Pilots, co-pilots, wanabees and aviation afficianados from the Greater Atlanta area have a unique opportunity to celebrate the Centennial of Flight together with the 50th Anniversary of the Founding of the EAA.

As most of you know, EAA was founded in 1953 by current Chairman of the Board Paul H. Poberezny. Paul served as President of the

EAA for 37 years, and was elected Chairman 4 months after he resigned as president. The office of EAA President has been filled by Paul's son Tom since 1989. EAA has grown from a handful of aviation enthusiasts to a 170,000-member international organization representing virtually the entire spectrum of recreational aviation. Its headquarters and EAA AirVenture Museum

now occupy a 150,000 square foot, multi-million dollar facility in Oshkosh.

On Friday evening, August 15th, as part of Georgia's commemoration of the Centennial of Flight, the guest of honor at the Fernbank Science Center will be Paul Poberezny. He will present a program entitled "EAA - The Dream of Eagles." Other guests that evening will be the recipients of Chapter 690's scholarships to the Air Academy in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. The program will start at 6:30 p.m. in the Planetarium, and will be followed by a reception upstairs, where attendees will have an opportunity to meet with Paul.

On Saturday, August 16th Paul will attend the Young Eagle Rally at Charlie Brown Airport. If you can help fly Young Eagles that day, please join the Rally.

Let's welcome Paul to Atlanta with a large turn-out of EAAers. Let's use this occasion to show him our southern hospitality and to thank him for all that he has done for General Aviation through the years.

Meigs Demolition Set; Daley-Appointed Board Votes to Finish Job

July 17, 2003 - "The decision to close the airport has already been made." With those words, Chicago Park Board President Maria Saldaña denied any further discussion regarding lakefront Meigs Field's fate at a Wednesday (July 16) board meeting. The Mayor Richard Daley-appointed Saldaña said \$1.5 million demolition contract has been approved, and work to finish the job begun by mayoral decree March 31 would commence within a month. The Board refused to defer its decision even a few weeks to allow the Friends of Meigs Field (FOM) to present a plan under development that would reopen the airport as a combined park and airport for all the people of Chicago, and provide \$40 million to \$630 million in additional federal funds that could be used to improve parks across the city. There was not even any discussion between board members prior to the vote on the issue. FOM continues to develop its plan while exploring possible solutions at the federal level, and is registered as an exhibitor at the upcoming EAA AirVenture Oshkosh, July 29-August 4.

EAA Part of Effort to Overturn Michigan's Pilot Background Check Law

July 18, 2003 - EAA continues to help fight and overturn a law on the books in the state of Michigan that calls for background checks on pilots. The state, in an extreme overreaction to the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks, created the law, which in EAA's opinion supercedes federal law and is therefore unconstitutional. EAA Council Chairman Harry Riggs filed an amicus (Friend of the Court) brief on behalf of EAA, which was approved in federal court to give EAA legal standing in the case brought by the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association. The State of Michigan had opposed EAA's involvement in the case but on July 16, the court upheld EAA's right to file in support of AOPA. The next hearing in the case is scheduled for July 24. EAA Chapter 690 Meeting Minutes - July 11, 2003

Chapter President Duane Huff called the meeting to order and read a transcript of Red Skelton's explanation of what the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag really means. The Pledge was recited and members and guests introduced themselves.

Last month's minutes were approved as published in the NavCom.

Mike Stewart gave the Treasurer's report. All is well except for an "obscene water bill." A split hose was found pouring water from a cutoff valve that was inadvertently left open. Mike is pursuing a lost water adjustment. Mike also gave the Board of Directors report. The chapter voted to donate a pair of tickets to the annual Hangar Dance to a silent auction for the Centennial of Flight. Proceeds benefit scholarships for kids to the Air Academy and for other aviation education.

Duane Huff and Dave Posey gave the Board of Trustees report in Lee Craymer's absence. The Board discussed the air compressor project.

Lee Craymer gave the Membership report. We now have 182 members, including 30 new members. Unfortunately, 40-50 members have not renewed from last year. Lee implored those delinquent members to renew post haste.

