A VISIT TO OUR SISTER'S HOUSE: EAA Chapter 1114

A couple of months ago, I had the opportunity and privilege of attending our closest sister, <u>EAA</u> <u>Chapter 1114</u> at Cox Field in Apex. Cox Field, or NC81, is a privately owned grassy-runway airport flanked by homes and hangers. It's located at 1616 Hwy. 64 W., Apex, NC 27523, which is just north of

Dave Kerr, who is an active member of both Chapter 879 and Chapter 1114, invited me to visit (thanks, Dave). I arrived just as their famous breakfast was ending. It was my plan to get there just in time for the main meeting. Nevertheless, I was greeted by unfamilar faces who immediately made me feel welcomed by engaging with me. Normally, I am one of those folks who sort of standoff by himself and observe without reaching out to meet people. That behavior often leaves me feeling isolated and apart from the group. 1114's members would have none of that. They actively made me feel a part of the group.

While talking with 1114's members Dave showed up and invited me inside. At the time, I was standing atop a deck on the 2nd floor and had yet to dawn the meeting hall. When we entered, breakfast food was still available. I graciously declined at least 2 or 3 people to foretake; I had eaten breakfast before arriving. There were eggs, sausage, and biscuits left over and available in a self-serve buffet-style arrangement spread out on a 6-feet to 8-feet set of tables. At the time, breakfast had officially ended,

and there was evidence of other entrées that were apparently consumed.

WHAT WERE THE 5 BEST SELLING PISTON-DRIVEN PLANES OF 2023?

For an Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) chapter to focus on the sales record of certificated

aircraft falls within the mission statement of EAA, "To grow participation in aviation by promoting the 'Spirit of Aviation.'" I thought it might interest you to see the five best-selling certificated piston planes for 2023. The

list below comes directly from General

Aviation News article titled [the] 10 best-selling piston airplanes in 2023.

- 1. Cirrus SR22T (Figure 1)
- 2. Cessna Skyhawk (Figure 2)
- 3. Piper Pilot 100i (Figure 3)
- 4. Cirrus SR22 (Figure 4)
- 5. Diamond DA40 (Figure 5)

As the name implies, the article mentions five additional best-selling planes in the piston category. What I find interesting is that collectively, Cirrus has out-sold its competitors by a wide margin, selling almost five hundred aircraft with the SR22x designation. Cirrus sold 497 units, to be exact.

1. The SR22T takes the number one spot on the list with a whopping 355 units sold. The SR22T with its Continental TSIO-550-K 315 HP Turbocharged Engine is impressive for a 4-seater piston-powered aircraft. Cirrus boasts some of its features as being jet-like. The SR22T might be considered a status symbol for the 4-seater piston class of aircraft.



- 2. In second place is the iconic Cessna Skyhawk, with 180 units sold. While the article failed to give us a picture of who the customers were, I suspect that many units were sold to flight schools. Since many of us trained on the C172, I can see why it would be in the top five.
- 3. I was surprised that the Piper Pilot 100i took third place, mainly because I am not that familiar with the Pilot 100i. However, a

Figure 3: Piper Pilot 100i cursory visit to Piper's website reveals that it, too, is considered a trainer. Hence, I suspect the flight schools were the majority of customers.

4. The Cirrus SR22 without the T (for turbo) designation took fourth place. The SR22 is fast. The parachute built into the aircraft obviously provides its owners with an added degree of confidence in the plane. I use the

disclaimer "obviously" because this is based on my gut feeling, and I've done zero research to support this claim. Cirrus sold 142 SR22s in 2023.

5. In fifth-place is the Diamond DA40.
Again, aimed at flight schools as well as private owners, the DA40 is an impressive aircraft. It's available with two engine obtions: an Austro Engine AE 300 turbocharged diesel variant, or; a Lycoming IO-360 consuming AVGAS. Depending on the variant the ower can cruise upto



154kts or sip 5.4 gallons of fuel per *Figure 5: Diamond DA40* hour while cruising. It's no wonder Diamond sold 119 units of this aircraft.
