# July Program Announced – The Aviation Museum at Marietta, Georgia

Chapter 690 Vice President Lee Olson has announced that Robert Ormsby, President of "The Aviation Museum at Marietta, GA" will be our guest speaker at our July 11th, 2008 meeting. Ormsby will give us an update on the museum's progress.



The Aviation Museum at Marietta, Georgia, projected to open in 2010, was established in 2003 to preserve and remember the remarkable story of Marietta's aircraft plant and to shape our nation's future by encouraging interest in engineering and technology. The museum's mission is to help children and adults: Discover the wonders of flight from concept to reality, Explore the heritage of aviation, Dream about the future possibilities of science and technology, and Engage in life-long learning and critical thinking that promotes national excellence

in science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Preliminary plans for the 60,000 square foot museum include a theater, meeting rooms and classrooms, and indoor exhibit space large enough to display a C-5.

The Museum will be located on 15.5 acres at the corner of Atlanta Road and South Cobb Drive in close proximity to the entrances of Lockheed Martin, Naval Air Station and Dobbins Air Reserve Base.

The Museum property is a mere 1.5 miles from the Marietta Square and only 25 minutes from downtown Atlanta. Located just three miles from I-75, the museum will be a drawing influence for tourism and economic development.

information web-site According <www.aviationmarietta.org>, Community Outreach Programs of the Aviation Museum at Marietta, Georgia (AMMG) provide stimulating experiences for science. technology, engineering, and mathematics, or STEM, learning outside of formal classroom environments through media, exhibits, and community-based programming. Program goals are to increase interest in, understanding of, and engagement in. STEM disciplines by individuals of all ages; to establish linkages between informal and formal education; and to stimulate parents and others to support their children's STEM learning endeavors and to become informed proponents of high-quality, universal STEM education.

The Museum aspires to be the premier place for all people to celebrate the history and innovation of aviation, to explore the applications of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics to aviation, and to inspire dreams about the future through innovative teaching and learning. AMMG will utilize the field of aviation to inspire the community to reach new heights of learning.

A Virtual Museum and On-line Programming will be designed

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create an engaged community of students and adults who develop an invested interest in the Aviation Museum and its learning goals. The strategy of this program is to reach out to schools and other established programs such as after-school aviation, science, and gaming clubs in order to further interest in STEM. Online utilize programs will appropriate and non-violent "edutainment"

English and Spanish-speaking children.

The AMMG philosophy is that airplanes serve as an interesting and engaging platform for teaching children not only about travel skills but also physics, history, math, geography, and technology.

The Museum is cultivating relationships with other aviation and STEM focused companies to provide new and innovative educational programs for youth and adults such as field trips, camps, Girl Power in Aviation, robotics, labs, workshops and scouting activities.

## **Hangar Talk**

Last time we talked, I was in a rush to take ten students on a tour of the NASA Johnson, Marshall and Kennedy Space Centers. We have returned, and I would like to share some of the highlights with you. Many of you have probably been on V.I.P. tours of some of these places, and you know just how incredible they are. Our group was treated royally at all of the centers, and they had experiences that will last a lifetime! Hopefully, some will be influenced in ways that will help shape their personal career paths.

Our first adventure was a visit to the Sonny Carter Neutral Buoyancy Lab at the Johnson Space Center. We observed astronauts preparing for their mission to repair the Hubble Space Telescope. Other sites included the Operations Control Center, location of the International Space Station training module and the Jake Garn Facility, where the Space Shuttle middeck and flight deck are reproduced for training purposes. Then we were joined by a former student of mine - Astronaut Eric Boe



- who will be the pilot on STS 126. Eric shared his personal experiences and some favorite astronaut stories with our group. He took them through the thermal vacuum chamber and then they had a surprise opportunity in the simulators. They all got a chance to dock the shuttle to the ISS, land the space shuttle at Kennedy Space Center, and dock the new Orion crew vehicle to the ISS! The students met engineers who were designing the new simulators for the Orion vehicle. Does this make you want to go back to school?! The day ended with visits to the historical Gemini and Apollo Mission Control room, as well as the ISS and Space Shuttle Mission Control rooms.

This was a tour that would be difficult to top. However, we continued to have exciting experiences that enhanced what we had seen and done at JSC. At the Marshall Space Flight Center, we began our tour at the Payload Command Center. This is where all of the science experiments and control payloads on the Shuttle and ISS are managed. We also met engineers who were building full-size mock-ups of

sections of the Ares rockets. This is how accessibility for various service components of the rockets is determined. Next we visited the Flat Floor Lab. It was like a huge air hockey table, and the largest of its kind in the world. It is made of numerous layers of cemented epoxy, and is used to test sensors of guided systems and docking stations.

