#### It's A Wrap

I want to tell all of you how much I've enjoyed being your President these last four years. I'm proud of what we've accomplished together along the way. We have steadily increased our membership over these four years hitting at least 300 the past three years. This year we topped out at 315 people comprised of 70 family memberships, 122 individual memberships, 2 paid student memberships and 33 free student memberships. We've seen good attendance at our breakfasts from month to month which has kept our kitchen net revenue strong from year to year. We owe a huge thank you to Jill East and her kitchen crew as they continue to excel for the chapter. Over the four years we've had several special dinners also, allowing us time to enjoy each other's fellowship and enjoy some great food. To all of those that took part in the preparation of those meals, I thank you.

Our Young Eagle program, under the direction of Duane Huff, has continued to be something the chapter should be proud of. We are now 16<sup>th</sup> overall among all EAA chapters in Young Eagles flown. This year alone we had 65 volunteers help with Young Eagles. This was the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the program and we had several pilots that made it onto the 25 for 25 club. We added several new pilots this year and I hope we can add more in the coming years. We also had several of our youth program members step forward and volunteer with the ground crew throughout the year.

In association with AeroVentures and the AOPA we've held several very successful Rusty Pilot seminars at the hangar averaging 30 or more attendees at each event. My thanks to all of those that worked to make those events a success.

We had the opportunity to host the EAA Tri-Motor and B-17 during the four years as well as the DC-3. These were all successful events for us and in each case, we had a great group of volunteers to assist with the operations. This October we hosted the B-17 at PDK during Atlanta Warbird Weekend and even though weather impacted us on Friday and canceled Sunday we managed to get a bunch of flights in on Saturday after having to wait until after noon to get started. Once again, our youth members came through strong and handled the bulk of the duties during the event.

We've had some great speakers and programs over the four years. I want to thank Kathi Parks for coming forward to take over that responsibility and seeing that we always had someone great to listen to. Great speakers and programs help to turn out folks for our breakfasts. For our Friday night business meetings, we did introduce the summer movie series during May, June and July where we watched some great movies and enjoyed popcorn and sodas.

Our Summer Camp continued to be strong. We certainly owe a debt of gratitude to Debi Huffman for starting the summer camp program during her tenure as President and giving us a solid base to build upon year after year. I look forward to seeing the program continue to grow as it moves forward.

The RV-12 project is something that has increased chapter involvement over the last two years. What started as a dinner conversation between a few pilots turned into a full-fledged project. It has been gratifying to see members coming out to work on the plane. I hope we will see the completion of the plane within the next year. We do have some funding hurdles to overcome to get there, but I am sure we will work them out.

A little over two years ago we started a youth program within the chapter. Initially we started with a ground school taught by Mike Burns. That ground school continues today. Mike had to stop teaching the class, but we found Sky Powers to take over and keep it going and when Sky changed employment from Spirit to Southwest Paul England took it over. Once the ground school was up and running we added the build program for youth 14 and up with an interest in aviation. We started by working on an Ultra-Lite Pietenpol project and have expanded this year to include a full size Pietenpol and a BD-6. The BD-6 kit was donated by the Bede Family Foundation. The youth are also working on a Corvair engine that will be used as a cutaway learning tool for the youth. We may soon begin work on another engine. It is exciting to go to hangar 6 and see this group of young adults working on these projects. They are learning to use tools and equipment and getting skills they never thought possible.

Beyond everything they are learning they are earning credits while they work. These credits can be used for flight training once they have accumulated around 100 hours. This year we have seen four of youth began training in earnest. The first to get going was Jeremy Welch. Jeremy is a driven individual. He had a goal of soloing on his 16<sup>th</sup> birthday, he missed by two days and does have his check ride scheduled for his 17<sup>th</sup> birthday. Jeremy has also become a ground crew volunteer at our Young Eagle events. We also saw Steven Agudelo, Alex Kirkland and Maddie Hale solo this year. As we say in the youth program, we are "Building the Future of Aviation".

The flight training these young folks are getting is being conducted by the Aero Ventures Flying Club. The chapter pays for the rental of the clubs Cessna 150 and John Post and Fred Huppertz have been donating instructional time for these folks. Please be sure to let John and Fred know how much you appreciate their contribution to this program. Without them, it would not be successful.

Since its beginning we have had sixty-nine youth participate in the program with a current active roster of twenty-nine youth. We have a waiting list of thirteen at this point in time. The current active members have amassed nearly 2400 hours of time working on these projects.

What makes the youth program tick is the time and effort that our mentors put into the program. We focused this year on increasing that group. Our current crew consists of Joel Levine, Hugh Colton, Art Farmer, Louis Pucci, Andrew Robinson, John Morrow, Keith Oliver, Frank Lipinski, Duane Huff, Jack McKnight and Steven Agudelo. We would love to add a few more names to this list so we can work on more projects and add more youth to the roster. If you feel led to be a part of the group just let one of us know or just come out on a Saturday morning and join in. My thanks to all of you that have helped today and in the past with our youth.

