Chapter Vice President John Reitz Announces Program for Friday, April 14th Meeting

Have you ever started a project that gets really out of hand, really fast? If you've built an airplane you have, and Greg Richter can vouch for it. He ended up building a Cozy with

a General Electric T58 jet engine, but couldn't get his mind settled on a panel full of Ye Olde Steam Gauges as cockpit instrumentation.

Here's where it got out of hand: His pet EFIS/FMCS project turned into, 12 years later, a company, that makes the high performing EFIS available for small planes.

Greg Richter, Founder of Blue Mountain Avionics, Grew up in central Georgia, and picked up electronics early. He holds both amateur radio, commercial radiotelephone and radiotelegraph licenses, having acquired the licenses in his early teens.

Greg is a graduate of Georgia Tech, holding a Bachelor of Electrical Engineering and is a Grumman Aerospace scholar and a member of the IEEE.

If weather permits, Greg will be flying his Cozy Jet powered experimental to LZU for his presentation on the EFIS system, with highest terrain mapping and the most configurable engine system available for light aircraft.

With a little encouragement, I'm sure we can get him to talk about his Jet powered Cozy.

FIRST FLY AWAY OF THE 2006 SEASON PLANNED FOR SATURDAY, APRIL 8th

Spring is finally here, and it is time for EAA 690's first fly-away of the season.

For our first fly-away, the destination is near-by Peach State airfield (GA02). The date of departure from LZU is Saturday, 8 April at 9:00 A.M. From LZU flying time is approximately 45 minutes for those of us flying "leisurely" aircraft. If flying in from departure points other than LZU, plan on meeting at GA02 approximately 10:00 A.M. For those of us unable to attend Sun-N-Fun this year, this flyaway destination is a great consolation. Peach State offers a "rolling" grass strip and is a gathering place for a variety of older and antique aircraft.

Chapter 690's new fly-away chairman (and his flight director) took an opportunity to make a pre fly-in "inspection" visit to Peach State, and while there, during the off peak hours, reports that he witnessed the arrival and departure of a variety of aircraft including gyrocopters and hot air balloons.

Of course, no fly-away is complete without the obligatory \$100 hamburger, and this is no exception. The Barnstormer Restaurant offers a full salad bar as well as the more traditional menu, and enjoys a reputation for some of the best airport food in the north central Georgia region. With 5 booths, 5 "picnic" style tables, and a banquet room, there is plenty of room inside for all. There is even outside seating to allow an up close and personal view of arrival & departure activity. The restaurant and outside viewing area are less than 50' from the runway center line, so all viewing truly is up close and personal.

Airport Master Plan Meeting

Attendees at the March 20th Master Plan Briefing were given a lot of information about possible future expansion at LZU. The process includes data collection, forecasts, likely capacities and needs ands alternatives. In addition to projected growth, environmental factors have to be taken into consideration.

The Airport has advertised for quotes for new electric signs. Other plans for improvements include relocation of the beacons, an obstruction removal project and security upgrades.





The proposed expansion has implications for both airport tenants and users – if you were not at the meeting, find out how changes will effect you, and complete a comment form!


Power Point Presentation from Airport Management

TODAY -Work in the Environmental Scoping Study (Phase I Master Plan) indicates continued growth in aviation activity.




Several alternatives were presented for the proposed 2nd runway – and length is only one consideration:


Potential Option One - 3.500'

Memories

Have you ever been cleaning out a box full of old junk and run across your ORIGINAL log book? Well that's what recently happened to me! I thought this was long gone, a victim of many moves. But there it was! It wasn't the little log book we purchase for our students. It was a large, airline pilot type of log book! The binding was torn and tattered and the pages were loose, but it was all there.



According to this log, I soloed on March 25th, 1954, after four hours of training, mostly take-offs and landings, in Aeronca N84958. I obtained my Private Pilot's license on May 13th, 1954.

Two days after that I flew with my friend, Joan Merriman, to Cuba to take part in the Cuban Pilot's Day celebration. Batista was in power, and he viewed private pilots in a very favorable light. We landed at a small airport several miles West of Havana. The most memorable thing about that trip was that we took part in their massive parade.

