

Ah such was the repartee over the Callaway Gardens Inn cusine. Four planes had earlier transported the eight aviating gourmets from various northern airports to the Pine Mountain airport where the Inn's courtesy van met us.

first to land was The your author with new member, Tony Blalock aboard in a Lockheed flying club C-172. Next were Duane and Tess Huff their Aeronca Chief ... running fine after a rebuild of the mags. Then came Mac and Donna Forbes in their C-140. were all assembled to critique Frank Wilcox's short field landing on the last thousand feet of the 5000 feet runway...amazing what a little extra power will do to stretch down wind landing. What a beautiful day for anything, but especially for flying.

It all started for me when Mac and Donna appeared over McCollum, ten minutes early so I was still at the gas pumps. By 9:25 a.m., we were off and headed in tandem for Dallas. Meanwhile the Huff's and Wilcox's already cruising down the east side of Atlanta. There were no clouds in the sky, but there was enough morning haze to make your check points surprise you one at a time. Mac took up the safe position directly behind me.
