# • WHAT I DID ON VACATION LAST SUMMER (Part Four)

# A return visit to the Nicholas-Beazley Aviation Museum in Marshall, MO and their display dedicated to Ole Fahlin by Wayne Flury

No, this isn't going to be an "Ole and Lena" story!



In late October, 2016, Joyce and I traveled to Marshall, Missouri to attend a wedding. Marshall is about 80 miles east of Kansas City and is an easy one-day drive from our home in Minnesota (and would be an easy-peasy flight in a general aviation airplane).

The previous year we also were in Marshall and I was introduced to a local aviation museum at the Marshall Memorial Municipal Airport (KMHL), the Nicholas-Beazley Aviation Museum (see the April and October, 2015 EAA Chapter 878 newsletters). It's an impressive museum, not

necessarily because of the extent of the displays, but for their quality. I noted previously that some of their presentations were equal to that which I have come to expect at larger facilities such as those at Oshkosh.

This year I had some spare time between our arrival in Marshall and the start of the wedding, so I returned to the museum for a follow-up visit. I most enjoy museum displays when I am alone and can enjoy them on my own schedule, wandering randomly as my attention is drawn first to one area, then another (and then, usually, back to the first area when I realize I missed something there, then back to where I was, etc., etc. Perhaps this is why people allow me to graze in solitude at museums and air shows – they tire of what appears to be my aimless wanderings!).

Museum displays usually don't change much (by definition, museum content is rather static), so one has to look for subtleties as you revisit. A well run museum offers intellectual delicacies to those who are observant and willing to closely examine the displays. On this visit I discovered an expansion of their display dedicated to Ole Fahlin, an early innovator in propeller design and construction.

The original intent of my story was just to include some photos of Mr. Fahlin's shop in the newsletter. I figured that anyone who

appreciates the beauty and soul (as well as personal sweat) contained within handcrafted wooden products, and particularly in a wooden propeller, would like them. Ole had his shop in Missouri in the 1930's and, though his equipment may have lacked current safety features, I expect he could step into a modern wood propeller shop and feel right at home.

As I did some additional research about Ole, I discovered that he had a presence not just in Missouri, but also in Iowa, Minnesota and South Dakota. In fact, I found that he had been inducted as a member of the South Dakota Aviation Hall of Fame in 1992.

Because South Dakota is my home state, any mention of it in conjunction with persons or places of fame or achievement have always perked my interest.

As I noted, Ole is a member of the South Dakota Aviation Hall of Fame. Thanks to William Backes of the South Dakota Air and Space Museum at Ellsworth AFB, where this museum is located and at which the Hall of Fame members are recognized, for providing the following text from the supporting documentation for Ole's induction:

In 1924, Ole Fahlin left Sweden and settled in Aberdeen, South Dakota. After purchasing a Curtis JN-4 for \$500, Ole barnstormed throughout South Dakota and Minnesota to pay off the airplane. While rebuilding the OX-5 engine and propeller of the airplane, Ole came up with an improvement over the old propeller that would greatly increase the performance of the aircraft. This was the start of a business that drew acclaim from all over the United States for his improved propellers. Ole designed the static propellers (a "test club" used by engine manufacturers for use in testing and running-in) for the B-29 Bomber in World War II.

Purchasing one of the first enclosed aircraft, the Monocoupe, Ole flew in Air Shows with a group that he organized, including many pilots from Sweden. One of the highlights of the Air Shows

m Sweden. One of the highlights of the Air Shows was the wing walking by a South Dakota woman, "Miss Bodels," who would thrill the crowd by falling off a wing, only to have a parachute open to land safe and sound. (Ole also taught flying

lessons in Aberdeen at that time.)

After Lindbergh's flight, Ole joined forces with the Kari Keen Company of Sioux City, Iowa, who built the Kari Keen Coupe airplane, which used his propellers for the aircraft. Ole also worked for the Nicholas-Beazley's Aircraft Company. One of Ole's accomplishments was the design and construction of his own aircraft. The aircraft was built to enter a contest for a small aircraft that would cost less than \$700. Ole powered the aircraft with an engine out of his 1935 Plymouth car and called the aircraft the Plymocoupe.



Part of the proclamation on Ole's induction states:

Where As: Ole Fahlin started the First Propeller Manufacturing Company in South Dakota and was renown all over the world for his accomplishments in the design, building, and testing of propellers and aircraft. A barnstorming pilot who was one of the first fixed based airport operators in South Dakota and a member of one of the first air show acts to perform in South Dakota. It is fitting that we honor Ole Fahlin in the South Dakota Aviation Hall of Fame.

(Signed and dated August 22, 1992.)
