Ray Scholarship – Randy McKee AVIATION SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITIES PRESENTED BY EAA CHAPTER 864

EAA Chapter 864 had two outstanding applicants for the EAA Ray Scholarship this year.

Kyra Gallagher of O'Fallon, Illinois has received a unique full-scholarship opportunity for flight training, thanks to EAA Chapter 864 and the Ray Aviation Scholarship program administered by the Experimental Aircraft Association in Oshkosh, Wisconsin.



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Kyra Gallagher will be training at Murray Air, based in Greenville, Illinois. The scholarship is designed to support a flight student through both written and practical segments of flight training that are part of successful FAA pilot certification.

Adam Elik of Godfrey, Illinois will be the recipient of a Chapter 864 scholarship to help cover part of the costs for his flight training. This scholarship will be funded by the chapter and from donations to the newly created scholarship fund. The Ray Aviation scholarship program provides scholarships up to \$11,000 to young people who want to learn to fly. The Ray Foundation has provided \$1.8 million to fund the scholarship program, which seeks to improve the flight training success rate from the current industry standards of 20 percent to 80 percent for program participants. Local EAA chapters are responsible for identifying youth for the Ray Aviation scholarship program and mentoring them through flight training. The Ray Foundation is furthering the legacy of James C. Ray, an EAA lifetime member who was dedicated to aviation and youth education.

EAA Chapter 864 will play a critical role in the success of these scholarships. Chapter members will mentor and support the scholarship recipients throughout their flight training journey. Once selected as a Ray Aviation scholarship participant or Chapter 864 scholarship recipient, candidates also commit to volunteer service with the chapter.



Question of the Month

This Month's Question and Answer:

Question: Is it illegal to make a midfield crosswind pattern entry at an uncontrolled airport?

Answer: It is not *illegal* to make a midfield crosswind pattern entry at an uncontrolled airport. This is referred to as the Alternate Midfield Entry, as illustrated in Figure 14-3 of FAA-H-8083-25C. However, the FAA *preferred* pattern entry is made on a 45-degree angle to the downwind leg at midfield and at pattern altitude. Any number of circumstances (e.g., a practice or actual IFR approach, simulated emergency for training, arrival direction, terrain, traffic, etc.) might require an alternative pattern entry.

FAA-H-8083-25C also states, "it is vital to announce your intentions, and remember to scan outside. Before joining the downwind leg, adjust your course or speed to blend into the traffic. Adjust power on the downwind leg, or sooner, to fit into the flow of traffic. Avoid flying too fast or too slow. Speeds recommended by the airplane manufacturer should be used. They will generally fall between 70 to 80 knots for fixed-gear singles and 80 to 90 knots for high-performance retractable."

Question of the Month

This Month's Question and Answer:

Question: What causes the somatogravic illusion, and under what conditions is it more likely to occur?

Answer: Somatogravic illusions occur when we experience a linear acceleration, which causes a disturbance in the vestibular system. An acceleration in level flight (or takeoff) creates the illusion of pitching upward, and is more likely to occur when we have limited or poor visual references. A pilot departing an airport in darkness or IMC may lower the nose in response to this illusion, creating a risk of collision with terrain or obstacles. Reliance on instruments (e.g., the attitude indicator) can help counter the illusion.

Gone West: Dick Rutan (Left)

EAA was saddened to hear of the passing of renowned aviator Dick Rutan, EAA Lifetime 94971, on Friday, May 3.

"Dick Rutan is closely linked with EAA history for the past half-century," said EAA CEO and Chairman, Jack J. Pelton. "Whether it was the flights of canard aircraft, trips to Oshkosh back in the 1970s, the unforgettable Voyager project and mission in the 1980s, or his regular trips to AirVenture for forum presentations almost every year, Dick Rutan was a true friend of EAA and AirVenture. We will miss him and remember him, and our condolences go to his family at this time."

Before becoming world-famous as one of the two pilots that flew the Voyager aircraft in a nonstop, unrefueled flight around the world in December 1986, Dick Rutan served in the USAF as a fighter pilot. He flew 325 combat missions during Vietnam.

Gone West: Bud Anderson (Right)