We actually landed in downtown Havana on the Malecon Boulevard, coming in over the ocean and landing towards the center of town.

We taxied along the parade route. Being both young and naive, Joan and I had no idea of what was in store for us. The parade route was completely unguarded, and the watchers had no hesitation about running up to the airplane to touch it, or to crossing the street in front of the aircraft. After the parade, we took off downwind, towards the ocean, and flew back to our airport.

My next great adventure was in Cessna 170, N3950V. The 99's were holding their sixth annual air race, from Washington, D.C. to Havana, Cuba. (See photo on right.) It was a handicapped race, handicapped by the speed of the aircraft. The youngest girl in the race was Joan, at 18, and the oldest was Zaddie Bunker, 69. Zaddie got lost and had to be rescued by another pilot.

My sponsor was the Delaware Cooperative Mushroom Corporation, canners of First State Mushrooms. They sponsored me to the tune of \$1,000.00.

I flew first to Logan's airport in Pennsylvania to visit with my family. Then, on June 5th, 1955, I flew to the old Washington National Airport to prepare for take-off the next day.

We were required to make mandatory overnight stops, and were timed between our official take-offs and landings. Any stops in between counted against our timed handicap.

We reached Cuba on June 14th, landing at the same airport as the previous year. This time each aircraft was met by one or more of the bachelor Cuban pilots, bearing Banana Daiquiries. They helped us tie down and provided transportation to our hotel.

Then began several days of celebration. There was a massive banquet with our pilot hosts. Anytime we left the hotel, the street vendors and shopkeepers coaxed us into their domain and presented us with gifts. Strangers stopped us on the street to speak to us, even though we didn't know what they were saying. The papers had articles about us, even praising our heroism for flying across "90 miles of shark-infested waters."

We left Cuba with lots of wonderful memories, re-entering the US via Key West and a nominal clearing of Customs. Home again!

The Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA) Sport Pilot Tour, which opens the exciting new world of sport flying to people throughout the country, will be kicking off its 2006 spring/summer schedule in the Atlanta, Ga., area on April 29. The start of the new tour schedule comes after the grand success of the final fall/winter tour stop in the Phoenix/Mesa, Ariz., area in February.

"What we have discovered in our Sport Pilot Tour stops this fall and winter is that people are ready to go flying now, with the lower time and cost barriers now available through the sport pilot rule," said Bob Warner, EAA senior vice president. "EAA has brought together the airplanes, the instructors and the potential pilots in one place in our tour stops. Once these groups get together, the enthusiasm and passion for flying come naturally!"

The April 29 tour stop will be held at Gwinnett County Airport (LZU) in Lawrenceville, GA, just NE of Atlanta. EAA Chapter 690 will host the event in Chapter and adjacent member's facilities.

Other upcoming stops, with more likely to be added, include:

- * May 6: Smyrna, Tenn. (Nashville area)
- * June 17: Romeoville, III. (Chicago area)
- * Aug. 19: Minneapolis, Minn.
- * Dec. 2: Riverside, Calif. (Los Angeles area)
- * Dec. 9: San Diego, Calif.

The EAA Sport Pilot Tour arrives in each location with the information and tools needed to seize and enjoy this recreational-aviation opportunity, for both experienced pilots and new fliers. That includes some of the brand-new, ready-to-fly light-sport aircraft and informative talk sessions to help people get started in this new facet of personal flight.

The tour shows people how they can get into the sky as a pilot with less time and expense than ever thought possible. Hundreds of interested pilots and potential aviators discover that sport pilot can make dreams of flight a reality in well-manufactured, safe aircraft and with thorough instruction.

The EAA Sport Pilot Tour includes many activities and programs, including:

- * Forums that explain what you need to begin realizing your own dream of flight:
- * Flight instructors that will answer your questions on how to get started;
- * Aircraft available now for fun flying, at less than half the cost of a traditional small airplane;

EAA worked with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) for more than a decade to create a category of pilots and aircraft to meet the needs of those who fly purely for recreation. Sport pilots can be new entrants to aviation, experienced aviators looking for a simple, back-to-basics way to enjoy flying, or those who want to build their flying skills and eventually pursue more advanced piloting.