We arrived in Florida in time to see the STS 124 launch. That was a major surprise. Shuttle launches rarely happen exactly on schedule, and this one did! We had a beautiful view from Titusville, just across from the launch pad. We were at Space View Park, a great public viewing area!

After a weekend at Disney's E.P.C.O.T. center, we visited Kennedy Space Center. After watching the IMAX movie "Magnificent Desolation," we drove to the Orbiter Processing Facility, where Eric's ship.



Endeavour, was being readied for launch. Her protective tiles were being replaced and other preparations were being made before the scheduled November 10 launch of STS 126. When Eric left our group in Houston, he flew his T-38 to KSC for training. We just missed him! Our next stop was Launch Pad B, where Endeavour will be launched. On the way to the pad, we passed the Press site and the Vehicle Assembly Building.

After the trip, several of the students had adopted a favorite phrase that they learned in Houston at Historic Mission Control: "Failure is NOT an Option," uttered by Gene Kranz, flight director of the Apollo 13 and other missions. One of my girls summed up the experience by saying, "In order to achieve your dreams, you must work hard for them. Shoot for the moon and even if you miss, you'll land among the stars!"

I hope you have enjoyed sharing some of our highlights. Perhaps you can share our experience by watching for the mission of STS 126 this fall. They will be delivering components for the Japanese module that was delivered to the Station by STS 124.

# Phil Boyer to Retire from AOPA at the End of 2008

June 30, 2008 — Phil Boyer, who has served as president of the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association for 18 years, will retire at the end of the year, AOPA announced Monday. Washington public affairs executive Craig L. Fuller has been named his successor by the organization's Board of Trustees.

"We congratulate Phil for his successful leadership of AOPA and his significant contributions to general aviation over the past two decades," EAA President Tom Poberezny said on behalf of the association. "We look forward to his remaining active in the aviation community."

Fuller will begin his new role on January 1, 2009, and will work with Boyer on the transition for the remainder of this year.

"I have often mentioned that this day would come, on schedule, as planned with my family and the AOPA Board of Trustees," said Boyer. "Now, it's official. I am delighted Craig will captain AOPA on the 'next leg' of this remarkable journey to preserve and advance General Aviation."

When Boyer took the controls in 1991 (only the third president in AOPA's 69-year history), the GA industry was in crisis, beaten down by product liability lawsuits. He helped pass the General Aviation Revitalization Act, which turned around manufacturing. He also championed civilian use of GPS and WAAS, and later ADS-B, to benefit general aviation. . . ## **Congress Extends FAA Budget to September 30**

General Aviation User Fees and ATC Modernization Still Up in the Air

June 25, 2008 - With the FAA budget reauthorization bill stalled in the Senate, both houses of Congress this week passed a continuing resolution to fund the FAA through the end of September 2008. The House passed legislation on Tuesday, while the Senate voted for the extension on Thursday to extend the agency's existing budget through September 30, 2008.

The budget extension would keep the lights on at the agency for another three months, but it leaves a lot of long-term FAA programs and projects in limbo because no one knows what the final FAA budget bill will include. Among the items left hanging are much-needed air traffic control modernization projects.

The House passed its version of the new FAA budget bill (H.R.2881) in September 2007, without any general aviation (GA) user fees. The Senate version of the bill (S.B.1300) was stalled for months over the issue of user fees. In late April, a compromise between Senate committees removed GA user fees from S.B.1300, but the measure stalled again over labor provisions and other non-aviation issues. If passed, the bills would fund the FAA through 2011.

In their present form, neither H.R.2881 nor S.B.1300 would impose any GA user fees. That is good news for general aviation, but the bills have a long way to go to become law. No one knows what compromises may come out of the process before it's done. And the president has threatened to veto any bill that doesn't include the administration's proposals, including GA user fees.

The House will be in summer recess until September 6; the Senate until September 8. Given the current deadlock and the upcoming November election, aides say there is little chance that Congress will pass a new FAA budget bill this year. Congress could still act on the existing bills, S.B.1300 and H.R.2881, said Doug Macnair, EAA vice president of government relations. But, he added, if action is delayed until 2009 when a new president and Congress take office, "we could be back to square one."

"Getting user fees off the table was a hard-won victory for EAA and the general aviation community," Macnair said. "But the airlines and the administration are still pushing their user fee proposals and there are still members of Congress who support GA user fees. We need to keep the pressure on Congress to reject the user fee proposals. EAA members need to continue communicating with their senators and representatives, urging them to oppose GA user fees.

"EAA and the GA community will continue to fight user fees and to urge Congress to pass a fair and responsible FAA funding bill," he added. "The voices of individual EAA members will continue to be an essential part of that effort."





Continuing a Chapter 690 tradition, there is no regular Friday night meeting in August. Instead, we will gather the next day for our annual "Post Oshkosh Bash."


Members who have returned from their trips to AirVenture are invited to share their stories and photos with those of us who were not able to make the pilgrimage this year.
