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LOCAL PILOT RECEIVES WRIGHT BROTHERS MASTER PILOT AWARD







Eligibility
To be eligible for the Wright
Brothers MPA, nominees
must meet the following
criteria:

- Hold a U.S. Civil Aviation Authority (CCA) or Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) pilot certificate.
- Have 50 or more years of civil and military flying experience.
 - Up to 20 years of the required 50 years may be U.S. military experience.
 - The effective start date for the 50 years is the date of the nominee's first solo flight or military equivalent.

The 50 years may be computed consecutively or non-consecutively.

He first took the controls of an airplane, a J-3, in 1965 at the age of 20. A year later he had his private pilot's license, and fifty-plus years after that he is still flying. In fact, Steve DeClue of our local EAA Chapter 968 recently was awarded the Wright Brother Master Pilot Award by FAAST Team Manager John Wood of the Portland FSDO at our recent Chapter meeting.

The Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award, named after the first US pilots, is the most prestigious award the FAA issues to pilots. It is created to recognize individuals who have exhibited professionalism, skill, and aviation expertise for at least 50 years while piloting aircraft as "Master Pilots."

It all began for Steve when he was a student at The Citadel: the Military College of South Carolina. There he had the opportunity to fly a number of different kinds of planes including the Piper Cub J-3 and J-4, the T-34, PA 28, Cherokee 6, Cessna 150, 172, and the Aircoupe. Later Steve owned a Cherokee 160 and a Cessna 180.

Fifty years of flying gives a pilot a remarkable perspective. Steve has seen a lot of changes in general aviation. "Today's pilots are more disciplined," he says. But they have to be, he explained. "Just the airspace is more complicated and air traffic control." All these factors mean that pilots need to know more than when Steve began, and they need to be constantly learning. But that, Steve said, was for him one of the draws of flying. It is a hobby that requires you to be learning all the time, always sharpening your skills, and being ready for the unexpected.

One thing that Steve says he misses is the camaraderie you used to see at your local airport. There were more private planes, more pilots, and lots more socializing. But, it was also cheaper to be a pilot many years ago.

Steve has shared flying with his wife Sandy for many years. She took ground school courses and flying lessons so that she could understand and assist Steve in their mutual hobby. Sandy was recognized as well through the Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award.

The Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award is the most prestigious award the FAA issues to pilots certified under Title 14 of the Code of Federal Regulations (14 CFR) part 61. This award is named after the Wright Brothers, the first US pilots, to recognize individuals who have exhibited professionalism, skill, and aviation expertise for at least 50 years while piloting aircraft as "Master Pilots".

A distinctive certificate and lapel pin is issued after application review and eligibility requirements have been met. Upon request, a stickpin similar in design to the lapel pin is also provided to the award recipient's spouse in recognition of his or her support to the recipient's aviation career. Once the award has been issued, the recipient's name, city and state will be added to a published "Roll of Honor" located at https://www.faasafety.gov/content/MasterPilot/RecipientList.aspx.