I would be remiss if I did not mention what really has made the youth program and the RV-12 project possible. It takes space to house these projects and because of the generosity of Larry and Laura Bishop we would not have that space today. Their donation of hangar 6, Bishop Education Hangar, and its contents made these possible. We were saddened to lose Larry back in March, but his legacy with the chapter lives on.

A group that does not get a lot of recognition in the chapter is the Board of Trustees. Over my four years it has been my pleasure to work with this group in getting things taken care of in both of our hangars. A lot of what they do goes unnoticed, but they accomplish a lot for the chapter. Most recently they wired the simulator room for internet connectivity since the WiFi can be spotty in that room. During my four years members of the Trustees have included Billy Stewart, Brian Michael, Dave Ostergaard, Doug Wagner, Lee Olson, Steve Marlow, Hugh Colton, Mike Burns, Chris Capps, Ron Childress, Louis Pucci, Chuck Roberts and John Kimmons. Joining the group beginning in January will be John Morrow and Bill Miller with John Bongart taking the last year of Ron Childress term.

I've also had the pleasure to work with some wonderful people on the Board of Directors over these four years. They have included John Morgan, Shellie Kirk, Jeanne Ferguson, Rich Hopkins, Brian Michael, Debi Huffman, John Post, Karmen Sunshine, Joel Levine, Chuck Roberts, Gay Roberts and Duane Huff.

As I wrap this up, I look forward to the next two years as the chapter continues to move forward and grow under Billy Stewart's leadership. I know Billy is excited about this opportunity and will do a great job for you. I look forward to remaining a part of the leadership team as the Treasurer. 

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# **`THEY ALL DO THAT'**

AOPA Aviation eBrief NOVEMBER 29, 2017 / MIKE BUSCH

Years ago, I used to travel throughout the country putting on technical seminars for the Cessna Pilots Association. Whenever we got to the segment about landing gear, we made a point of asking the 20 or 30 assembled Cessna owners attending the seminar for a show of hands:

"How many of you have had a problem with nose wheel shimmy?" Invariably, virtually every owner in the audience raised their hand.

"Okay, how many of you have asked your mechanic about this, only to be told that all Cessnas exhibit nose wheel shimmy, and that it's simply 'the nature of the beast'?"

Usually, at least half the hands remained up. That was not a very reassuring sign about the competence of the mechanics these owners were using to maintain their Cessnas.

#### SHIMMY NORMAL?

Cessna nose wheel shimmy is very common, but it can be corrected and shouldn't be accepted as normal.

Although nose wheel shimmy is extremely common in single-engine Cessnas, it can and should be fixed. Such shimmy is almost always due to one or more of the following: worn torque link bushings, an out-of-round or out-of-balance tire, elongated holes in the shimmy dampener linkage, or a defective shimmy dampener.

A mechanic who dismisses a problem like nose wheel shimmy as "the nature of the beast" and claims that "all Cessnas do that" is just copping out. If a mechanic tells you something like this, you'd be wise to seek a second opinion (and perhaps to change mechanics).



To the best of my knowledge, nobody ever died because of uncorrected

nose wheel shimmy. But from time to time, a mechanic dismisses a genuinely serious problem with "don't worry about it, they all do that." And that's scary.

## **NTSB: GA Fatal Accident Rate Lowest In 50 Years**

AERO New Network, Propwash 11-29-17

Drops To Below One Fatal Accident For Every 100,000 Flight Hours

The NTSB recently released fatal accident data for all modes of transportation in the U.S., including data showing that in 2016, the fatal accident rate for GA aircraft had dropped to its lowest level in 50 years.

According to the Board, aviation deaths decreased slightly from 416 in 2015 to 412 in 2016. Nearly 94 percent of aviation fatalities occurred in general aviation accidents. Air taxi fatalities decreased from 27 in 2015 to 19 in 2016.

Preliminary aviation accident statistics also show an overall decline in the number of US registered civil aviation accidents. Most notably, the number of fatal general aviation accidents decreased to 213 in 2016, resulting in the fatal accident rate dropping below 1 fatal accident per 100,000 flight hours for the first time in 50 years.

Overall, there were no fatal accident involving U.S. registered commercial airlines in 2016. Commuter aircraft were involved in two fatal accidents resulting in eight fatalities, and on-demand flights were involved in 31 total accidents resulting in nine fatalities.

General Aviation aircraft were involved in 1,266 total accidents. Of those, 213 involved fatalities. The Board reports that 386 people were fatally injured in those accidents.


