Jon will discuss the catch 22 involving the medical requirements and the use of the driver's license for Sport Aviation.

## **Eyewitness Report for FAA Accident Report**

Witness: Line Service Attendant

Aircraft: Cessna 172

Pilot: Commercial- Airplane Single Engine Land,

Instrument, CFI Fatalities: None Damage: Substantial Date: July 10, 1982

Pilot came to airport at 9 a.m. Fueler reported that the padlock on his hangar was so rusted that he had to break it off with a 10# ball-peen hammer.

Also had to inflate all three tires and scrape pigeon droppings off the windshield.

After several attempts to drain the fuel strainer, the pilot finally got what looked like fuel out of the wing sumps. Couldn't get the oil dipstick out of the engine, but said it was okay last time he looked.

Engine started okay, but ran rough for about 1/2 minute, then died. Then the battery would not turn the prop.

Used a battery cart and although starter was smoking real good, it finally started and the prop wash blew the smoke away.

Fueler offered to fill the airplane up, but the pilot said he was late for an appointment at a nearby airport. Said it wasn't far.

Taxied about half way out to the active runway and the engine stopped. Pushed it back to the fuel pumps and bought three gallons for the left wing tank.

Started it again. This time he was almost all the way to the runway when the engine stopped. Put a little rock under the nose wheel; hand propped it; and was seen still trying to climb into the airplane as it went across the runway. Finally got in; blew out the right main tire trying to stop before the pavement ended.

When he taxied back in to have the tire changed, he also had 3 more gallons put into the right wing.

Witness, who saw the takeoff, said the aircraft lined up and took off to the north. Takeoff looked fairly

normal- nose rotated about 300 feet down the runway. At midfield the nose came down. Engine coughed twice, then cut power and applied the brakes, which made both doors fly open and a big fat brown book fell out on the runway and released probably a million little white pages with diagrams on them. Looked like sort of a snowstorm.

After several real loud run-ups at the end, he turned her back around and took off in the other direction going south into the wind. Only this time he horsed her off at the and pulled up really steep like the one of them jet fighter planes, to about 300 feet, then the engine quit!

Did a sort of a slow turn back toward the airport-kinda like that Art Scholl guy, and about 30 feet off the McDonalds cafe she start roaring again.

He did sort of a high speed pass down the runway, put the flaps down to full and that sucker went up like he was going to do an Immelman!

The engine quit again and he turned right and I thought he was coming through the front window of the flight school; but he pulled her up- right into the TV antenna and the little rooster on the roof- you know the one with that like N-E-S-W things and an arrow. Went over the building and then bounced a main off the roof of three different cars in the parking lot- a Porsche, a VW, and Doc Brown's new El Dorado.

When he bounced off the El Dorado, the engine roared to life and he got her flying.

Came around toward the runway and set her down... once on the overrun, once on the runway, and once on the grass beside it.

He taxied into the ramp- shut her down and ordered three more gallons of gas. Said it was for safety's sake.

Then he asked where the phone booth was as he had to call his student and tell him he was going to be a little bit late.

## A Brief Biography of Jon Dee Hansen

Jon has been involved in aviation for more than 55 years. He took his first flight instruction at the age of 12. Jon purchased his first airplane at the age of 15 and recovered it in time to solo it on his 16th birthday. He received his private license a year later and his commercial license at the age of 18. Like many of us, Jon swept hangars and washed airplanes to get rides and gas money to go flying. He started his commercial flying at the age of 18 as a crop duster and aircraft mechanic and has more

than 30,000 hours of flight time. Jon's FAA ratings include ATP, Airplane SEL and MEL and with type ratings from DC3 to L1011.

After spending 5 years in the Air Force Reserve, Jon joined the Navy earning his Navy Wings in 1960 and was discharged in 1962, rising to the rank of Lt. jg. While in the Navy Jon made over 250 carrier landings. Following the navy, Jon spent 33 years with Delta Airlines flying a variety of aircraft including the DC6, DC7,DC8 and the Boeing 747 and was a Delta captain for 23 years retiring in 1996. Jon's many organization memberships include EAA, AOPA and ALPA.

# The Fly-Over

Back in the 1950's, I flew out of Tamiami Airport, approximately 5 miles south of Miami International. This wasn't a problem for Tamiami pilots, but about once or twice a year, planes heading for MIA mistook the Tamiami runway for MIA. With a 3000 foot runway, it wasn't too hard to get in, but getting out was a problem! One time a formation flight of three Marine Corps jets made this mistake, blowing out their tires on landing. Of course, they were trucked out.

Liberty Aviation was located there, and at Liberty there accumulated a group of pilots and other flying enthusiasts. Liberty was somewhat informal with pilots handling their own office duties, such as writing out their own bills and placing their money in the cash register.

Periodically on weekends we all got together to fly down to Tavernier Airport. Now this wasn't a "formal" airport, just a grass strip that wasn't even on the maps. We generally sent an Ercoupe in first to land and make several runs back and forth to cut the grass. The rest of the high winged aircraft would follow, the smallest planes first (closest to the ground) and the larger ones behind that.

We generally spent the day on the beach, leaving early enough to get back to Tamiami just before sunset. But on this particular day, we left just a little early to work in a fly-over over the local nudist camp.