Tim Fulmer gave the Fly-Out report in Greg Jannakos' absence. The white water rafting trip has been rescheduled for August 23, with a "rain date" of August 30. Those planning to go must submit their deposits to ensure Adventures Unlimited has a boat waiting. The deposit is half of the \$87 per person cost of the trip. If no one can make it on either of the two planned dates, they will refund the deposits.

Duane reminded us that SERFI was on for October 3-5. Sunday is not a full day, as events end at 1:00. A call for advance party volunteers was made.

Tomorrow is International Young Eagles Day, and Duane expects some of Debi Huffman's students to show up, along with 12-14 Scouts. Another 7-8 Young Eagles are expected the following Saturday as well. Duane and Joel Levine need at least one volunteer to help tomorrow. Duane was pleased to announce the Chapter has flown 181 Young Eagles this year, despite the inclement weather.

Mike Stewart and Tim Fulmer have a GAFI planning session scheduled tomorrow. Look for details and a call for volunteers in the August NavCom.

In Lnor Levine's absence, Duane reminded us of the availability of mugs, calendars and oil analysis kits in the AeroShoppe.

Mike North had a resounding "No comment" as his Food Committee report. (In other news, the North's are expecting TWIN grandkids.)

Duane announced the Post Oshkosh Bash will begin at 2:00 on Saturday, August 9 with Friendship Flights.

Dinner follows at 5:00. Volunteer cooks and gas grills are needed. Since Duane will not be able to join us, he is delegating Bash responsibilities to Mike Stewart. Frank Wilcox reminded us the Bash is held in lieu of the regular Friday night monthly meeting.

Dave Ostergaard reported on the annual Hangar Dance scheduled for October 25th. It will include a silent auction, and is moving to Hangar 7 for the additional space and a better dance floor. The sign-up sheet is ready and tickets are now available. Posters advertising the event will be coming soon. The price is \$35 per couple in advance, \$45 at the door. As an incentive, for every 10 tickets a member sells s/he will receive one free ticket. Members also have an option to "buy" a table and have it held in reserve. Dave is seeking sponsors for the refreshments, and needs items-for-the-auction, similar to the CAF event. Both Chateau Elan and Coca-Cola have been approached and have given positive feedback, but the details are still being discussed. All sponsors will be publicly honored during the program. The lesson program has changed. Lessons will begin at 5:30 p.m. in Hangar 7 the day of the dance, and will last approximately 90 minutes. Lessons are still free.

Duane has the AOPA Airport Watch video for anyone interested in airport security.

There was no Old Business, nor was there any New Business.

Duane announced that the Gainesville Cracker Run Fly-In is tomorrow. Breakfast starts at 7:30 and lunch is also available. We also have labels available to put on our "old" aviation magazines to "advertise" EAA 690. The "re-labeled" periodicals can be left in professional offices as a Chapter 690 outreach. Joel Levine has the labels.

Frank Wilcox announced that Duane had received the 2003 EAA Major Achievement Award. Frank and the Board of Directors nominated Duane for this prestigious award, which will be presented to Duane the evening of July 30th at AirVenture's Theater in the Woods. Chapter members are encouraged to attend and heckle Duane. Duane follows Frank Wilcox and Sue Adams as the third member of Chapter 690 to win the award.

EAA founder Paul Poberezny will be at Fernbank's Centennial of Flight on August 15. He will also be at Fulton County Airport on August 26 for Young Eagle Day.

The New Standard wing project has chromate on the trailing edges and is awaiting epoxy. Covering will commence after the trailing edges are affixed and inspected.

The meeting was adjourned for a refreshment break prior to the program. Dr. John Carr's presentation was entitled "Tips for a Successful Airman Medical Exam."

EAA Chapter 690 Board of Directors' Meeting - July 8, 2003

The meeting was called to order by Mike Stewart.

GAFI meeting set for July 12 at 11:00 a.m., after Young Eagle flights. Tim Fulmer will chair the meeting. The North's will prepare lunch for attendees.

Young Eagle Rally's are scheduled for July 12th at LZU and August 16th at Charlie Brown, when Paul Poberezny will be in town.

Chapter members approved holding Silent Auction simultaneously with the Hangar Dance.

Due to bad weather only two planes were washed at last Saturday's annual Airplane Wash.

