <u>John F. Kennedy</u> (JFK) as an officer of the <u>US Navy</u> in command of <u>Motor Torpedo Boat *PT-109*</u>

April 10 - *A Guy Named Joe* (<u>Spencer Tracy</u>) is the reckless pilot of a <u>North American B-25 Mitchell</u> bomber flying out of England during <u>WWII</u>

May 8 - *Test Pilot* is a 1938 film that tells the story of a daredevil <u>test pilot</u> (Clark Gable), his wife (Loy), and his best friend (Tracy)

June 12 - *Flight of the Intruder* is a 1991 <u>war film</u> based on the novel by former <u>Grumman A-6 Intruder</u> pilot <u>Stephen Coonts</u>

July 10 - *First Man* is a 2018 American <u>biographical</u> <u>drama</u> film based on the book <u>*First Man: The Life of Neil A. Armstrong*</u>

August 14 - *The Bridges at Toko-Ri* is a film about the <u>U.S. Navy pilots</u> assigned to bomb a group of heavily defended bridges in <u>North Korea</u>.

September 11 - *Behind Enemy Lines* tells the story of Lieutenant Chris Burnett, an American <u>naval flight officer</u> who is shot down over <u>Bosnia</u> and uncovers <u>genocide</u> during the <u>Bosnian War</u>

October 9 - **Thirteen Days** is a film that dramatizes the <u>Cuban Missile</u> <u>Crisis</u> of 1962, seen from the perspective of the <u>US</u> political leadership

November 13 - *Bombers B-52* is a film describing the introduction of the <u>Boeing B-52 Stratofortress</u> bomber into the US <u>Strategic Air Command</u> (SAC) inventory during the <u>Cold War</u> era of the 1950s

December 11 - *Midway* is a 2019 American <u>war film</u> based on the <u>attack</u> <u>on Pearl Harbor</u> and the subsequent <u>Battle of Midway</u> during <u>World War II</u>

Few People Know The Center Of The World Is Hiding In The Tiny Town Of Poniatowski, Wisconsin

Wisconsin is home to one of the most unique features in the world, and by unique, we mean that the center of the world is in Wisconsin. It's true! Most folks don't believe it at first, but Wisconsin boasts a truly fascinating reputation. In the central part of the state, west of Wausau is a totally amazing spot that only exists in a few places in the world. Tucked away on a farm in Poniatowski is the intersection of 45 North parallel and the 90 West parallel. If you're looking for the center of the world, well. It's in Wisconsin.

We're aware that these uncertain times are limiting many aspects of life as we all practice social and physical distancing. The 45×90 points, as they're called, are the four points on Earth which are halfway between the geographical poles, the equator, the Prime Meridian, and the 180th meridian. Only two of these points are on land - the other two fall in the middle of the ocean. And the one not in Wisconsin is in a desolate, mountainous region of China near Mongolia that's very difficult to visit.

That makes the short hike out to the middle of a farm field in Wisconsin seem pretty darn manageable, even if I did sink into the snow quite a bit on my way there. Pro tip if you go in winter - follow the snowmobile tracks to make the trip a little easier.

Most folks don't know that the center of the world is in Wisconsin. Poniatowski is a very small unincorporated town that's named for a Polish general. It's one of the most unique places in Wisconsin. Because the actual marker was out in a field, there used to be a sign and a symbolic marker. Recently, the area was resurveyed, a path was created, benches were put out and the official spot is now marked thanks to the generosity of donors. There's an official marker embedded in the ground and visitors can stand in the very middle of the Northern half of the Western Hemisphere. Once you've visited the location, make sure you head to the Wausau Convention and Visitors' Bureau in downtown Wausau to sign the visitors' book for the 45 x 90 and get your very own commemorative coin.
