## **Spins and Parachutes**

By Ian Button An instructor with Georgia Tec's Yellow Jacket Flying Club for three years. Now he's a Newark-based ART-42 and -72 captain, but sometimes misses the days of squeezing into a Cessna 152 and days of endless touch-and-gos.

The reason I'm writing today is about spins and parachutes. I just got a newly-revised Advisory Circular from the FAA on the subject (yes, I still keep up with this stuff): AC 61-67C. We've had discussions on this list before about this subject, and now the FAA has clarified its position. FAR 91.207(c) makes it clear that anyone performing a spin (which this regulation includes among aerobatic maneuvers) would be required to wear a parachute. There is one exception - 91.207(d) allows for the performance of any maneuver required for a certificate or rating with no parachutes when performed with a CFI. Since spins are required for the CFI rating, I was taught and always took this to mean that you could perform spins without a parachute \*if you were training for your CFI\*. In the new AC, this is the text: "301.b. Because spin entry, spins, and spin recovery are required for a flight instructor certificate or rating, a person receiving instruction from a CFI (or ATP acting in accordance with sec. 61.167) NEED NOT [my emphasis] wear an approved parachute while instruction is being provided in these maneuvers. This provision applies regardless of the certificate or rating for which the person is receiving training and also if the person is receiving instruction that is not being provided for the purpose of obtaining any additional certificate or rating. The instructor providing the training is also not required to wear an approved parachute while providing this flight training." In other words, forget what I taught you! Anytime anyone is receiving instruction from a CFI in spins, a parachute is not required.

What do \*I\* think about spin training? I always recommended to my students (but left it to the student to decide) that we do a lesson on spins. As a new pilot, I had the basic idea of spin recovery in my head, but I wasn't really sure if I could make it happen. The first time you see a spin, it is a real eyeopener, but after seeing three or four, they start to feel more predictable. The goal I had from teaching about spins is to show that in the Cessna, spins don't just come out of nowhere, and they can be easily recovered from - assuming you have the altitude to do so. More than one student had the reaction: "That's as bad as it gets? That's it?" Now the warnings: even if spins aren't that scary, they do need to be handled respectfully. Talk to your instructor about spin training and have an instructor with you whenever you do one (maybe on a future checkout?). Make sure that the airplane you are in is approved for spins - for example, many Cessna 172's are, but only under certain circumstances - and that the airplane is prepared for spins! This means taking a careful look at the weight and balance (and I suggest minimizing the weight, since you will want to climb quite a bit higher than on a normal lesson for safety), and securing (or removing) any loose objects. Keep in mind: the FAA stopped requiring spin training for students when it was realized that more accidents were occurring as a result of spin training than as a result of inadvertent spins. It is perfectly legitimate if your instructor prefers not to "take you up for a spin" maybe at some future time you'll have the opportunity with an instructor who will. I hope everyone is going to take advantage of the clear winter air to get some flying in! As always, fly safe!"
