Memorialize Them Always!!!

Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day of remembrance for those who have died in service of the United States of America. While Waterloo N.Y. was officially declared the birthplace of Memorial Day by President Lyndon Johnson in May 1966, it's difficult to prove conclusively the origins of the day.

Regardless of the exact date or location of its origins, one thing is clear - Memorial Day was borne out of the Civil War and a desire to honor our dead. It was officially proclaimed on 5 May 1868 by General John Logan, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, in his General Order No. 11. "The 30th of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet churchyard in the land," he proclaimed. The date of Decoration Day, as he called it, was chosen because it wasn't the anniversary of any particular battle.

On the first Decoration Day, General James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, and 5,000 participants decorated the graves of the 20,000 Union and Confederate soldiers buried there. The first state to officially recognize the holiday was New York in 1873. By 1890 it was recognized by all of the northern states. The South refused to acknowledge the day, honoring their dead on separate days until after World War I (when the holiday changed from honoring just those who died fighting in the Civil War to honoring Americans who died fighting in any war).

It is now celebrated in almost every state on the last Monday in May with Congressional passage of the National Holiday Act of 1971 (P.L. 90 – 363).

Red Poppies

In 1915, Moina Michael wrote:

"We cherish too, the Poppy red that grows on fields where Valor led, it seems to signal to the skies that blood of heroes never dies"

She then conceived of an idea to wear red poppies on Memorial day in honor of those who died serving the nation during war. She was the first to wear one, and sold poppies to her friends and co-workers with the money going to benefit servicemen in need. Shortly before Memorial Day in 1922 the VFW became the first veterans' organization to nationally sell poppies. Two years later their "Buddy" Poppy program was selling artificial poppies made by disabled

veterans. In 1948 the US Post Office honored Ms. Michael for her role in founding the National Poppy movement by issuing a red 3 cent postage stamp with her likeness on it.

The history is good to know, but it is much more important that we **ALWAYS** remember those that gave the ultimate sacrifice and the families of those men and women. Not just on the last Monday of May, remember them when you enjoy the freedom to fly wherever you choose, when you express deferring views, when you come and go as you wish-remember those that died to keep us **FREE**.

EAGLE FLIGHTS IT'S TIME TO GIVE BACK!!!

In this month's Sport Aviation magazine, Mac McClellan has an interesting article about the number of pilots and aircraft still flying in the good old USA. In his article he basically points out that because of the way the record keeping is done, the FAA has no clue how many active general aviation pilots and aircraft are still out there flying around. But he does point out that the antiquated way that the FAA keeps score does indicate that there are far less of us active pilots than the FAA number of about 610,000.

So what are we to do in a world where all physical activity has become almost extinct? Looking at a screen of various dimensions and using our thumbs to manipulate various devices has become the reality of all phases of life for most of our population under age 60!

So now the number of active pilots in our country is less than 1 in 500 of our population.

What will it be in 5 to 20 years when many of us will no longer be able to fly and are looking for buyers of our beloved steeds of the air?

The reality of it all is that unless we act now there will be no buyer for our airplanes. So it is all important that as a pilot you should want to protect your investment in any way that you possibly can.

The best way to do so is to become part of the solution instead of part of the problem, and involve yourself in the new EAA Eagle Flight Program. I understand that many of our flying chapter members do not want to be involved in Young Eagles for many reasons and I understand your concerns. But I cannot understand why any of our pilots would not want to spend \$50 worth of tax deductible avgas and 45 minutes of their probably not so valuable time to light a spark in a future pilot that has the time; age and money to get involved in aviation today and not 10 to 20 years down the road.

Several of your fellow EAA chapter 690 Pilots have already bought into the Eagle Flight concept and are doing their part to expand the general aviation community by offering flights to those they think

might make a future pilot. You know some of these people too and it is your obligation to yourself to make this program a success.
