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Duel in the Desert

Dave Watson earned three 3rd place clinckies and a 3rd place trophy in Unlimited. Tom Meyers was on rails that weekend and brought home three 1st place clinckies as well as the 1st place trophy in advanced. Chris Combs placed 4th overall, with a 2nd place in the Unknown flight. Brennon York took 3rd in the free and unknown flights in Intermediate and the 2nd place trophy. Chris Harrison brought home 3rd place clinckies in the

known and free. Unfortunately, he had some mechanical issues and was unable to fly the unknown flight. As with every aerobatic contest, some strange things took place - not all of them should be mentioned in the newsletter. Ha! This one, however, is one for the history books. Britt Lincoln flew for 1st place clinckies in all three of her flights in the Primary category, her competition, Brock Ohlson also took home the 1st place clinky in the unknown. How could this be, you ask? Brock and Britt both earned scores of exactly 500.00 in the unknown flight!! Do we have any statisticians here? What are the odds of that?!?! Britt also earned her first Grass Roots award.

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New Chapter Members



strained with the other less desirable housing options.





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
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JOIN / RENEW
