Minutes for EAA Ch 776 Meeting 10 Sep 2024

It was almost a full house with 15 members and one guest attending. Those present were Cliff and Carole Van Vleet, George Clarke, Larry Portouw, Joe Spurgeon, Anne Ballinger, Paul Brick, Ben Middleton, Chris Daley, Joe Mika, Greg Loughran, Jon Nelson, Chris Ireland, Jason Steinberg, Michelle Snodgrass, and guest George Taylor.

Following the Pledge of Allegiance and the Welcome/Introductions, Secretary George Clarke asked that the May meeting minutes as published in the August Newsletter be accepted and they were seconded and approved by the members' unanimous vote.

Treasurer Jon Nelson's report was: Checking \$1,043.64, Young Eagle Savings \$7,238.55, Young Eagle funds from 9 Month TSC \$15,437.90.

Our Young Eagle coordinator, Larry Portouw, affirmed the Young Eagle Fly-In in Douglas to be on 12 Oct 2024 with back date of 19 Oct. Start flying time is to be 0730. Arrival time for pilots and ground crew and briefing times are to be determined later. Cliff and George reminded the members that the south ramp was the better surface of the two ramps and that they would rather set up

there if the city did not have an objection (that ramp was closed for a while in the Trump wall-building days). A date to check out the Douglas ramp, meet with a Rotary representative, and City personnel was set for 28 Sep 2024. Time to be determined after coordination with all parties. The chapter plans to be at Douglas airport on Friday afternoon the 11th of Oct to set up tent, cones, etc. for the next day's flying. The exact time has not been set yet. Some folks are planning on staying overnight in Douglas. Larry reminded us that the Rotary will provide a free pancake breakfast for participating chapter members and pilots. Also, those pilots not having taken the EAA Child Protection training or who need to renew their training should do so.

A future Young Eagle event may be on 16 Nov for 6 to 8 young girls sponsored by Suzanna Ignacio along with some ground training for another 5 girls that are too young to fly. This event would need two 3-pax planes and a one-pax plane. It would also help to have a static display plane for the ground training. It was suggested that maybe an iPad with Foreflight could be provided to show the non-flying girls their friends flying around the pattern. If we wanted to add more Young Eagles to this date, we would need some more pilots.

A home school group has shown interest in flying some of their kids, but no date or time has been discussed.

Next up was a report of the Sep 4th meeting of the City Transportation Commission. One of our newest chapter members, and the latest addition to the Commission, Greg Loughran, made this report. The City had a meeting with ADOT and some Federal Transportation folks and, so far, the results have been very positive. Evidently it is very hard to get all of these folks together at one time and they concentrated on the City Bus transit plan. This concerns state and federal funding. The next local meeting for the

Airport Master Plan will be in late October for the second session of local planning. The next Commission meeting will be on 2 Oct at the City Transit center at the SE corner of Coronado and Wilcox at the usual time of 1530. It is open to the public.

Cliff reminded us that elections come again in November and that he will not be the President after December. In fact, all of the present officers would like to step aside for some new blood and ideas in the chapter. So, if you are wanting to help the chapter, please volunteer for a position when the time comes in November.

The next Chapter meeting will be the second Tuesday in October (the 8th) at 1800 in the City terminal.

The meeting was adjourned.
