

FAA Launches Advisory Committee to Evaluate Commercial Air Tour Safety

The FAA has established the Commercial Air Tour Aviation Rulemaking Committee (Commercial Air Tour ARC), tasked with reviewing, and developing recommendations to increase the safety of such operations. The Commercial Air Tour ARC is in response to Section 363 of the FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024, which requires the FAA to issue a notice of proposed rulemaking (NPRM) to establish increasing safety regulations for commercial air tour operators.

Commercial air tours include operators conducting non-stop sightseeing flights within a 25–statute mile radius of the departure airport as provided for in 14 CFR 119.1(e)(2). These operations include many flight schools offering non-instructional rides, museums, and small single-aircraft/single-pilot operators at local airports. Congress provided a small business provision that exempts operators conducting 100 or fewer commercial air tours in a calendar year from having to comply with the provision of the NPRM resulting from the ARC recommendations.

The FAA is now soliciting nominations for participation in the Commercial Air Tour ARC. Nominees must either be representatives of industry (including manufacturers of aircraft and aircraft technologies), air tour operators or organizations that represent such operators, or aviation safety experts with specific knowledge of safety management systems and flight data monitoring programs under 14 CFR Part 135.

As a provider of commercial air tours utilizing several types of aircraft, including Ford Tri-Motor rides on national tour, biplane rides at Pioneer Airport, and helicopter rides at AirVenture, EAA will be asking to participate in the ARC. With decades of safe air tour operations, extensive maintenance experience, and a fully implemented safety management system, EAA is poised to provide a real-world perspective to the FAA.

Those looking to nominate potential participants, including self-nominations, must follow the directions published in the <u>Federal Register notice</u>. Nominations must be received by 5 p.m. on February 28, 2025.

BasicMed, did you know?

BasicMed which took effect in 2017, allows pilots to fly without holding an FAA medical certificate provided they meet certain conditions. The FAA Reauthorization Act of 2024 required the FAA to expand BasicMed to: • Increase the number of allowable passengers to six from five, and the number of occupants to seven from six. • Increase the maximum aircraft takeoff weight to 12,500 lbs. from 6,000 lbs., excluding transport category helicopters • Allow pilot examiners to conduct flight checks using BasicMed in aircraft that are covered by the BasicMed rule.

John Elliot's Fokker Triplane at Warrenton-Fauquier Airport in Virginia has successfully been installed with a 1918 LeRhone rotary engine, which had not run since November 12, 1918, and which had never before been mounted on an airplane before now. The engine was found a number of years ago still in its factory crate, complete with a tool set and a three-page record log. John bought the engine last year and sent it to rotary engine specialist Fred Murrin in Pennsylvania for rebuild, who also built the engine mount, fuel/oil tank, and new cowling, and did the installation in John's existing airframe.

FG-1D Corsair BuNo 92050: A Storied Warbird Finds a New Home with Timmermans Legends of Flight


Timmermans Legends of Flight adds the former Warbird Heritage Foundation aircraft to its vintage collection.

A letter from John

ON OCTOBER 18, I was elected to succeed Susan Dusenbury as president of the Vintage Aircraft Association upon her retirement date of January 1, 2025. I want to thank Susan for her leadership since becoming president in February 2017. Under her guidance, VAA has become financially stable, with infrastructure improvements around our Vintage Village at EAA AirVenture Oshkosh, including improvements in the VAA Red Barn, the Vintage Bookstore, and the Tall Pines Café. This culminated with the construction of the Charles W. Harris Youth Aviation Center, which opened during AirVenture 2024. Thank you, Susan, for all you have done.

My background is in aviation maintenance and restoration and the nonprofit association world. As a child in the 1970s, I started with plastic models and radio-controlled airplanes. I progressed to flying lessons in an Aeronca Champ and finished my private pilot certificate at age 18 in a Cessna 172. Along the way, I became an EAA member in 1982 and a VAA member in 1988. I moved to Indiana in 1990 and sought an EAA chapter to join. I found EAA Chapter 226, from the Anderson and Muncie area. This group of enthusiasts was, and still is, active in building and restoring aircraft. I eventually became secretary and then president of this group. There, I started my first project, a Taylorcraft L-2, and went to A&P mechanic school in Indianapolis.

When school was finished, I worked as a technical writer for Rolls-Royce Jet Engines (Allison Engine Co.). I mainly worked with T-56 engines and the V-22 Osprey, where I was responsible for the aircraft's first engine operations manual.

After moving to Milwaukee in 1997, I worked for Ken Cook Co. During this time, I wrote manuals and handled marketing for Beechcraft and several boat companies. I also enjoyed

being on the editing team for Duane Cole's final book, Airport Memories. Duane was a gentleman, and I treasured our conversations.

The year 2002 marked a career change when I transitioned from technical writing to association.

management. Over the next 20 years, I learned a great deal about nonprofit and membership. association retention, governance, financial management, and executive leadership. Through former VAA board member and mentor Steve Krog, I was invited to be a part of VAA leadership, first as an adviser and then as a board member, and I was elected in 2017. With the help of board member Earl Nicholas, we worked to grow our membership. Since starting in 2013, our membership has increased from 5,000 to 6,200 members, with a retention rate of 88 percent, the highest of the EAA divisions. During the pandemic, I led the redesign of the VAA website and thoroughly enjoyed my time volunteering at AirVenture.

I have a passion for vintage aircraft, which I see as time machines that transport me to a simpler era. Flying and maintaining them is incredibly enjoyable. The friendships fostered through these airplanes are invaluable, often more meaningful than the aircraft themselves. They serve as a common bond among great friends. Right now, I own a J-3 Cub, and I'm close to completing a 1932 Great Lakes. I have several other projects awaiting their turn. I hope I'll have enough time to Finish them all!
