It has been said every real aviator should attend, at least once, the three major aviation events; Oshkosh, Sun n Fun and the Reno Air Races. Once you go, you may get hooked and come back year after year.

For flying excitement, you can't beat the Reno Air Races. Unlike Oshkosh and Sun N Fun, the Reno folks assume you are smart enough to get out of the way of taxing aircraft, so there are few fences, ropes and people barking at you. It's a race, airshow, military and show plane static show, military flybys and party all rolled into an annual four-day event. With multi-million-dollar aircraft pushing the speed envelope, blowing \$200K plus motors, flown by the top race pilots, with mayday dead stick landings, watching it all with friends and a cold one in your hand...well, it's not heaven but it's close to it, its Reno!

Reno Air Races are Sept 16-19, tickets are available, Southwest can get you there.

PS- This year a nice lady and her 50-year-old son asked us if our T-28 plane was a Bearcat during Oshkosh. I have heard the T-28 referred to as a Corsair, a Hellcat but a Bearcat was new to us. ## I found the young 'uns

Too often I hear we need more young people in aviation.

My typical response is we need more people in aviation. Not just young people.

Maybe we are looking in the wrong places.

If you restrict your search for "young 'uns" to SUN 'n FUN and EAA AirVenture Oshkosh, you are likely to be disappointed.

On the other hand, if you walk into a Teen Flight hangar, or the Lakeland Aero Club, or the Aspiring Aviators club, or any of the dozens of universities with flight schools, or any of the accelerated flight training programs sprinkled around the country, you'll likely wonder where the gray hairs are.

## Addressing the Air Force's pilot shortage problem

Each year the Pentagon spends billions of dollars upgrading older aircraft, buying new ones and developing <u>super-secret next-generation</u> <u>capabilities</u>. But in the op-ed below, FDD's Bradley Bowman and Maj. Brian Leitzke argue that more needs to be done to ensure the Air Force has a steady supply of the most critical piece of the puzzle: pilots. Beijing demonstrated its growing military strength this month as the People's Liberation Army <u>conducted large-scale air and naval</u> <u>exercises</u> around Taiwan and even fired missiles over the island. Eyeing a possible conflict with China in the coming years, the US Air Force is trying to field next-generation aircraft in sufficient quantities to help deter aggression and achieve victory if deterrence fails.

The problem is that the service consistently struggles to retain enough aviators to fly those aircraft. In fact, the Total Air Force (Active, Guard, and Reserve) was <a href="https://short.org/short/short/">short 1,650 pilots in 2021</a>, and the shortfall will likely only get worse.
