Flying Italian Style

Back in October Debie and I flew to Milan Italy for 2 weeks to explore the Italian Riviera and a place called Cinque Terra "The Five Lands."

Milan, a metropolis in Italy's northern Lombardy region, is a global capital of fashion and design. Home to the national stock exchange, it's a financial hub also known for its high-end restaurants and shops. The Gothic Duomo di Milano cathedral and the Santa Maria delle Grazie convent, housing Leonardo da Vinci's mural "The Last Supper," testify to centuries of art and culture.





But my mission was to take the train, a one hour ride, to Como Lago or better known as Lake Como and spend time at one of the oldest seaplane bases in the world right at the slopes of the Alps. But a little history lesson will bring this special place to life. So let me explain.

In 1903 when the Wright brothers made their first flight at Kitty Hawk,

flight in Como was still via balloons. Just a few years later, in 1909, the first airplane took to the Larian skies. Flying began in the Como region in the earliest years of its existence.



In October of 1913 the epic of water flying over Lake Como began, shortly after Calderara and Guidoni had flown the first Itailian seaplane in the Gulf of La Spezia. In fact the most famous European seaplane pilots came together with their aircraft in Como, to compete to win the important "Grand Prix of the Lakes". Where Debie and I stood on the shores of Lake Como is the site of the first hangar built in 1930 which is still used today to store and repair the seaplanes that fly in and out every day.















The Aero Club as it is called has the distinction as the oldest seaplane operation and seaplane flight school in the world started in 1930, a record certified by Guinness World Records. Their fleet today consists of 4 Cessna 172s, a Cessna 206, a Piper PA-18, along with a Cessna C305 which we call the L-19 Bird Dog, a Republic RC-3 Seabee, and finally to Italian airplanes, the Macchi MB 308 and the Caproni CA 100.

As you can see General Aviation is alive and well in Italy witnessing our trip recently. We even found flying taking place in Monteroso Cinque Terre in the form of para-gliding as we watched from the hills.

I really enjoy the seaplanes because that is how I began my entry into aviation 50 years ago.

So our vacation to Italy or wherever in the world we travel always includes finding airports and people that enjoy aviation! So get out and explore aviation where ever you find it and "keep'm flying