"We'll be showing our members, other aviators, and the public that this is an exciting time for recreational aviation, which is rapidly moving to the fore as an affordable outdoor-adventure pastime," said Ron Wagner, EAA manager of field relations, who has met and talked with thousands of aviation enthusiasts about sport pilot during the past year.

FAA will participate with EAA during these tour stops, giving credit for "Wings" safety seminar attendance for participating in Sport Pilot Tour safety programs related to light-sport aviation. Other tour highlights include sport pilot forums, education for flight instructors, issuance of student sport pilot certificates, plus light-sport aircraft manufacturer displays and demonstrations.

Memorandum from Matthew Smith re: Gwinnett County Airport C.O.P.S.

Date: March 16, 2006

As I am sure you are aware, the Gwinnett County Airport Authority has taken several pro-active steps to increase the security of the airport since it was revealed that a stolen aircraft was flown into the airport. One of these steps is the implementation of a program modeled after the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association (AOPA) Airport Watch program.

This program is being implemented in conjunction with the Gwinnett County Police Department and their existing Community Oriented Policing Services (C.O.P.S.) program. You may already be aware of the C.O.P.S. program through your homeowners association or your neighborhood. The police describe C.O.P.S. as a neighborhood watch program on steroids. The police department has agreed to work with the airport to implement a specially tailored program for the airport — the Gwinnett County Airport C.O.P.S. program. This program is a way for the airport to increase security with only a small investment of time.

However, this type of program cannot be successful unless the airport businesses and tenants actively participate. The cornerstone component of this program is communication. Therefore, I am asking that each business designate one person as a Business Security Coordinator (BSC). The BSC will need to attend the C.O.P.S. meetings and to act as a spokesperson for the business; relaying any concerns the business may have and disseminating any information they receive from the program to members of the business.

I am also asking that individual airport tenants actively participate in this program. As mentioned previously, communication is vital to the program. As the users of the airport, you are in a position to observe and report activities that may not occur during normal business hours.

In order to facilitate the first C.O.P.S. meeting, the Gwinnett County Police have asked that each business and any interested tenants complete the attached survey. The results of the survey will be tallied and a program will be tailored to address the concerns outlined in the results.

Please return the survey form no later than Friday, April 7, 2006 to the airport administration offices. The first C.O.P.S. meeting will take place on Tuesday, May 16, 2006 at 7:30 p.m. at the EAA Chapter 690 Hangar – 690 Airport Road, Lawrenceville, GA 30045.

Zenith 601 Fly-In at EAA 690

EAA690's March Pancake Breakfast brought out a record number of pilots who had gotten cabin fever during the last couple of months of bad weather. It was also the first Fly-In of Zenith 601 HDS and 601XL experimental airplanes. The Chapter's own Greg Jannakos and Ron DeWees were met by Bill Phillips from Thomaston-Upson airport, and Jim Pensinger from Greenville,TN. Ron and Greg have built Zenith 601 HDS planes and Jim and Bill have a more recent model called the 601 XL. There were a lot of curious folks looking at the planes and many had never seen a Zenith 601 so I thought I would share a bit of information about them. Three out of the 4 planes are powered by Australian Jabiru 3300 6 cylinder 120 hp motors, while Greg's uses a converted Corvair automobile engine. All of these Zenith planes are simple, two seat, all metal planes that use pulled rivet construction. Building time is claimed to be 500 hours as opposed to several thousand for RV-type planes that use bucked rivets.



These sporty planes run on about 5 gallons of auto fuel per hour and can cruise at up to 140 mph so they are a great alternative to a 35 year old Cessna 172 or a 6 year building project. Built carefully they also qualify for the Light Sport Aircraft category and would be a great choice of a plane to fly with a Sport Pilot License. Ron's 601 is built as a taildragger while the others are conventional nose-geared planes. The taildragger has a sporty look and feel to it and handling is easily learned. The full-flying rudder on all models makes crosswind handling easy with large margins of control and safety.

This was the first 601 Fly-In and there is another planned for Winder (WDR) March 18th for lunch at the Spitfire Grill. 
