Cost \$\$/Paint Job

the cost of a paint job for a light sport aircraft?

My best info was based on a one coat application for a BOAC 747, which is also a 100 year anniversary paint job for the Brits. Here are the specif-

ics of dealing with an aircraft of that size and structure. As we all know aluminum requires some special prep if you don't want the paint to blow off on the first flight. Time required to paint one big bird; 312 man hours with a good paint crew.




