





### • SONEX UPDATE by Wayne Flury

Shown below are recent photos of my Sonex with the windshield and canopy finally fitted and installed. There are many parts of any airplane construction project that can be called difficult, and the Sonex certainly has its share, but in my experience the work of fitting the canopy to the windshield and fuselage can only best be described as "tedious!"

The canopy used on the "A" model Sonex starts off as an oversized and floppy piece of Plexiglas, blown into sort of a "bubble" shape which must be cut and trimmed to fit into the cockpit opening. I've got to give a big "Thank You" to Boyd Emmel for helping with the first rough cut of the canopy to size (needed two people to handle the large sheet and maneuver it through the band saw). Over the years I've heard and read countless tales of people carefully handling the Plexiglas through cutting, trimming, sanding and drilling, and then to have the disappointment of a crack suddenly appearing. So I was a little paranoid, to say the least, as I began the process (it's a \$200 part, and I don't like buying more than one each of such parts).

The initial and succeeding cuts are marked with masking tape to the approximate dimensions, cuts are made, edges are sanded smooth (three grades of sandpaper), the canopy is laid onto the fuselage, more tape is applied, more cuts are made, more sanding is done, more fitting and marking, etc., etc., etc. Since the canopy is a "bubble" shape, it becomes a task of fitting a three dimensional item into a fixed dimension cockpit with angled bulkheads fore and aft, each with different radii. A little cut on one side affects the fit of an opposite side, or the diagonal side, or whatever!! There are lots and lots of canopy removals. I built a wooden form on which to sit the canopy while doing the cutting and sanding, and that worked well.

The first couple of times that I picked up the canopy (by myself) to move it from the airplane to the wooden form and then back again, I fully expected cracks to be sprouting like a spider web. But, after I became more confident, I found the canopy to be very resilient to handling. An analogy might be the way you picked up and held your first newborn child – you fully expected the baby to break if you weren't careful! But by the time of the second, or succeeding kids, you developed a more casual but confident style.

I believe current versions of the Sonex canopy (as compared to the very early units) have a more forgiving chemical composition and so that's likely why I didn't have trouble with cracks. This is, I suppose, an unintended benefit of being such a slow builder! This doesn't mean that tomorrow when I go into the shop I won't find a crack, but since the canopy has now gone through several temperature cycles, I'm feeling OK!

It's noteworthy that Sonex has modified their "B" models to include an impressive (and solid) framework into which the canopy is fitted and, I believe, reduces the work of installation.

Now Santa needs to be generous and bring me some goodies to put into the instrument panel (probably a package of MGL Avionics instruments – EFIS, radios and other).