The Post Oskosh Bash is being chaired by Charlie and Bonnie McCormick. We need grills and people to help grill the food.

We are shutting down the Chapter's Internet access.

Duane has AOPA's Airport Watch video. It was sent out from EAA national. It can be used to help others at LZU to assist w/ Airport Watch. Frank Wilcox suggested watching it at a meeting

Frank asked if anything needed to be done in the Hangar in preparation for GAFI. He and others in "Over the Hill Gang" could use advance notice so that they can complete any projects.

Frank gave an update on the New Standard wing. Our chapter is making good progress. The other wing will not be done for quite awhile. Those reconstructing the fuselage found more bent pieces than expected. The aluminum alloy (an early one) originally used now has inner granular corrosion. They have someone in Massachusetts who has the jigs building a new fuselage using 60-61 T3 aluminum alloy for the angles. Delivery is expected in Spring '04. We should still plan to finish our wing as soon as possible. The trailing edge needs to be cleaned up, inspected and covered. Almost all of the soldering is done.

Joel reminded everyone that Paul Poberezny will be at Fernbankon August 15th. The Board voted for the chapter to spend up to \$80 to sponsor the refreshments for the evening.

The Incredible Age of Aviation Airshow is August 9th. We will ask members to approve the donation of two Hangar Dance tickets for their Silent Auction.

Frank Wilcox is storing the chapter's welder until the New Standard wings are moved. The old wings have already been moved out, except for some pieces under the stairs.

A BRIEF BIO: PAUL POBEREZNY, AVIATION VISIONARY AND INNOVATOR

Paul H. Poberezny is one of the most decorated men in the international aviation community, having received literally hundreds of trophies, awards and honors for his countless contributions to the world of flight. He is a 1999 inductee to the National Aviation Hall of Fame in Dayton, Ohio, America's place of honor for its most legendary aviators, and in 2002, received the prestigious Wright Brothers Memorial Trophy from the National Aeronautic Association. Poberezny is best known, however, as founder of the Experimental Aircraft Association (EAA), which has often been described as the world's most dynamic aviation organization.

Poberezny organized the first Fly-In in 1953, the same year he founded EAA with a handful of other aviation enthusiasts in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. basement of his Hales Corners. WI home. Paul and his wife, Audrey, nurtured the small group and watched it grow each year. Paul toured the U.S. and other nations on behalf of EAA, spreading a "grass roots" aviation message far and wide. He made frequent trips to Washington, D.C., to speak to Congressional leaders and federal authorities, where he defended the rights of amateur aircraft builders and sport aviation enthusiasts while earning his livelihood as a military pilot and aircraft maintenance officer. Today, Poberezny is considered one of aviation's leading spokesmen here in the United States and around the world, representing the interests of more than 170,000 active EAA members at local, national and international events.

The career of Paul Poberezny includes nearly 30 years of distinguished military service as a pilot, test pilot and a veteran of both World War II and the

Korean Conflict. Prior to retiring with the rank of Lt. Colonel, Poberezny became the only man in the armed forces to attain all seven aviation wings the military had to offer. He was able to accomplish this feat without ever having the benefit of military aviation training, a truly remarkable achievement in itself.

As a youngster, Poberezny built model airplanes from scratch. By the time he was 16, he had restored a battered Waco glider and taught himself how to fly. He has been in love with airplanes his entire life, although he has often remarked, "I've learned more about people through my association with aviation than I ever did about airplanes." In all, Poberezny has logged more than 30,000 hours of flight time. He has piloted more than 400 different types of aircraft, including more than 170 amateur-built airplanes. He has also designed and built more than 15 different airplanes and is currently working on a number of separate airplane projects in his private workshop. Poberezny also served as Publisher/Editor of EAA's publications, including five monthly magazines and numerous technical manuals and research papers, for 34 years. A collection of his "Homebuilder's Corner," which he has written since 1953, would be considered a homebuilder's bible. The memoirs of his early years, titled Poberezny ... The Story Begins, were published in 1996 and chronicles Paul's background and dedication to aviation.

Admired for his leadership and ability, Poberezny has served on the Board of Directors of many local, regional, national and international organizations. He is, without question, one of the foremost visionaries and innovators in the world of aviation today.


