May 17 Fly-Out to Peru (KVYS)

Illinois Valley Regional Airport will host the 10th Annual TBM Reunion (<u>tbmreunion.org</u>). We'll meet at 11:00 on the 2nd day of this event, **Saturday, May 17**. The website home page states that there will be limited space in the (grass) GA parking area, and that the FAA will be performing <u>ramp checks</u>.









The program begins with a <u>veterans parade</u> at noon, featuring veterans and the flags of deceased veterans carried by family members, followed by a missing man formation (with the flags on board a <u>TBM Avenger</u>).

The <u>airshow</u>, from 13:00-16:00 includes TBM Avengers, an F-16 Fighting Falcon, a P-51 Mustang, and the TITAN Aerobatic Team (four T-6s). Bring your veteran's flag to be included in the Honor Walk and missing man formation (check in at registration before 11:00). Admission is free and <u>donations</u> are encouraged. When Adventure Meets Aviation History: The 1957 F-86 Crash – Matt Van Bergen

It was time to hit the road again in late March. As in the past two years, the goal was to drive to Tempe, Arizona, to spend Easter with our daughter, now a junior at Arizona State University. My wife takes the "easy" route and flies commercial, while I prefer to drive my camper van, take my time, and explore new biking and hiking spots along the way.



This year's route included stops in Bentonville, Arkansas; <u>Big Bend</u> <u>National Park</u> in West Texas; Las Cruces, New Mexico; several days at <u>Chiricahua National Monument</u> in southern Arizona (a must-see!); Tucson and finally Tempe. It was in Tucson that I took an interesting hike—one I'd like to share with you. Don't worry...it's aviation related!

It was stinking hot down at Catalina State Park, too hot to hike or bike during the day. So, I packed up the van and we (my little Cavapoo furry friend is my travel partner) headed up to <u>Mount Lemmon</u> to seek higher (cooler) ground. Mount Lemmon, standing tall at 9,159', is a really cool spot as it sits just to the north of downtown Tucson and is a great place to go when it's hot in the valley. I drove up to the small parking lot to access the Butterfly Trail.

The trail started at about 7,000 feet, so the cool air was a welcome relief. It was an out-and-back route—about six miles with 2,200 feet of elevation gain—which felt like a good challenge for the day. As I made my way along, I passed a couple of hikers, but no one seemed to be doing the full route. While taking a break, I decided to do a quick Google search to see what others had said about the trail. That's when something caught my eye—"F-86"—mentioned in connection with the Butterfly Trail.

Wait...what? Could this hike actually lead to a piece of aviation history?

I have to admit, at this point in the trip, I was really starting to miss aviation. According to what I read, the trail leads to the crash site of an <u>F-86 Sabre</u> from 1957. Well, if I needed any more motivation to keep going, that sealed it. The trail turned rugged in the last mile or two, but eventually, I reached the site—and there it was.









What's the story? Well, after I finished up the hike, I drove back down into Tucson, found a local micro brewery, had a nice cool IPA and of course started researching the story. Per a document I came across...

Late in the afternoon of 8 July 1957, two F-86 Sabrejet fighter aircraft from Davis-Monthan Air Force Base met in a midair collision over Mount Bigelow. The two aircraft, piloted by 1st Lt. G. H. Van Vliet and 1st Lt. Joseph J. Onate, were on a routine training mission when for some unknown reason they collided. The tail section broke away from one of the jets. The other apparently lost a wing and the two aircraft plummeted out of control. Both pilots, with just seconds to spare, ejected, yanked their ripcords before their parachutes could open automatically, and floated through monsoon clouds to safety and rescue in the forest below.



One of the jets crashed near an access road. This made removal of the wreckage relatively easy and the crash site was cleaned up shortly after the crash. The aircraft I saw on my hike slammed into the earth near the Butterfly Trail about 3 miles from Soldier Camp. The site is at an elevation of about 7,000 feet. Officials determined that the removal of the wreckage of that aircraft would be expensive and require the use of helicopters so a decision was made to leave the remains where they landed. So there it lies, an enduring backwoods reminder of the sometimes abrupt enforcement of the law of gravity.





I think over time people have started taking pieces of the airplane because all I could make out was the remains of the engine and a few pieces of the surrounding fuselage.

This was a fun day. I like hiking new trails because you really never know what you'll see along the way. This is the first for me and I didn't even know about it until I was well into the hike. -Matt