"Camp" was the wrong word for this place, as they had a lovely spot just short of the Everglades swamp. It had a nice picnic area and a very large pool. It was surrounded by trees, offering a lot of privacy.

We all lined up as we approached the area. I was in a Cessna 150 with my friend, Joan. There were about 10 aircraft and we dropped below the treetop level as we flew in, in order to muffle our engines. Then we climbed above the treetops and zoomed in.

People went flying everywhere. Some jumped into the pool, some grabbed towels, some just stood there gaping. There really wasn't much time to "see" anything, but it sure was fun!

When we got back to Tamiami we were told that the C.A.A. had called, but since there was no rule regarding the size or the placement of the "N" number on the aircraft, and no one was admitting anything... well, 'nuf said.

# LEGAL BILLS MOUNT FOR CHICAGO ON ILLEGAL MEIGS CLOSURE

Crain's Chicago Business reports this week that the City of Chicago has spent over a half million dollars fighting the FAA over fines relating to the midnight demolition of Meigs Field on March 30, 2003. That total includes over \$200,000 in legal bills fighting a \$33,000 fine for closing without proper notice. The rest has been spent on fighting an investigation on the city's alleged improper diversion of airport revenues to demolish the airport, which could end up costing Chicago taxpayers fines of nearly \$9 million.


"Not only was the City of Chicago's midnight destruction of Meigs illegal, this shows how desperate they are to justify their actions in the public eye," said Friends of Meigs President Steve Whitney. "Mayor Daley has taken a huge public relations black eye from the Meigs issue, and now he is under constant pressure from a string of other scandals, too."

# Pilot Finds Snake Stowaway Inside Cockpit By Associated Press

CHARLESTON, W.Va. - Monty Coles was 3,000 feet in the air when he discovered a stowaway peeking out at him from the plane's instrument panel: a 4 1/2-foot snake.

Coles was taking a leisurely flight over the West Virginia countryside in his Piper Cherokee last weekend and was preparing to land in Ohio when the snake revealed itself.

"Nothing in any of the manuals ever described anything like this," said the 62-year-old Cross Lanes resident.

But advice given 25 years earlier from his flight instructor sprung to mind: "No matter what happens, fly the plane."

Coles attempted to swat the snake but it fell to the pilot's feet, then darted to the other side of the cockpit.

While maintaining control of the single-engine plane with one hand, Coles grabbed the reptile behind its head with his other.

"There was no way I was letting that thing go," he said. "It coiled all around my arm, and its tail grabbed hold of a lever on the floor and started pulling."

The next step was to radio for emergency landing clearance.

"They came back and asked what my problem was," he said. "I told them I had one hand full of snake and the other hand full of plane. They cleared me in."

After a smooth landing, Coles posed for pictures with the snake, then let it loose.

"That snake resides in Ohio now," he said.

The purpose of the Candler Airfield Museum is to recreate the old Atlanta, Georgia Airport as it existed in the early 1930's and to restore and preserve antique aircraft through a flying museum.

The museum is a tax exempt 501c organization relying on donations from individuals and corporations. The plan includes a total of seven (7) museum buildings to be constructed over a period of several years. Initial construction of the first hangar will begin in 2006.

Progress is being made at the Candler Field Museum. We were very fortunate to have a front page article in the Business section of the Atlanta Journal - Constitution published on May 3, 2006. The article was written by Dave Hirschman - a pilot and fellow antique airplane enthusiast. We are in the process of restoring an original 1918 Curtiss JN4D "Jenny". Brian Karli is responsible for this project. As many of you know, the Curtiss Jenny was a regular visitor of Candler Field during the 1920's. We hope to have this one complete and flying within the next 2-3 years.

The meeting was called to order by Duane Huff. These are notes from the meeting.

1. We reviewed the hangar use policy as written up by Debi Huffman. This document defines such things as priority of scheduling, how to reserve the building, user fees, and responsibilities of those who use the building. We decided to include the EAA 690 HANGAR

USE: CLEAN-UP CHECKLIST as an integral third page of this document, and also added a note to indicate that all donated material must be formally accepted by the board of trustees. For those not familiar, the responsibility of the board of trustees is to maintain and keep up with chapter assets and facilities. This is item nine on the action item list.

2. Duane volunteered an ordinary (non-programmable, non heat pump) thermostat as a solution to the problem of the a/c compressor incorrectly running when the northern overhead HVAC unit is switched to "heat". Our HVAC units are not heat pump units, and they use ordinary electric strip heaters for the heating function.

The Board of Directors (BoD) meeting was called to order by Jamie Painter, Chairman.

The following reports were made by chapter officers and committee chairmen:

- Sport Pilot Tour Stop The only known outstanding issue with the Light Sport event at EAA 690 is reimbursement by EAA Headquarters for one remaining item. Duane Huff will follow-up with Oshkosh staff.
- Membership Cliff Aiken reported we currently have 172 paid members. Approximately 87 members have not renewed their membership for 2006; many of those did not renew for 2005. Further, a few members who have aircraft based in EAA Hangars have not renewed their membership. Lnor and Cliff make a list and notify these members.




