Trees Falling, Check Lists, a Day Salvaged and Enjoyed

I'm certain you are all familiar with the quandary posed in the question, "If a tree falls in the forest, and no one is around to hear it, does it make a sound?" Funny enough I thought about this while making frantic calls on Saturday, August 19. That was the day of the last arranged fly-out, to Granite Falls.

Earlier that week I was so excited to go! I had a Saturday off, the weather was supposed to be perfect, other people from the EAA 878 wanted to go – what an opportunity. Since there was fog forecast for both the Buffalo/Maple Lake and Granite Falls areas by Friday morning, I sent out a notice Friday evening to reschedule our meeting time from 10:00 am to noon. Amy and I wanted to take in the Gear Head Get Together at Maple Lake, so we went there right away in the morning and I went directly to the airport after.

I performed the pre-flight on N1794T and then my final flight plan prior to leaving. As part of that flight planning check list I look at "NOTAMS." Imagine my surprise when I found out the runway at Granite Falls was closed! This brings us up to the frantic calls that I mentioned earlier.

Being new at arranging events like this, I am still learning and I hope you will be patient with me. I have now added check NOTAMS prior to scheduling an event. Now this may not work out because, as we all know, a NOTAM can show up at any time and for any reason. However, this one was posted well in advance and I should have checked it prior to sending out the invite. For this I apologize again. I will try to establish a method of communication for those who sign up for a fly-out event for any last minute cancellations. This will probably be done using the cell phone instead of e-mail. I'll try to have this done by the next meeting.

As for the part about trees falling and sound, this is where I was at when thinking that. Think about us as pilots, or at least the one I know the best – me. There are several times where I have made mistakes in flight. Little things that just bother me but no one else may notice – maybe deviations in direction, altitude, or having the engine rpm setting to fast or slow on final. I consider these mistakes I make, but if I don't mention it and no one else knows, than are they? Now consider the fly out to Granite Falls – you all heard the tree fall on that one. ⁽ⁱ⁾

And finally a day was salvaged and enjoyed! There I was, phone calls just finished, the plane prepped, and a beautiful day. Ms. Amy arrived and I could tell by her expression that she saw that something wasn't right. I explained the situation and mentioned I was going flying and we could just pick a different destination if she still wanted to come. We chose Brainerd, just because. When we arrived at BRD about an hour later I was shocked at all of the equipment on the ramp! My Piper wasn't even close to any other, small GA aircraft – it was surrounded by jets, jets, and more jets! A Lear was filling up at the pumps, waiting for its passengers, and several other Lears, Citations, and an Embraer were lined up filling the parking area of Brainerd's tarmac. Eventually I found out that a big international drag race was being held at BIR that weekend.

Being a pilot and passenger, in our own private aircraft, we had access to the tarmac and the ability to take a close look at how the other half travels. We enjoyed our picnic lunch and flew back home.

• REMEMBERING KEITH SMITH, July 23, 1945 – August 13, 2017 by Wayne Flury

Keith Smith, a long time member of EAA Chapter 878, passed away the evening of August 13. Keith had been under a doctors care for quite some time. A gathering for family and friends was held at a long time family home on Clearwater Lake on Saturday, August 26, hosted by his wife Sandy Jones, and family members.

Among other tributes in his obituary was one to aviation. It stated, "He loved being a pilot, flying and "hangar flying" with his friends. Keith was a member of the Experimental Aircraft Association." He was active with EAA Chapter 878, and from 2005 to 2009 served as Chapter Vice-President. From my files of chapter historical newsletters, Keith was first listed on the Chapter 878 roster in October, 1997.

I recall Keith as one of our "quieter" members, usually taking a seat at the rear of the room but always ready with a well thought comment when needed. However, back in 1999 Keith might have responded to the nickname of "Lucky," because that's the year he won an airplane! On the next page is a story I wrote about Keith and his good fortune. Minnesota Pilot Wins Luscombe

Most normal people might fantasize about winning the lottery or finding an eccentric rich uncle who has declared them sole beneficiary of an extensive inheritance. Pilots, however, dream about winning an airplane.

Keith Smith of South Haven, Minnesota, is a pilot. He's also an EAA and Chapter 878 member and a member of a Piper Warrior flying club based at Maple Lake. He once told a fellow chapter member that the only way he could ever own an airplane was if he won it.

Keith is a nice guy, a family man and a contributor to worthy causes. When he saw the promotions for the Don Luscombe Aviation History Foundation "Win Me" airplane giveaway, he bought some tickets and then put it out of his mind.

In early October, Keith got a message to return a call to an unknown name and number. Since he's also a skeptic, he figured that it was just another version of the telemarketing calls that are today's version of the biblical plagues, and he ignored it.

Fortunately, the caller persisted and left another message with Keith's wife. When Keith returned the call, it set in motion the events that brought his 1948 Luscombe Silvaire 8E home to the Maple Lake Airport.

Keith took a commercial flight to Phoenix and went to the suburb of Chandler, where the Luscombe Foundation is headquartered. Foundation president Doug Combs introduced him to his



early Christmas present with a two-hour orientation flight.

Since Keith is not tailwheel-endorsed (a horrific status for a Luscombe owner), he arranged for a local flight instructor to accompany him back to Minnesota. Due to winds, they made it only to Omaha before the instructor had to return home. Keith called Wright Aero in Maple Lake, and Bill Mavencamp came down to complete the journey.

N2014B sports an overhauled 85-hp Continental, a clean white-and-green paint job, a new interior and a host of new parts and additions. The instrument panel, painted green to match the exterior, retains its classic appearance and layout but sports a Terra TRT 250 transponder, TX720 radio, Sigtronic SAS-440 intercom and an integrated ammeter, oil temperature, oil pressure and EGT gauge within one of the stock panel cutouts.

Doug Combs noted that the only navigational equipment is the windows, but the foundation added a "cigarette lighter" outlet into which Keith can plug his handheld GPS.

The fuselage is currently a billboard with the logos of the project sponsors. Keith isn't sure about the sponsor decals, but he already has borrowed his wife's hair dryer to work on removing a couple of large "Win Me" decals.

Luscombe pilots are generally a devoted lot who are very happy with their chosen aircraft. Next summer if you see a guy on the pancake circuit and he's smiling a whole lot, its a good guess that he may be flying a 1948 white-and-green Luscombe.
